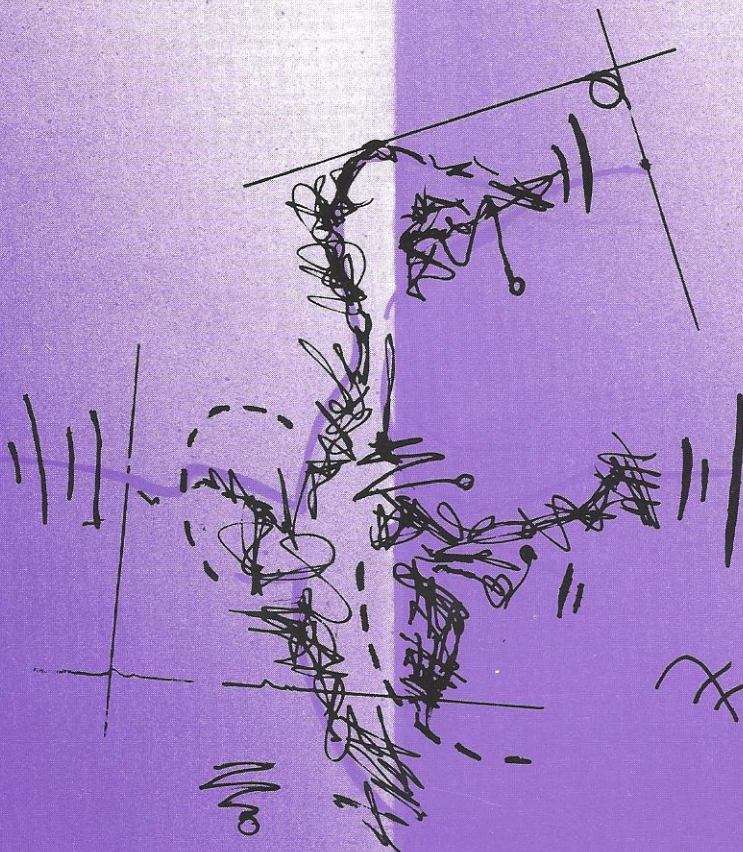

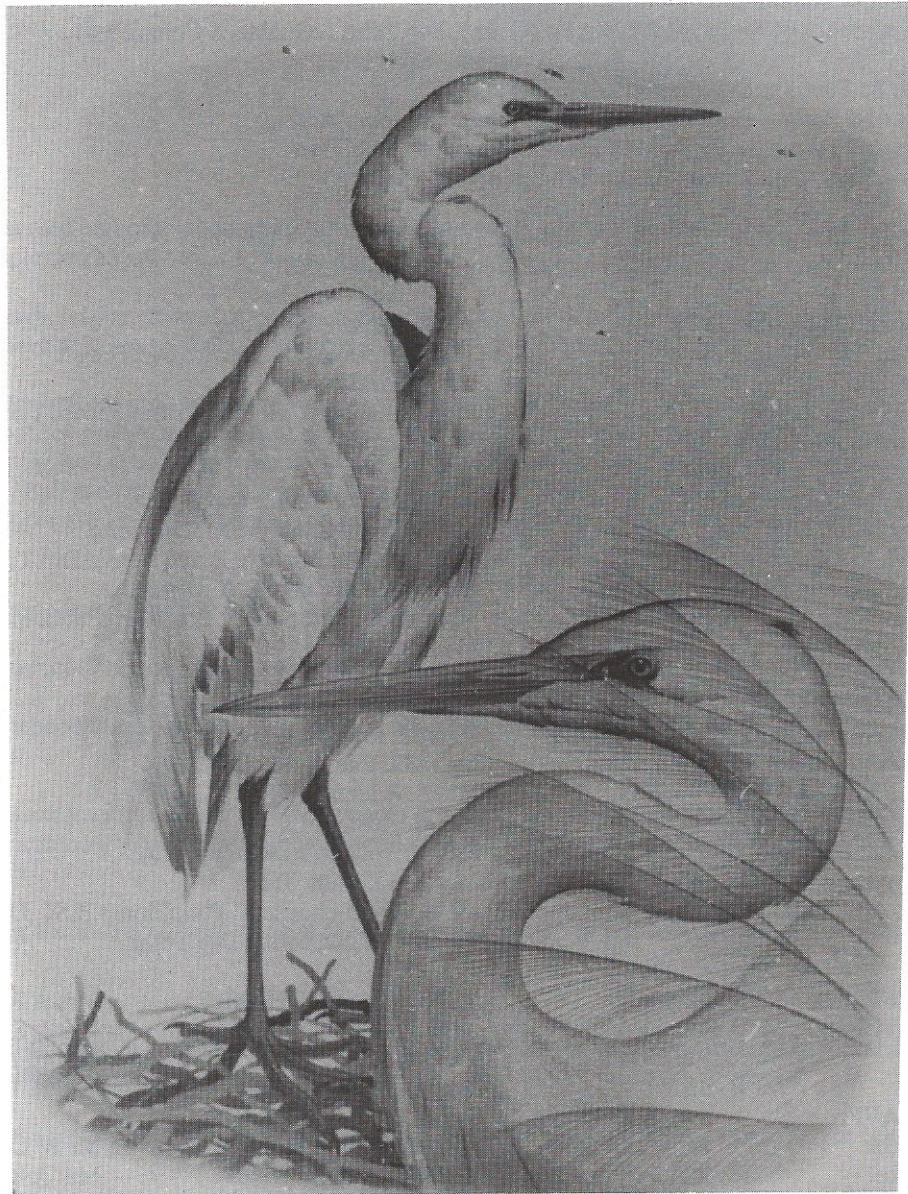

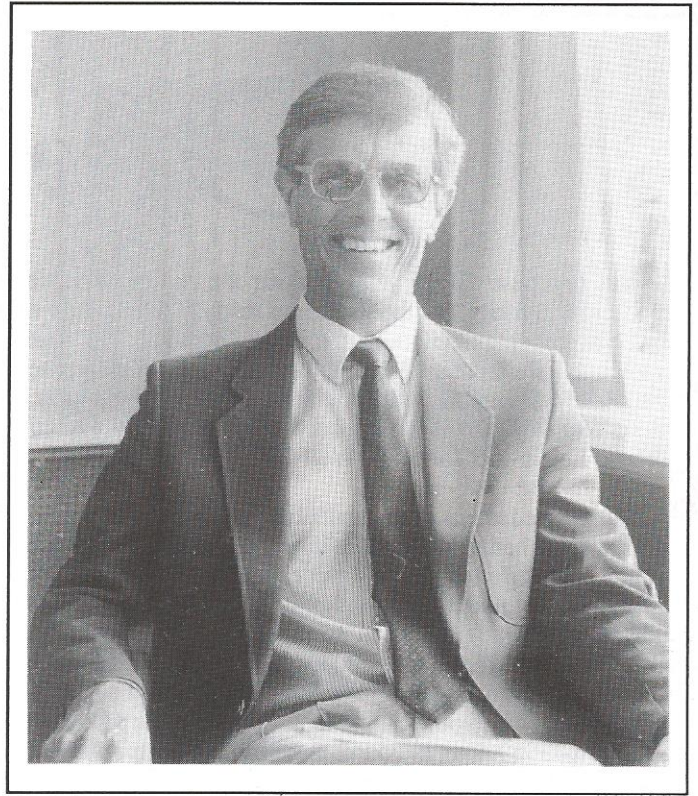

Principal's Report

Rutherford has a fine history of quality innovation and I am proud to be a part of the changes and developments of the last decade of the Twentieth Century.

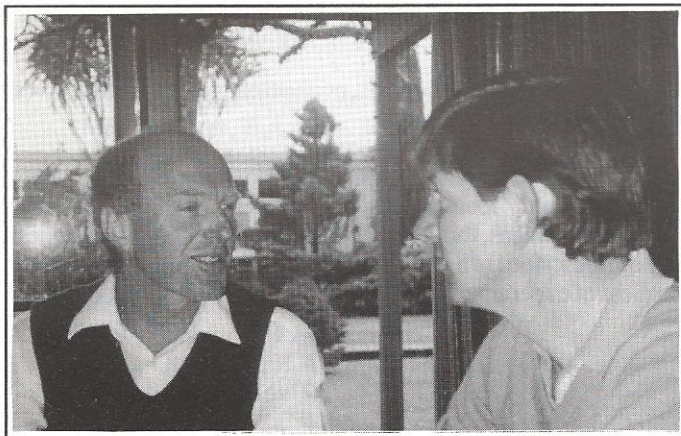

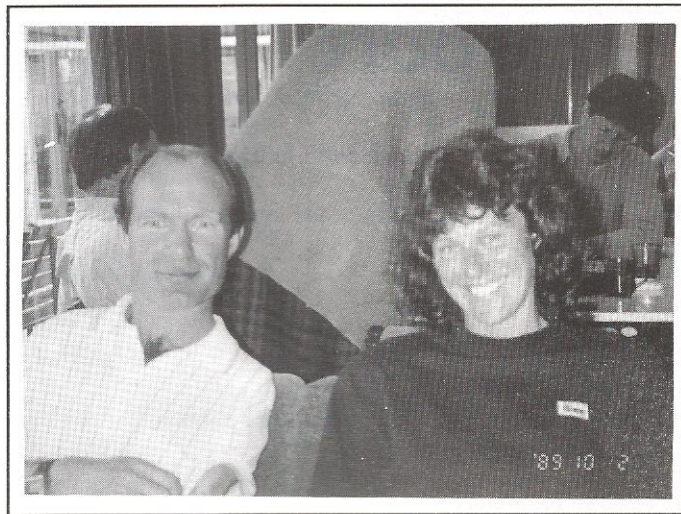

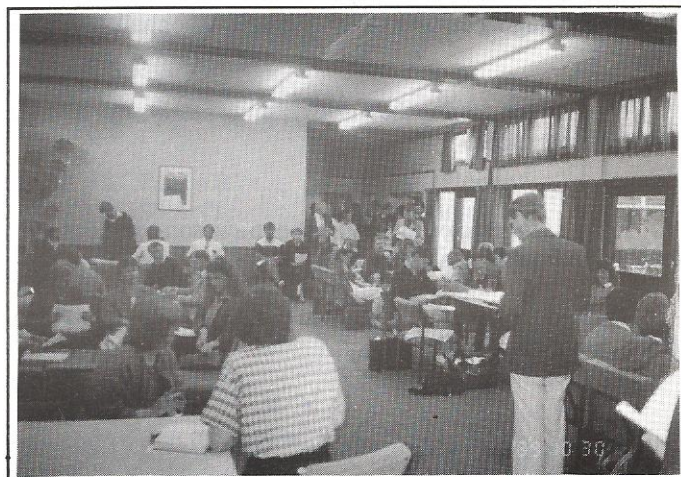
Charles a lesson on how to make crumpets. Fantastic! An absolutely wonderful lady.

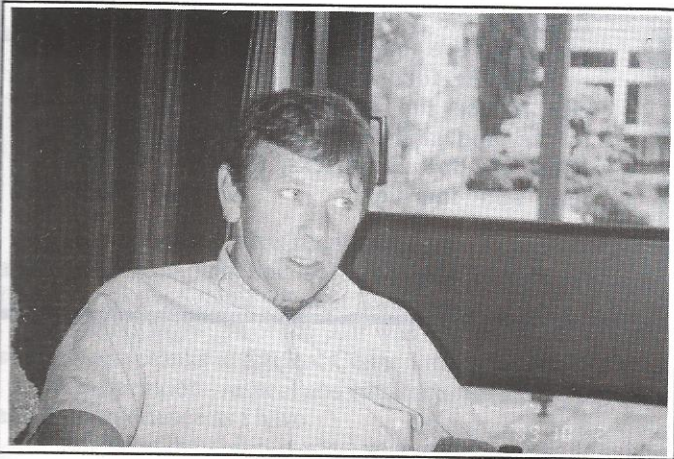
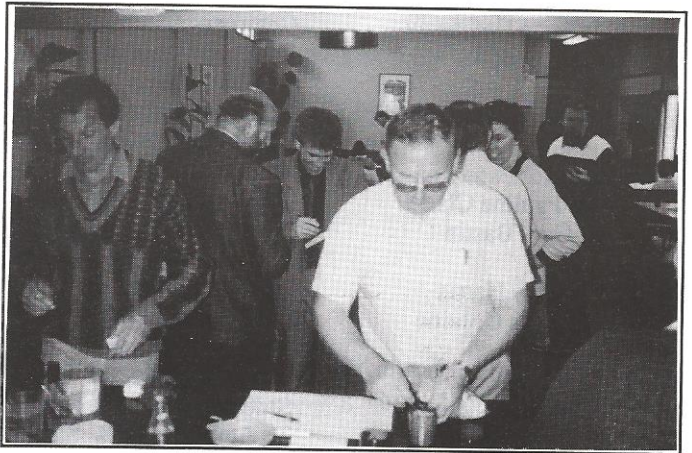

Mrs Kath Handricks

Rutherford High School records with gratitude its debt to Mrs Kath Handricks who lost a courageous battle against cancer on Thursday October 19th.

Of Welsh extraction Mrs Handricks was brought up with her brothers in Wellington and Taranaki. After her marriage to Bob Handricks the couple moved to Te Atatu when it was a raw suburb on Auckland's outskirts.

Service has been a hallmark of the life of Kath Handricks. The Q.S.M. awarded in the 1989 Queen's Birthday Honours was richly deserved. Kath worked tirelessly for two major causes: firstly the good of the community at large which she served as the local secretary for Dr Michael Bassett the Te Atatu M.P. Deputy Head Girl

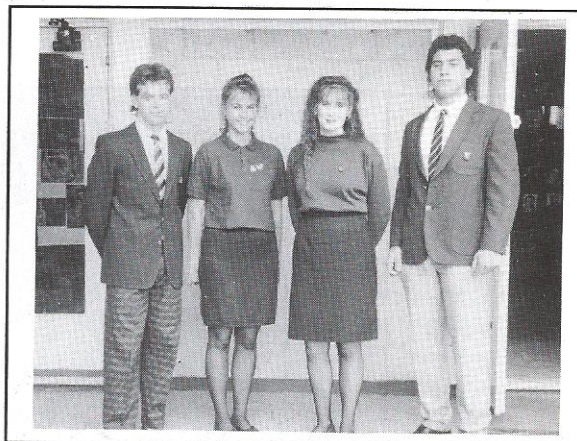

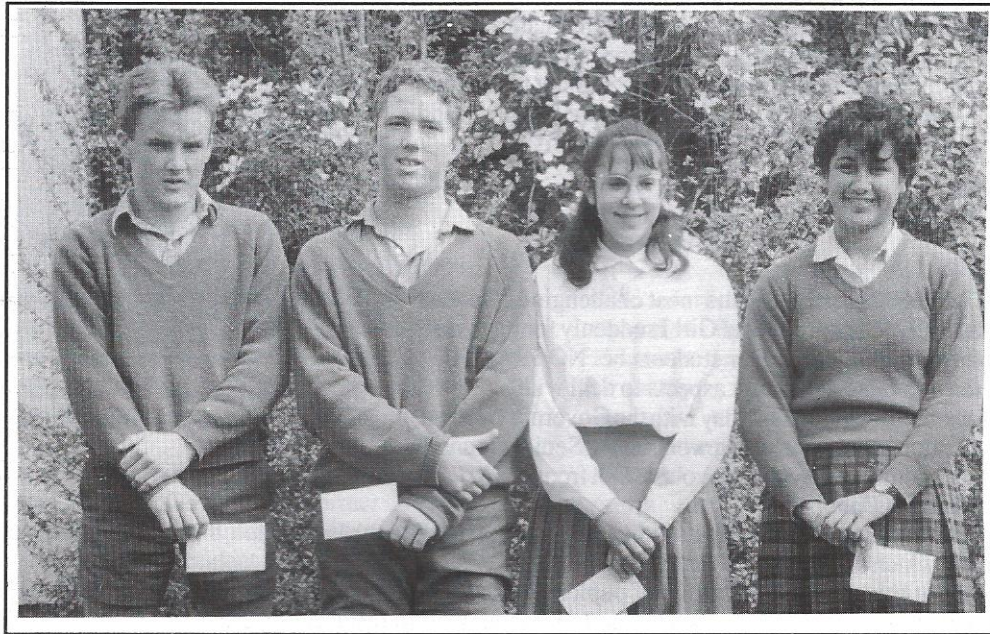

Ann-Marie Davies -

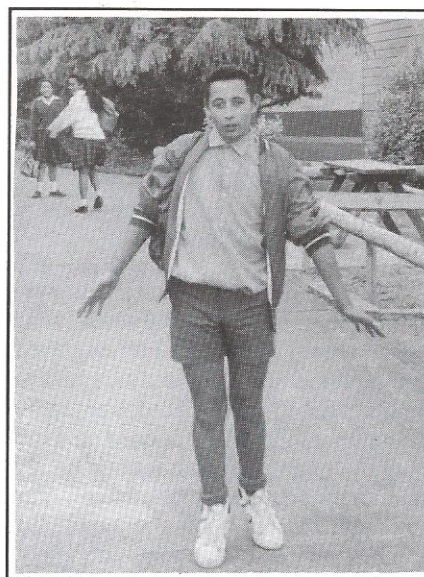

The Ladies Choir won the Sugden Cup for accumulating the most points overall in the C.W.I. West Auckland Federations three day competition.

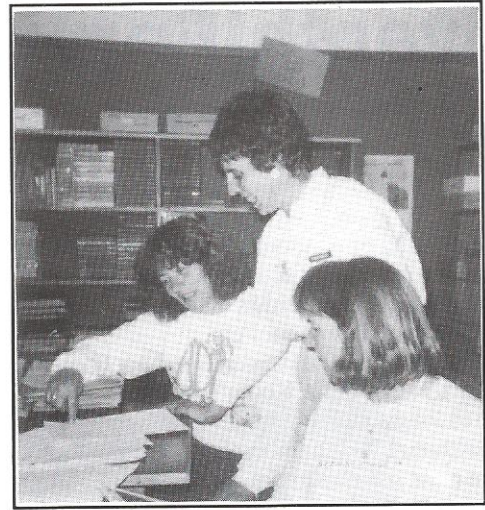
Pride of place was Elsie Johnson winning the Producers Cup for her innovative approach and presentation.

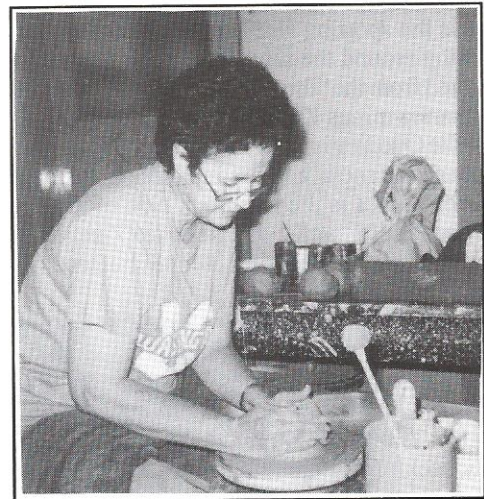

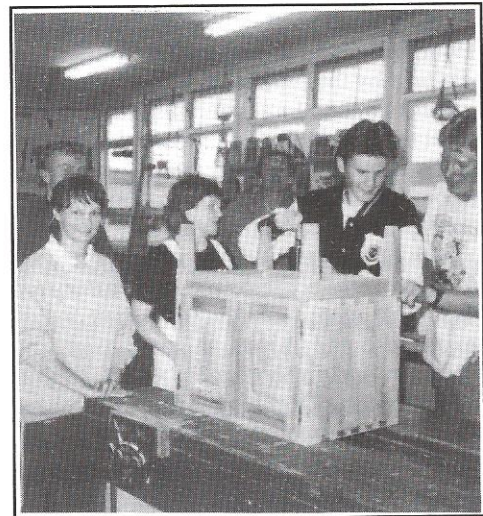

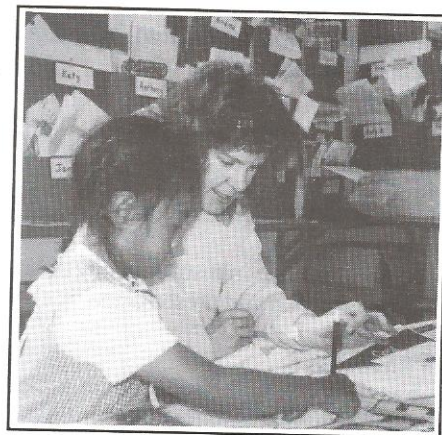

Playschool

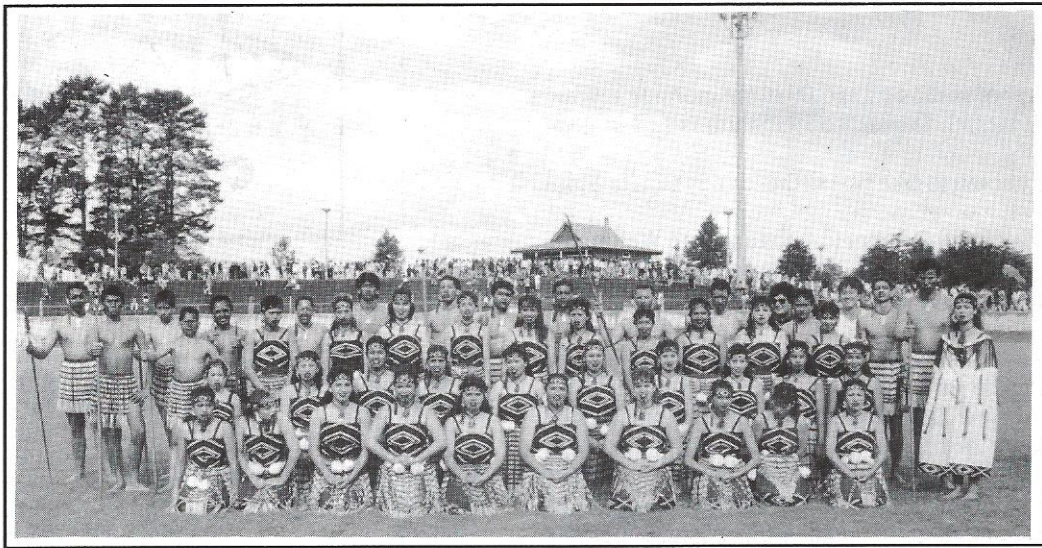

The Spirit of New Zealand helps young students to build up confidence, learn to handle a boat and learn more about themselves.

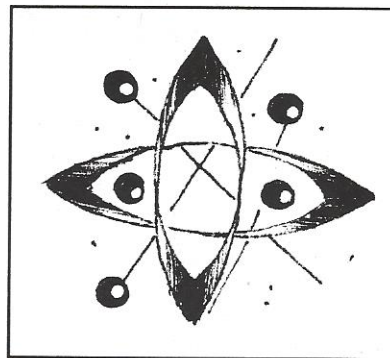
Souvenirs such as hats and t-shirts were available to be taken home in remembrance of the time spent aboard the boat.

Sage advice for scholars

Many sixth and seventh formers at Rutherford High School may be planning to avoid unemployment by attending university next year. It's a good idea to have some background knowledge of life at university.

For a start university is big. With 15000 students this year, and even more expected next year, Auckland University is bursting at the seams. It's a sad fact that many courses

are quickly filled and many students have to be turned away. It's not unusual now to sit in crowded lecture theatres with 200 other students.

University is expensive. The government plans to introduce user-pays into education and this could mean fees of \$1500 a year. Add to this the cost of textbooks, stationary, photocopy fees, and you can see why so many students live in poverty. There is some remuneration. The standard study grant is \$43 per week and up to \$86 (for the over-20's). However, most of this is quickly swallowed up by the cost of living.

University is hard work. There are plenty of essays, tests, assignments, labs and exams. Students are expected to complete assignments by the due date or they may not be marked. This puts pressure on you to use your time wisely. Start your essays early and don't get into the (all too common) situation of sitting up the night before writing out assignments due the next morning. There is no punishment for not completing assignments- but it makes it harder to pass the end- of- year exams.

University is social. Here you will meet people who share your own interests. There are dozens of social clubs on campus such as the Tramping Club, the Monty Python Appreciation Society, NORML (you'll soon learn what this means!) and Students for Antichrist. The university has many social facilities including a modern and fully equipped sports-recreation centre, a snooker room, a video-games room and (most importantly) 'Shadows', the university bar. It is important to socialize on campus as it helps students to relax and unwind between assignments.

The main trick in coping with university life is to find the right balance between work and play (both are important). What you get out is what you put in.

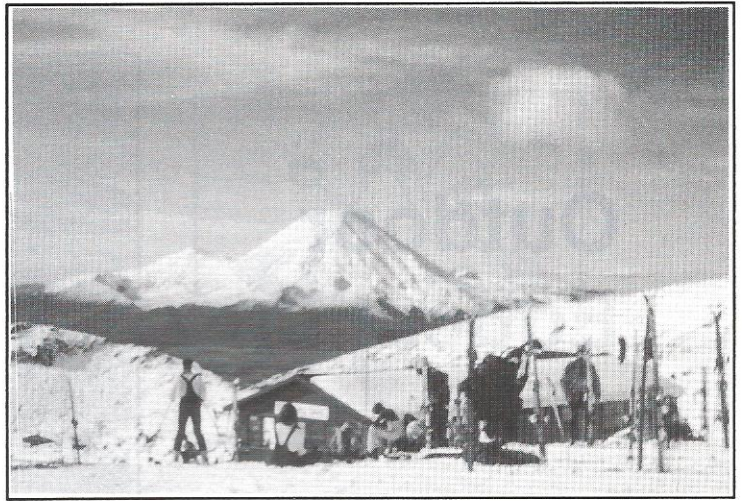
But seriously folks, I had days out of school (yahoo!) and it was really choice! I survived it, so you can too. Don't miss out next year.

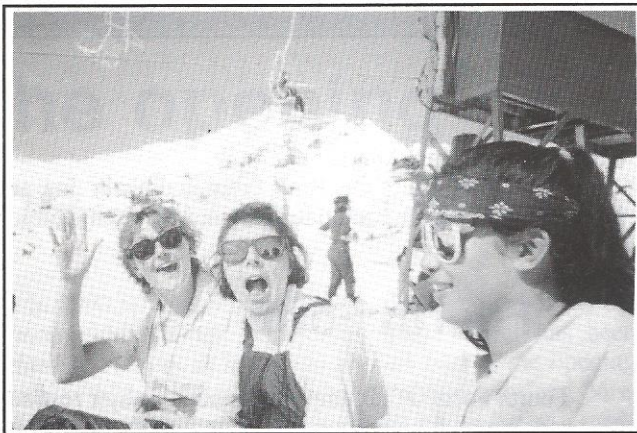

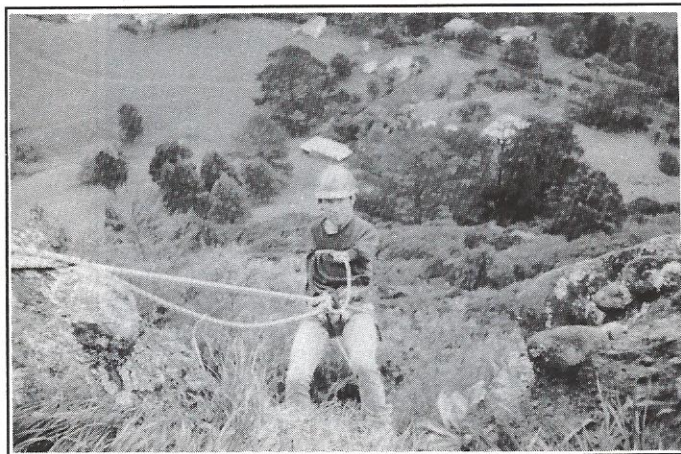

Maybe this is an indictment of present day society but unfortunately we have to be responsible to ourselves, for our strength comes from within before it can be enhanced from without.

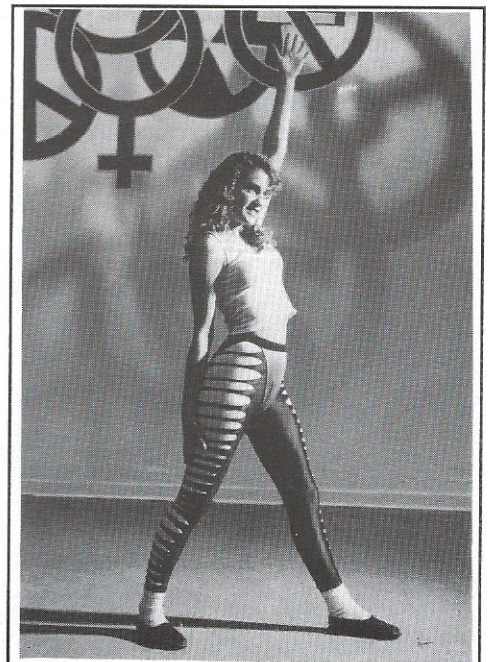
The crowd's reaction was excellent for every night and I would like to personally thank all the people that came along and supported us.

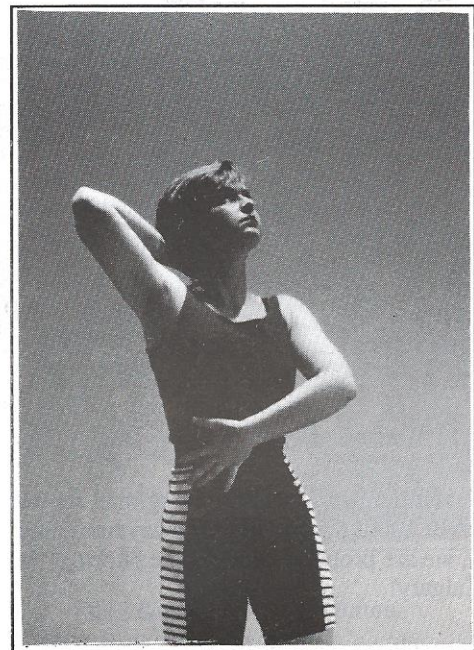
The hour and a half show was the result of a whole year's work as some of the items were from the first term's work while some other items were choreographed especially for the show.

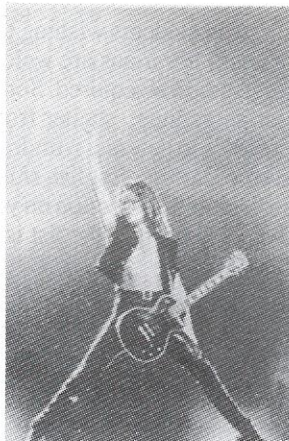
To those who do appreciate the art of Screaming Nazis, it is a way to enjoy themselves just like trendies enjoy listening to Kylie Minogue or Bros.
