Teenagers are immoral. They must be. Parents, teachers, "Public Personages" are forever complaining about teenage immorality, so there must be some cause for their complaint.

But what do these critics really mean by "immoral"? Usually they are complaining about specific violations of convention. They seem to think that morality is obeying rules set by society — rules about sex, drink and property.

But morality transcends external restrictions. It transcends traditional definitions of good and evil. It is the free striving of the individual, spurred on by love, to realise his essential humanity, to realise a basic concern for his fellow man, and to realise himself as an individual. The love which motivates him is free of spurious emotion and sickly sentimentality. True morality springs from a conviction that every human is ultimately worthwhile, in all his differences from and similarities to other humans. Blind superficial acceptance of traditional values is negative compared with a total involvement in positive striving, which true morality is.

Many young people become dissatisfied with the superficial restrictions and negative attitudes of society. If this happens they have four choices. The first is to conform on the surface (my hair is neat; I hold down a steady job; I am a respectable citizen) and rebel underneath (so what if my mind and humanity rot?). These people decay.

The second is to rebel on the surface and flaunt their transgressions of convention (I grow my hair longer than my elders; I sneer, jibe; I forget love and sleep with anyone available) and conform underneath to equally trivial but more destructive standards. These people actively destroy their own humanity.

The third — so fashionable at the moment — is the refusal to participate in humanity. It is opting out by entering the faerie world of drugs, far from the reality of the jungle. These people deny their own humanity.

The fourth choice is different from these three in that the results are worthwhile. It is the choice to learn, to discover oneself and others, and by trying to think, understand and love to find joy and freedom rather than boredom, frustration and bigotry.

That schools should be important in this learning of true morality seems obvious, but they rarely are. We have in our schools largely a morality of coercion — a system of rules, regulations and recriminations apparently based on the belief that man is evil and must be restrained, that fear and punishment are the weapons against this inherent evil, and that goodness is refraining from punishable offences and doing dutiful deeds. But morality is not preaching at people about trivial misdeeds and practising cold charity.

The reasons for the shortcomings of our schools are blatantly apparent — the dull processing of dead knowledge which must later be churned out in an exam to gain a "magic number" for some strange reason regarded as an estimate of ability; the crowded classrooms of noisy and reluctant children. But mass examinations, lack of money, teacher shortages are not the whole answer, and they do not excuse us from all blame. It is possible for people to learn to look beyond themselves, to find true values and ideals, to strive towards a society in which reason and feeling are more fully understood and balanced.

A true morality based on love, is an ideal that should and could be realised in New Zealand. All people should be concerned to see that it is encouraged in our schools.

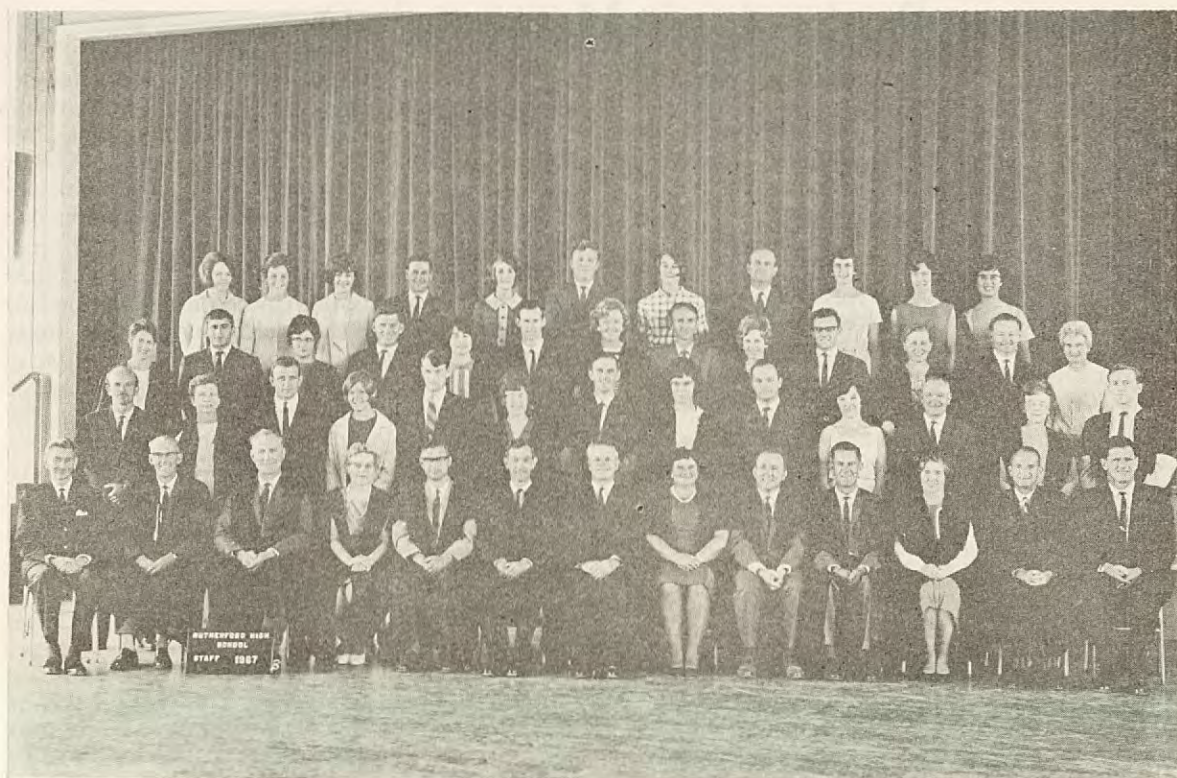

Rutherford Memorial Day

Rutherford Day was again a very successful and enjoyable occasion. Among the many guests were included the Hon. A. E. Kinsella, Minister of Education, Mr J. Bedbrook, Acting District Senior Inspector, members of the Board of Governors, representatives from the Hobsonville Air Base, four representatives of the newly formed Old Pupils' Association, wives and associates of the staff. The guest speaker was Sir Edmund Hillary who, after an introductory speech from Mr Clark and a song from the school, spoke on the qualities needed for leadership.

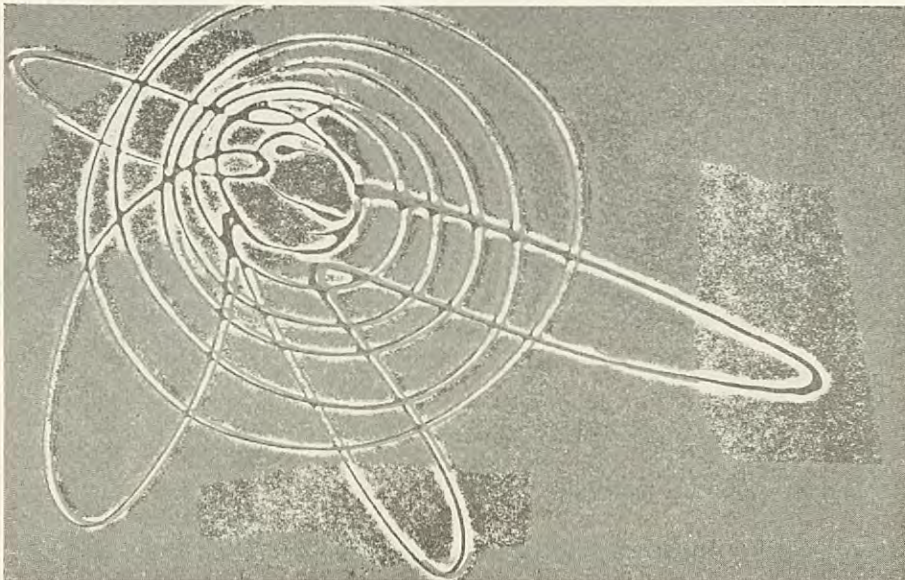
Sir Edmund began with a reference to Lord Rutherford, whom Rutherford Day commemorates, and praised his great scientific achievements, but pointed out that such achievements can be used destructively if not placed in the hands of responsible men. He believed that to be a leader you had to steer your life in the direction you wanted to go. There was no such thing as a born leader. The necessary qualities had to be developed; they were courage, humour, and determination. He recalled instances from his past experiences when he had seen his associates displaying courage by taking situations into their

own hands and overcoming problems. He could also remember occasions when humour had helped to ease tension and boost morale. Once during a precarious descent down a vertical cliff of ice, and another time when a companion had fallen into a crevasse.

The final component of leadership, and perhaps the most important, was determination. Sir Edmund recalled the determination of Peter Mulgrew, whose legs were amputated after a severe attack of frostbite, not to become a second-class citizen but to go on striving for the type of life he loved — climbing.

Sir Edmund urged us to be prepared to make an effort to achieve something worthwhile, and to try to be one step ahead in our thoughts and preparation so that when the next day came we would be ready for its difficulties.

When the ceremony was concluded the guests and staff were served a superb luncheon imaginatively prepared by Miss McKenzie, Miss Teal and the girls from the Homecraft course. Our sincere thanks go to these people and to Miss Rushbrook and Mrs Riwai whose floral arrangements were greatly admired.

PRIZE GIVING, 1966

The guest speaker for Prizegiving this year was one of New Zealand's most colourful and outspoken personalities, Dr W. B. Sutch, who flew up from Wellington especially for the occasion. His principal theme was the need for a sound general education. He criticised the course structure which forces pupils to choose a science, language, technical or commercial course from the third form, and urged that such courses should be taken up much later.

He spoke eloquently on the need for the greater education of women and the need for special training courses to enable women whose family responsibilities had finished to take up useful jobs in industry and commerce.

The academic awards were presented by Mrs P. A. Gill and the sports awards by Mr R. E. K. Barton.

After the Prizegiving the sixth form and their teachers moved to the Homecraft block for an elaborate supper prepared by the accredited pupils. The evening concluded with some rousing singing led by Mr Barton on the piano accordion.

Our Sponsorship Scheme

A little hilarity in the final week of each term, brilliant ideas on the part of Miss Rushbrook and 6B1, sound planning from 6A, some initiative out of the blue from Graham Cater and Len Duck and a general willingness on the part of the school to contribute — and what do we get? We get \$1000. And what does that do?

Apart from the sponsorship fees and supplementary winter payments to our 14 sponsored children we are able to cope with any emergency that arises and to send four Korean children and one Greek girl to Junior High School. Without our help they would not be able to go to school; they would not be able to go to work because they are too young; they would just kick their heels around home.

The following example illustrates how intensely the Koreans feel about education and how keen they are to help themselves.

We asked for a detailed report on the Pak ki-jo family and were rather anxious when we heard that the 13-year-old boy was very depressed and listless. It was thought that he could possibly have TB. The SCF immediately had the boy X-rayed and we were relieved to hear that his depression was simply due to his frustration at being unable to go to High School. The SCF suggested that the boy try for a night school education but the entrance fees alone came to \$6 and the family could not afford this. The boy started to hawk ice cream and by working long hours managed to earn 20 cents a day. However, we have now sent the money for him to go to day school as it is really impossible for a boy or girl to learn at night after a hard day's work.

★ ★ ★

The three outstanding events of the year have been the "Fashion Parade" compered by Mme. Terri-ble, the Wheelbarrow Derby and the Motor Car Rally (see page 13).

The "Fashion Parade" defies description and nobody thought to take any photos but Miss Spence saved the day with the Wheelbarrow Derby.

The school was slightly puzzled when Miss Corston read out the notices; they were mystified when one of the prefects marched in ringing a bell; they were shocked rotten when the Deputy Principal arrived at Assembly in a wheelbarrow. However, it was not quite as bad as it looked because Mr Morton looked quite solemn and wore his gown and a crash helmet. Latecomers

who missed Assembly were furious! On the actual day of the Wheelbarrow Derby the school was rocked rigid when two staff members led the entries round the neighbourhood in a motorised variation on the theme. Neighbours gasped and hurriedly hauled their children off the streets as the "wheelbarrows" hurtled at breakneck speed around the corners. It rained and the only entry that managed to keep dry was part of the Alice in Wonderland entry. The Mad Hatter got drenched, of course, but the March Hare was dry and snug inside the teapot. I don't know who won.

The Car Rally which was held on the afternoon of Rutherford Day was a very praiseworthy effort on the part of Len Duck and Graham Cater. Their organisation was very efficient and the \$30 they raised was very welcome. Actually one of the aims in running the Car Rally was to show how reliable and trustworthy teenage drivers are. Those disqualified for reckless and dangerous driving were Alan Donaldson, who nearly rolled his car; Robert Young, who nearly knocked over an old lady; and P. Wright, who hugged the centre of the road at a speed of about 60. The winner, Lindsay Barr, is a very good driver — so HIS parents can relax.

There were check points along the way and part of the test was to see how well drivers and navigators could follow written instructions. All went well except that one of the instructions was to turn right at the sign "Junction Ahead — Slow." The Council had removed the sign the day before! ★ ★

This year the mother of one of our Hongkong children came to the Centre and said that she thought that she could manage on her own now as her health had improved and one of her daughters was working. She felt that there were other people who needed help more. We were very impressed with her unselfish attitude and were very pleased that we had been able to help her through the period in which she needed help so desperately.

We decided to be a little more daring and take a Swazi boy at the Evelyn Baring High School. This school was once a "Europeans only" school but last year a number of Swazi boys were taken in as boarders. The aim is to give these boys a good education so that they will provide a nucleus of well educated men who will help to keep their emerging country on straight and stable lines.



Although many of the European pupils left the school there are still some with sufficient faith in the school's future who remained. Our Edward writes very good English and assures us that he does not believe in witch doctors.

Here is Song-sil, one of the Paks, who is just dying to write to you.
Dear Adopted Parents,

I am Song-sil. I am in Grade 6 primary school. Every time my sister received a letter from you I wanted to write to you so I asked mother to let me write the thank-you letter for the parcel which we received a few days ago. Mother agreed, so I am writing this letter with pleasure.

Mother received the parcel on April 17. When I came back from school, I found two overcoats which fitted me well, so my twin sister Jong-sil and I wear them. My family were very pleased to see so many clothes. At school I belong to the choir. When my teacher and my friends ask me to sing I sing the song about mother. The reason I choose that song especially is because my mother works so hard to support us. I think that you are

also my mothers. The only way I can pay back the efforts of all my mothers is to study hard and to be a good girl. I think I must say thank you again. Even though you have not seen us you help us. Whenever we get the parcels and the money my mother always tells me to be a girl who helps others and I have made up my mind to be so.

My mother remade the clothes which you sent us and when I go to school in these clothes my friends always say that we must be rich. Then I am so happy.

The Library

The new free-standing library is under construction at the front of the school and should be ready early in the first term. This is the third move of the library but the new building will have substantial advantages over the former two. To list a few: it will have wall to wall carpet; it will have study carrels which will provide semi-private, well-lit study facilities for 6th formers; it will be square with a mezzanine floor for some of the 6th forms carrels.

These and many other improvements should ensure that the library plays an even more central part in the life of the school. Mrs Parker and the library committee are as eager for the move as Mrs Miller is, no doubt, to move into the present library rooms which are to become a commercial suite.

The rapid expansion of the school library has not been without its problems. Although the book stock has increased enormously, so has the number of staff and pupils using it. The library committee have had to work harder than ever to cope with the increasing demands and we are most grateful to them for the smooth functioning of the library and the tremendous effort they have put into processing, repairing and issuing the books. Once again we are particularly grateful to Mrs Parker for the personal interest she takes

in the pupils and for her incredible efficiency and knowledge of the books.

Next year Mr Regan will replace Mr Woods as Teacher-librarian. We pledge him our utmost co-operation and wish him joy in the new library.

PUBLIC SPEAKING

His obvious sincerity and conviction, together with a real and unusual ability for trying to convince and persuade his audience, enabled him to win the senior section — for the first time since Rutherford has been taking part in it. Our congratulations go to him for this well-deserved achievement.

SCHOOL CONCERT

This year the concert was held on two nights, and proved to be a most successful entertainment for large audiences on both occasions. The school orchestra, choir, clarinet group, gymnastic and rhythmical groups formed the basis of the first half and were most enthusiastically received.

When the rumour went round that the concert was only a fortnight away a remarkable array of individual and group talent came forward to be auditioned. It is a pity we could not have used everyone, as the pleasure the audience showed in all the first-half items indicates the standard of performance that these people have all achieved.

Perhaps the most unusual item was the ballet — classical, of course — danced by the intellectual, cultural, social elite of the school. The magnificent pas de deux from Swan Lake — what lyrical charm, what poignancy, in that superb spectacle of harmony and exquisite poise. A pity the Prima Ballerina was unobtainable; but no one who was privileged to be present could have failed to be moved by the ease and artistry with which the Hero carried the first half of the concert to a triumphant conclusion.

The second half of the concert was a most enjoyable performance of "Trial by Jury." All who saw it were most impressed, not only by the talent and enthusiasm of the performers, but also by the evidence of the long and painstaking work of both staff and pupils involved in it.

There are many people who never appear on the stage and yet are essential to the success of a concert — lighting crew, stage hands and make-up helpers to mention just a few. To all these people, as well as to the performers, hearty congratulations are due for two most entertaining evenings.

OPERETTAS

An innovation in the musical life of Rutherford this year has been the successful production of

two one-act operettas — one in the first term and the other as the second half of the Annual Concert in October. As several staff members expressed their willingness to help, rather tentative plans were laid for the first production. Auditions were held and from the eighty-odd applicants a cast of about sixty (including eight principals) was selected. Then, despite a number of Job's comforters who declared — very helpfully — that this sort of thing would never "go down" at Rutherford, rehearsals for "Pirate Ship Petticoat" commenced. These were held during lunch hours, after school or during weekends, and culminated in two performances — one for the school and an evening one in the last week of the first term. Greatly aided by Mr Reid's very attractive setting "Pirate Ship Petticoat" had such a wonderful launching that further plans for the more difficult "Trial by Jury" were set in motion immediately. This time the cast had no misgivings about the possibility of performing an operetta in this district and set to work very enthusiastically. By the end of the second term the production was well under way except that, having a jury to contend with, we found ourselves short of the requisite "twelve good men and true." Disaster stared us in the face — but not for long. With a little persuasion (probably some extreme form of torture) from Mr Woods, several 6A boys stepped into the breach, learned their music, words and movement as quickly as possible and on opening night we had as handsome and upstanding a jury as one could wish for.

Outstanding in the cast of "Trial by Jury" were Vicki Skillman, an attractive, apparently-innocent-but-in-reality-scheming young bride, Gary Burgoyne as the Judge, Trevor Stacey as the Usher, Simon Trevethick as the Counsel for the Plaintiff, and as the dashing, but unscrupulous defendant Richard Marriott thoroughly enjoyed himself flirting with "this young lady today and the other tomorrow." A bevy of beautiful bridesmaids, together with an enthusiastic girls' chorus added greatly to the finished production. The skilful accompaniment provided by Miss Blyth, assisted by a small orchestra of senior pupils, further enhanced both "Trial by Jury" and "Pirate Ship Petticoat."

For next year plans are already afoot for another operetta — I wonder what?

THE ORCHESTRA

Although there was a small core of more experienced players, the orchestra this year has been made up largely of beginners who have supplied in enthusiasm what they lacked in technique.

Regular rehearsals were held throughout the year commencing with the experienced members and incorporating the beginners when they were sufficiently competent. The scope of the orchestra has also been increased by the establishing of classes for clarinet and trumpet and by the reinstating of the 'cello class. Next year we hope to add trombones (not 76 this time) and in future years we may be able gradually to add flutes, double bass and percussion. In addition to the accompaniment which senior orchestra members gave to the operettas the whole orchestra performed at the Annual Concert. This year the personnel numbered 23 but with the purchase of new instruments and the enlarging of the existing classes with next year's beginners, we may in one or two years' time be able to assemble a group of double the number.

At least she is honest and that is not a bad start. In fact most of the contributions were, and although some of the essays were rather conventional, there was a refreshing lack of artificiality of the kind this poet mistakenly thought her teacher wanted. There are all too few occasions in school when pupils articulate what they feel about the world around them: this was one of them. If more had realised this there would probably have been more offerings and even better ones.

In this year's work various themes and influences stand out. There were the usual nature poems, mostly good. Though there were many bush fires, there was a welcome absence of haunted houses, moors and oak trees. But I suspect that not many of us have actually seen a bush fire and that this, too, was based on second-hand experience. It is a pity if what we watch on television at night is more real to us than what we see walking to school in the mornings, or at the beach during the weekends.

There was also the recurring theme of loneliness:

The mist, the wind, the hard pouring rain,

But this theme was often seasoned with the Beatles — Bob Dylan flavour; retreat or rejection of a complicated disillusioning world of economic insecurity, adult hypocrisy and violence; the image being lost in the crowd, someone fleetingly calls your name — but tenderness is crushed by the city's press.

Contributors responses to these things was not always direct. Some of it was borrowed experience from books and songs.

But the two main reactions to our modern world's dazzling blaze of neon and napalm are with us at Rutherford. The first:

There were others, too. Often the protest and disillusion were expressed more stridently, and so they were less well-formed and less effective than "Black Plea." But they were pleas — there was always a spark of hope that,

*"things are getting better,
 a little better all the time.
 (It can't get no worse)"*

And the other reaction? Some of the violence found itself into battles of the elements and storms, but "Stop the world I want to get off" was a catchy title that sums up the second reaction best. At present the influence of the flower-people shows itself mainly in a vague interest in dreams, vague freedoms and colour — especially colour. But the appeal the latter-day Ophelias dispensing flowers in an ugly world is strong — though New Zealand's involvement in "such areas" is small for the time being.

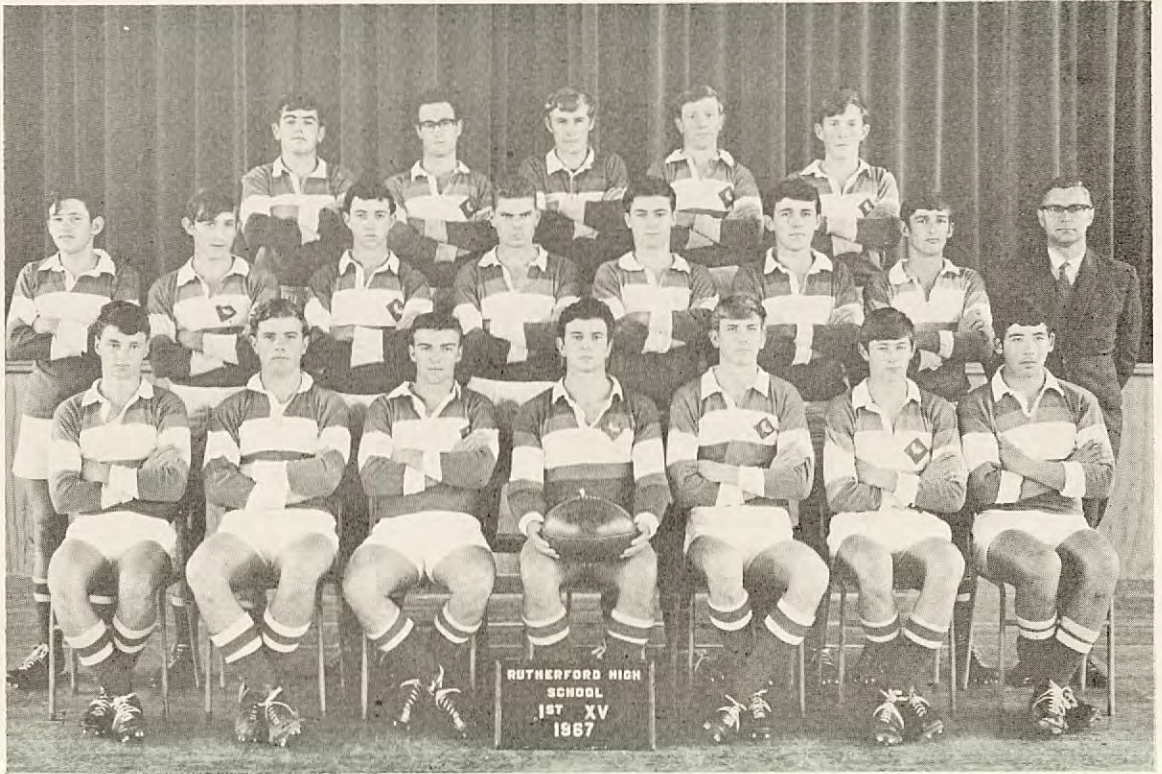
