Editorial . . .

Ringbarked trees, screws missing, broken locker doors, rows of pasty faces staring dumbly from seats under which are heaps of rotten apple cores and mouldering sandwiches. This may be an exaggerated and cynical picture of the average New Zealand secondary school, but it has enough truth in it to hurt. Too many of our brighter pupils are bored; too many of our less able pupils are bewildered and bored.

The origin of this lies deep in the heart of New Zealand society. We want education on the cheap; mass production; the factory system. Our schools all look the same because it is more expensive to design different ones with individuality. Schools are understaffed with large classes and inadequate equipment.

What is needed is an imaginative re-thinking and replanning. We are far too reactionary in our ideas about education. Schools try to prepare the pupils for the world as it was, as it is, but rarely for the world as it will be. Only slowly are old curricula changed. Few teachers acknowledge that they are preparing pupils for an uncertain future. The complete body of scientific knowledge, it is estimated, has been doubled in the last ten years, yet how different is the average fourth form course from that of ten years ago? And surely this rate of change outside the school is going to accelerate. Schools need to provide a basic framework into which these changes can be fitted. Pupils must be educated so that they are adaptable, prepared for an uncertain future. Pupils who understand the purpose of their lessons and acknowledge the relevance of them will not be so easily bored. One thing they can be sure of is that there will be fewer and fewer jobs for the unskilled and the uneducated.

Thus it is vital for New Zealand that education is re-examined. What has been aimed at in the past cannot be expected to meet the present situation. The pace and breadth must be expanded. There must be greater awareness of the present race between education and catastrophe.

STAFF NOTES

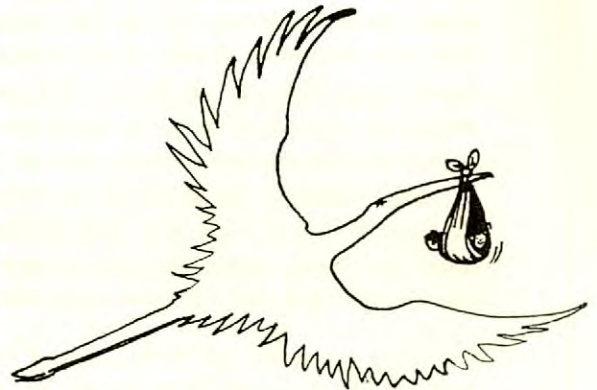

PRIZE GIVING, 1967

The Annual Report was presented by Mr Clark, who spoke about the fantastic growth of the school and the need for long term planning by the Government so that large schools were properly designed and organised. He realized that the idea of having schools of about 2,000 was not one which appealed to New Zealanders lest the schools became impersonal; but economic necessity now made it imperative. He drew attention to some of the advantages, for example, in the range of subjects large schools could offer yet retain economic class sizes.

Mr Clark then spoke of the grave shortage of secondary school teachers. Schools could do without elaborate buildings if they had to, he said, but they could not function efficiently without the manpower. They must have a sufficient number of sound teachers.

The Sports Awards were presented by Mrs Siegert, and the Academic Awards by Mr J. Colvin and Mr O. Jones.

Rutherford Memorial Day

Rutherford Day this year was especially pleasant, being the only fine, warm day in a very miserable season. Sir Ronald Algie was the guest speaker.

As usual, there were also guests from the Air Base and the Past Pupils' Association, and wives and husbands of staff members. We were especially delighted to have with us two people previously on the staff — Mr Barton and Mrs Riwai.

Mr Clark began the ceremony with a brief mention of the greatness of Lord Rutherford, his intense enjoyment of life and the remarkable discoveries he made with relatively primitive equipment.

Sir Ronald Algie has been a notable figure in New Zealand life for many years, having been a professor at Auckland University College, M.P. for Remuera, Minister of Education and Speaker of the House of Representatives. He is still an impressive and entertaining speaker, as we discovered. He, too, paid tribute to Lord Rutherford, mentioning especially his boyishness of spirit and zest for life, coupled with a high sense of responsibility, essential for success.

A point of particular interest was a list which Sir Ronald showed the school. It contained the

names of 160 New Zealanders who had, like Rutherford, left this country, and had been outstandingly successful overseas. Included in this list were forty-two University professors and eight High Court judges. The so-called 'brain-drain', therefore, was not necessarily a bad thing, for it allowed men and women of great ability to use it in a wider sphere and develop it by greater challenge.

Sir Ronald suggested that in these early years of the school we should begin a log-book of important names and events — a record of 'School Greats'. This idea is under consideration now.

Finally he encouraged the pupils to be ambitious and to make the most of their ability. Sir Ronald concluded with the words: "The game is worth the candle. Your inheritance is the name and reputation of Rutherford."

The ceremony was lightened by the school singing under the baton of Mr Holibar — "Land of Hope and Glory" and a song from "Pinafore".

Afterwards the Homecraft Department, directed by Miss M. McKenzie and Miss J. McKenzie served staff and guests with a splendid lunch.

Thanks to the co-operation of all concerned, Rutherford Day was again a successful and significant event.

THE SCHOOL ORCHESTRA, 1968

This year the school orchestra comprised sixteen players (2 trumpets, 3 clarinets, 1 trombone, 1 French horn, 7 violins, 1 'cello and a piano). Outside tuition was given by Mr Hopkins for the woodwind, Mr Dixon for the brass, Mr Hubscher for the violins and (for part of the year) Mrs Trevethick for the 'cellos. The orchestra was under the direction of Mr Holibar.

This small, though enthusiastci, group met each Wednesday lunchtime to rehearse. Because of the level of ability of some of the players, the music chosen was sometimes of more limited musical value than could have been desired, but this did not deter the pupils who were determined to enjoy even the simpler pieces.

The orchestra performed an item at the school's Annual Concert and a few select players were asked to join with the adult players, who formed the orchestra for the school's production of Gilbert and Sullivan's operetta "H.M.S. Pinafore" under the direction of Mr Holibar.

Altogether the orchestra's year has been a successful one, although wet and short lunch-hours and the abolition of a free club period once a week have hampered its progress. Next year, however, the orchestra should be strengthened in numbers, for more pupils have been taught during the course of the year and will then be up to the standard required for joining.

Our Sponsorship Scheme

We have been asked on many occasions whether we have picked out the most intelligent girls and boys to sponsor. The idea that is always behind this question is that an intelligent person is going to make more of a contribution to his country, and therefore our help will be more worthwhile than if we helped someone less intelligent. The answer to this is that we make no effort at all to assess the intelligence of the children we propose to sponsor. There are two reasons for this. First, nearly all SCF children appear dull to average and most don't do very well at school — until they have had good regular meals for a while. Then some start to surge ahead in their studies. Stories about starving children studying and passing examinations are myths. One of the symptoms of hunger is an inability to concentrate and the SCF policy of supplying a mid-day meal at some schools in poorer countries has had dramatic results. Secondly, the best citizens and most worthwhile people are not necessarily in the highest IQ grouping. Our children are chosen according to need.

This year we have said goodbye to three more of our children. Rosa Sparta, our Italian girl, whom we have sponsored for five years, no longer needs our help as she has started working. Emilie Perivolaraki, one of our Greek girls, has been taken over by one of our old pupils, Mary Griffen. When Mary was at school her form sponsored Emilie and Mary became interested in her letters and case history. We have to sadly report that we have "lost" Mahmut, our Turkish boy. His house was pulled down by the local authorities, the mother and children taken elsewhere and although extensive inquiries have been made the family cannot be traced.

After some thought we have decided not to replace those sponsored children with new ones. Costs are rising overseas more quickly than they are rising in New Zealand and as some of our children will need extensive help with their education and medical and living expenses we have decided to do the best we can for our remaining ten children and if there is any money over in any year we can give it to special appeals. This year, apart from helping our eleven sponsored children, we have given substantial donations to help the starving Biafran children and to buy equipment for the Sir Walter Nash project in Viet Nam.

Now what of the children we have left?

Hwang Jong Oh, one of our Korean children, is doing very well at Junior High School. Jong Oh is an orphan with no near relatives and is completely dependant upon us for his food and education. Jong Oh has turned out to be very intelligent and is near the top of his class. He hopes to be a doctor with our continued help.

Edward Nxulmo from Swaziland is also a bright boy and in his letters to Carol Harris he confides that he hopes to further his career in science and to win a scholarship to England.

We are sponsoring three of the children from the Pak ki jo family and hope that this year the twins will pass their entrance examination to Junior High School. The SCF administrator reported to us that this is one of the best SCF families; they really try hard to improve their standard of living and to do the best they can for their children.

In the Lee Yong ki "family" the eldest brother is still unable to work as he has TB. The next two children aged 16 and 17 have very poorly paid jobs and the only income for the family is from these two and the sponsorship money we send.

In Hong Kong we have Chiu Wai Mui, who is working well at school and hopes next year to win a place at Secondary School. Lau Loi Tae is another Hong Kong girl who will either be going to work or on to Secondary School very soon.

Arthur Steele's mother is still trying to get the family out of India. At the moment she is trying Australia but is not very hopeful of being granted permission to enter.

In Greece we have Efthimia Adrahta whose health has shown a tremendous improvement since we have been sponsoring her. She is now attending Technical High School.

Our income this year will be more than \$2,000. Most of it has come as usual from the 2½ cents a week that our members pay but a large part of it has been raised by concerts, stalls, a wheelbarrow race, and the sale of tea coupons and waste paper. We would like to give special thanks to 6BI, 4F and 3I, our three most enterprising classes, for their efforts in this direction. Finally, I would like to thank Paulette Lendich who has been sewing furiously all year and who has made us 30 babies' dresses and romper suits.

They were, and their arrival gave the signal for a scurrying of waiters to and from room 9, only this afternoon the music room and now a very efficient kitchen.

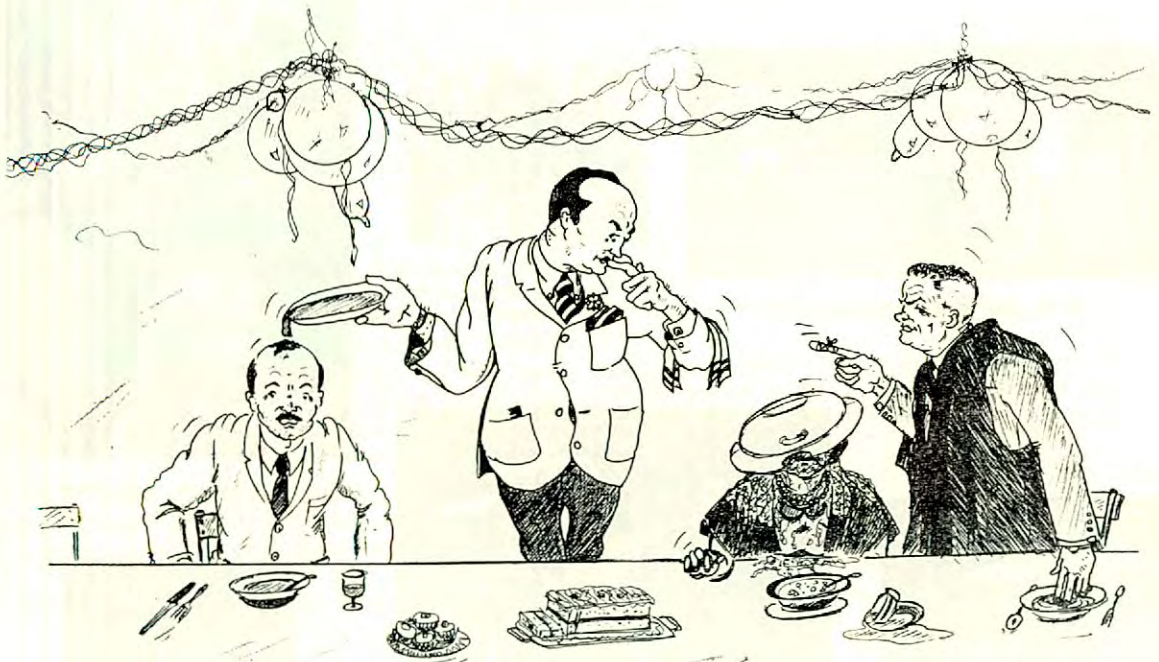

The peasant girls and Nociarello (played by Nancy Bright, Denise Pritchard, Lynette Cowley and Larry Berry), all acted well and contributed much to the atmosphere and comic situations. Similarly, Ian Hogg, Greg Shanaghan and Scott Franklin performed well and helped underline the troubles between the main characters, while Robert Green's gawking idiocy and maniacal laugh added much; his scene with Zi Dima mending the jar was especially good.

Paul Joass portrayed a splendid bullying, blustering Don Lolo and Neil McGregor as his hunchbacked adversary, Zi Dima, acted intelligently and entertainingly. Trying to keep the peace between these two was Reg Iotua, who took the part of the lawyer, acting and improvising with great confidence.

SCHOOL OPERETTA

This year the school operetta was Gilbert and Sullivan's "H.M.S. Pinafore", which was a tremendous success. The show was produced by Mr Holibar, assisted by various members of staff including Mr Reid, who created a very realistic set, and Miss J. McKenzie, who organized the girls' colourful costumes. The authentic navy uniforms worn by the boys were kindly loaned by the Royal N.Z. Navy. The eight main characters all contributed to the success of the show. Anne Fisher, as Josephine, acted and sang consistently well and was ably partnered by Ian Smith as Ralph, while Gary Burgoyne (Captain Corcoran) and Christine Cottle (Buttercup) added many humorous touches during the course of their middle-aged love affair. The three performances of "H.M.S. Pinafore" took place in the School Hall during the last week of the second term before full and appreciative audiences.

Because of the success of this year's operetta, plans are already under way for "The Mikado" during 1969.

LANGUAGES EVENING

And 5(c) French ended the evening with another classroom scene where bored pupils, tired of listening to Offenbach's Can Can, got up and actually danced in a swirl of legs and petticoats.

Then followed what for many was the most enjoyable part of the evening: the supper. Faced with an array of beautiful food, you hardly knew what to choose. You soon found the poisson cru (raw fish) was much more appetizing than it sounded. The Husar Salat was mouth-watering and the meat balls delicious once you found out they weren't really snails. There were genuine continental cheeses and bread and scrumptious

apple strudels and, if you were still hungry, plates and plates of gateaux brought by the students themselves.

After this we staggered with full stomachs back into the café where some energetic people tried to dance. This was soon abandoned in favour of the less energetic activity of singing, and to the strains of La Marseillaise the evening ended.

PHOTOGRAPHIC CLUB

In the second term a Photographic Club was formed. After a few preliminary meetings in Room 61 we moved to the bookroom in the Technical Block. SOUTH ISLAND FIELD TRIP

Thursday, May 2nd at 6 o'clock on a foggy and chilly morning, six teachers (Mr and Mrs Riwai, Mr and Mrs Sinclair, Miss McKenzie and Mr Cumming), Harold, our cheerful card-happy chauffeur, and most important, 29 well-behaved students, up long before the sun, set off for the windy capital city.

That first night, Wellington lived up to its blustery name and even turned off its electricity for us, so we shivered and waited until a late hour for our dinner.

The next day proved a disappointment for those who had been cherishing the thought of becoming the heroes of a Wahine-type disaster — the clear skies and bewitching lack of wind laid low their hopes. In fact, the crossing was perfect and quite windless — a wonderful example for geography students of the funnel effect of Cook Strait! The fantastic shoreline of Queen Charlotte Sound passed and we arrived in Picton, quite healthy and full of vigour. The Library

This year has been a most significant one for the library. In May we made the move into what is hoped to be the permanent library building, a 3,100 sq. ft. building occupying an important site at the front of the school.

Inside the library we have managed to create a peaceful atmosphere. The carpeted floor and the acoustics tiles on walls and ceiling help to keep noise to a minimum. Bright plastic chairs and examples of pupils' art on the walls have assisted in producing an area of the school which is both inviting and functional. Numerous visitors calling to see the new building have been impressed by the attractiveness of the interior.

Mrs Parker has again been of inestimable value in the library. We are extremely fortunate to have a person so knowledgeable about books and so willing to do more than is expected of her in order to keep the library running efficiently. The school librarians, too, under the control of Evan White have worked very hard to maintain the standards of service that have been established in previous years. In realising that this work is entirely voluntary and unpaid, we should be most grateful for the efforts they put into their work for our benefit.

The book stock has again increased dramatically. We have been able to add 1,450 more books to the library, covering a very wide range of interest in both fiction and non-fiction.

Donations from pupils leaving school, from parents and interested groups continue to be generously contributed, as the list published elsewhere in the magazine testifies. Every pupil who leaves is now asked to consider donating a book to the library, and more are doing so.

Both staff and pupils have made full use of the library, especially since the new building has been opened. Besides the normal library periods, more staff now are bringing their classes to use the reference materials available in the library, while during lunchtime we often had 130 inside and another 20 or so waiting outside.

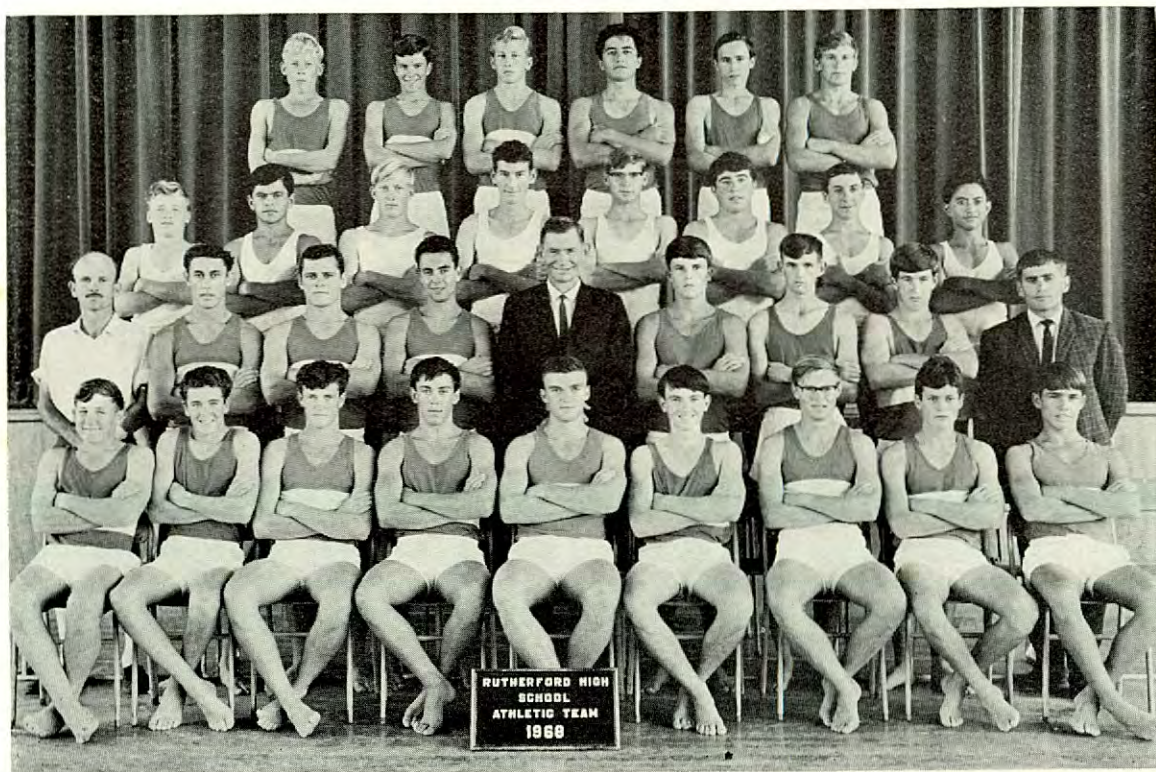

The 1968 1st XV was one of the most successful fielded by Rutherford. The team was well prepared for the competition, with five pre-season games and a two-day training session at Piha. All these, especially the Piha trip, were valuable for building up fitness and team spirit. We finished runners-up to St Paul's in the B grade with 8 wins, 2 losses and 1 draw, scoring 126 points for and 50 against. We lost against only one of the A grade teams we played.

A feature of the team's play was the hard, fast and penetrating running by the backs, who scored all but one of the tries. The forwards for their part worked hard and supplied a reasonable amount of good ball against taller opponents.

The best game was our 8-6 win over B grade winners St Paul's, their only loss of the season. Most of the credit for this win must go to the forwards, who contained and outlasted a powerful St Paul's pack which had two Auckland Secondary School representatives. The backs did not make full use of all the possession gained until late in the game, when we were down 0-6, and then they scored two sweeping tries on either wing, and converted one making it 8-6. R. In the trials Sinton and Carrington were selected and Carrington was appointed captain of the team.

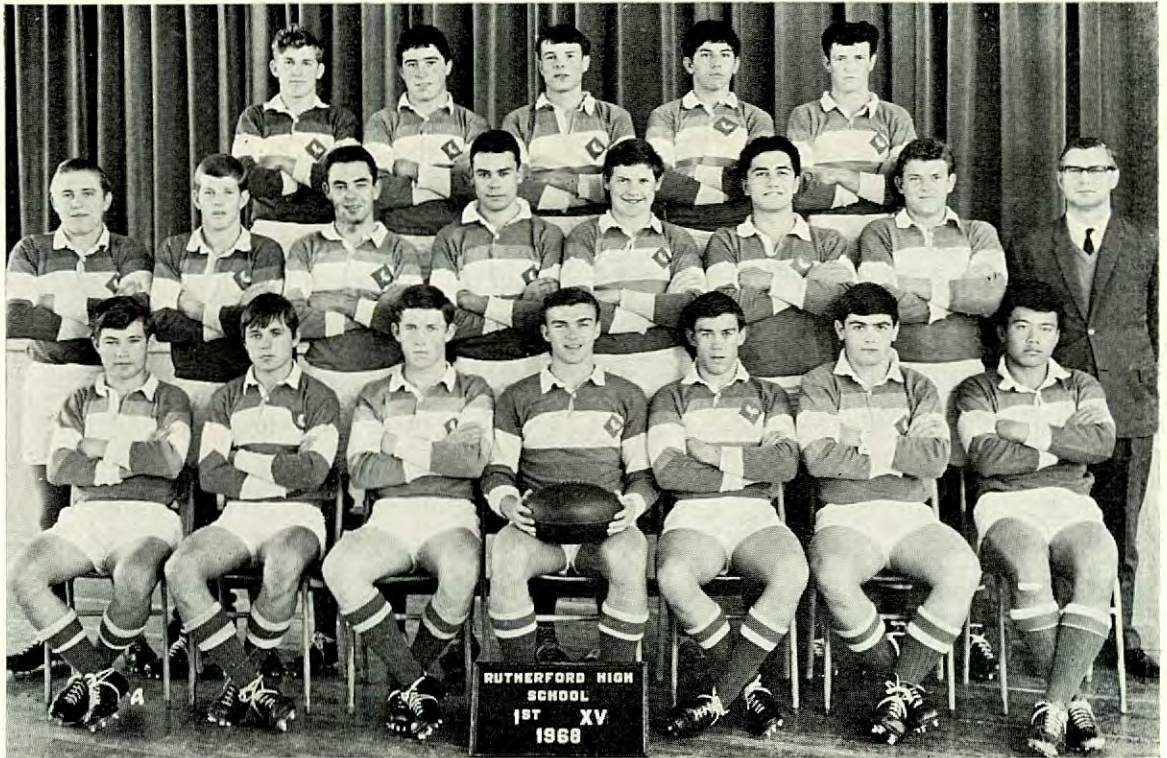

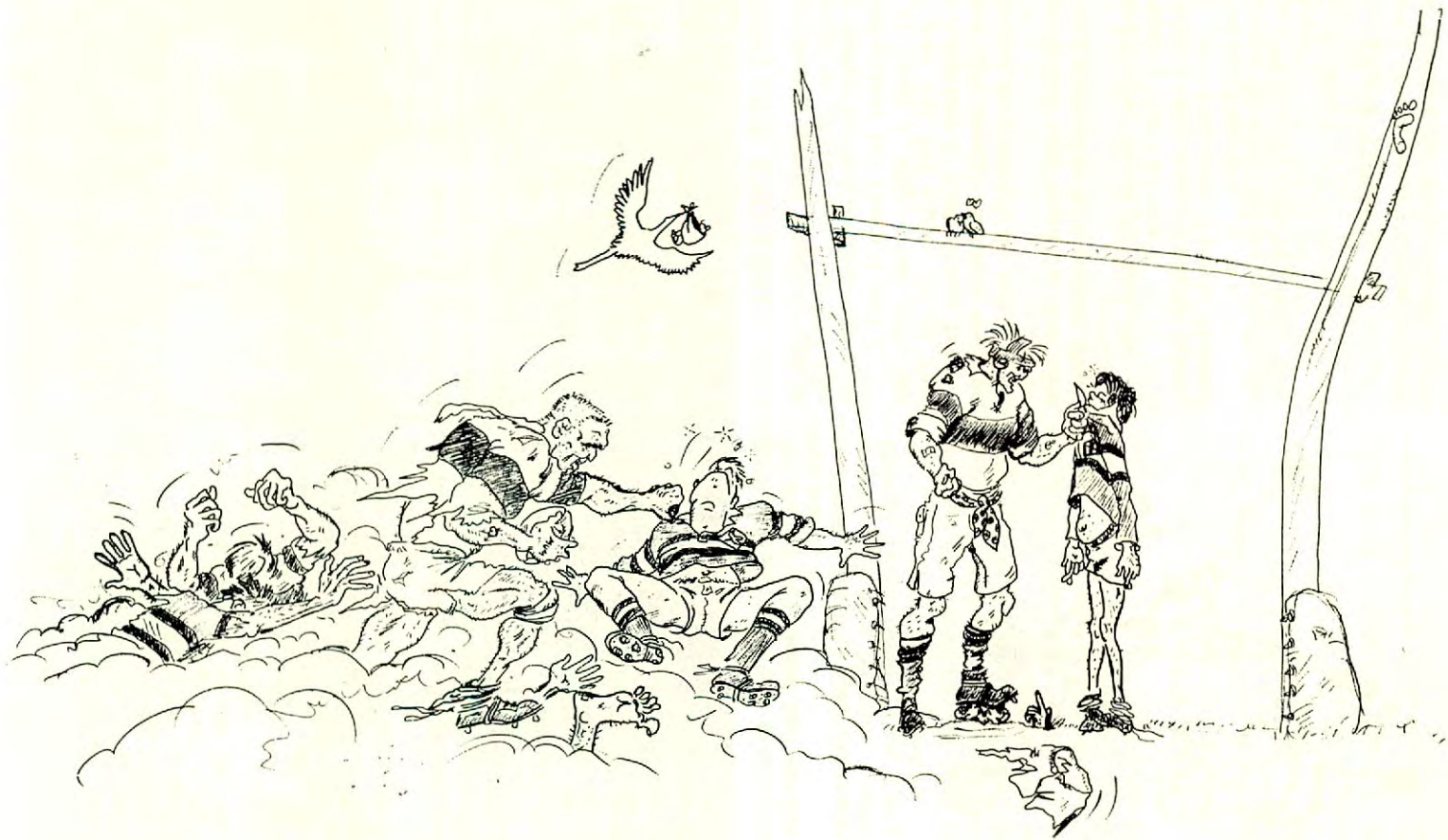

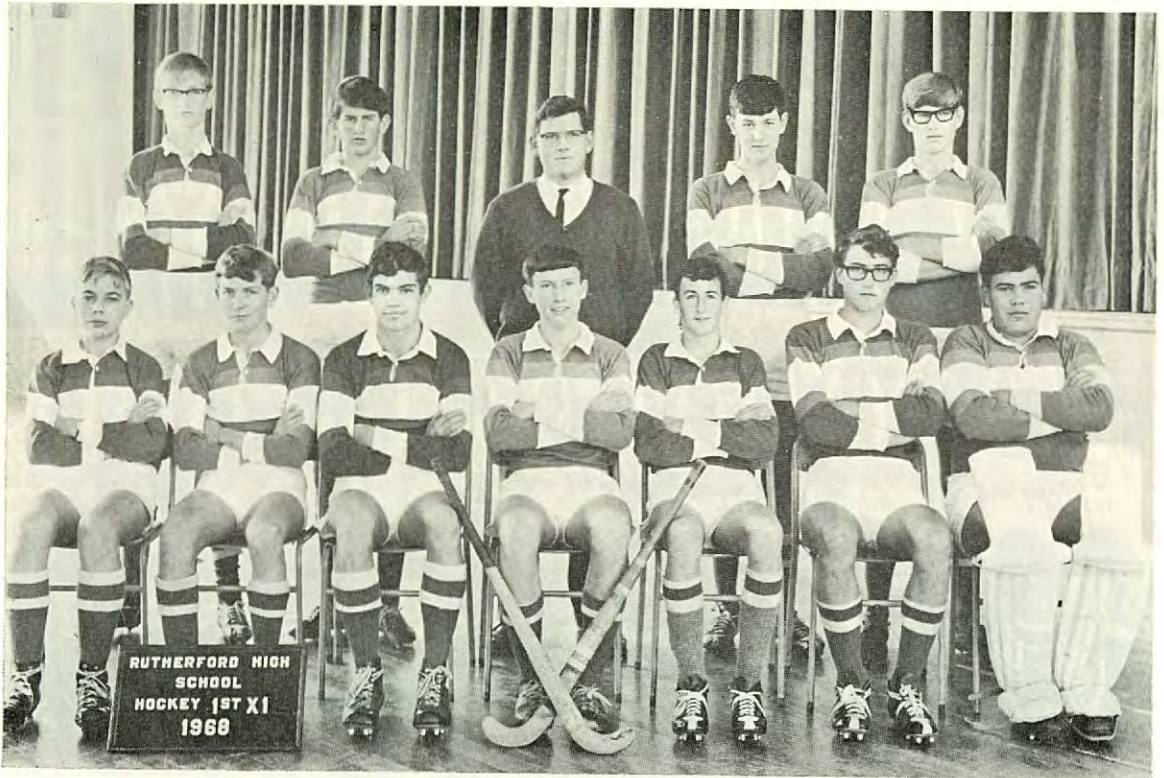
