Editorial . . .

Protests are so much in the public eye and ear these days that it is almost becoming fashionable to protest about one's right to protest — and this leads many to suspect that protesters are more interested in asserting the right to protest than in the causes they are ostensibly espousing. This suspicion is understandably engendered by those protests which take the form of noisy and often belligerent demonstrations.

A demonstration is a legitimate way of presenting a cause to the public and to the appropriate authorities. But demonstrations are earning a bad name for themselves. Far from winning public sympathy, a demonstration frequently prejudices the public against the cause before it is given a hearing. Why is this?

Many protests fail to gain public support because they are associated with violence and vandalism. Those who attend the demonstrations do so not out of a belief in a cause, but because of the excuse provided for fisticuffs, rock and bottle hurling, and drunken obscenities. The small number of dedicated persons who start a demonstration with the best of motives may not anticipate the extent to which their numbers will be swollen by inquisitive and excitable bystanders, eager for a chance to undermine established principles of civility and decency, and with little real interest in, or even knowledge of, the subject of the protest.

A sensation hungry press must accept responsibility for the fact that disorderly, law-breaking demonstrations are widely publicized, while sober and peaceful (and therefore potentially more effective) demonstrations seldom find their way into the news media.

Demonstrators must keep in mind that if they are seeking public support they must keep within the bounds of behaviour that will be tolerated by the public. Their protests should be well organized, controlled and publicized. As the alternative means of protest—petitions, letters to M.P.'s and editors, etc.—are notoriously ineffectual, the value of demonstrations should not be allowed to fall prev to a dissolute and moronic minority.





Rutherford Memorial Day

"Enter New Zealand, bearing a torch".

These words of Sir Guy Powles, New Zealand's Ombudsman, provided the theme of his address to school on Rutherford Day. Sir Guy, in emphasising New Zealand's place in the world today, captured the interest of his audience, by making relevant to New Zealand the well-known words of Shakespeare: "all the world's a stage . . ." If these words were to be taken literally, then Sir Guy wondered what New Zealand's role should be, and what stage directions would apply to her. His own suggestion was that New Zealand should enter bearing a torch of progress and, having played her part fully in the world scene, she would make her exit from the stage still proudly bearing the torch. This torch, he continued, had been lit by men such as Lord Rutherford, and it was up to each individual to keep this torch alight. Although the average New Zealand citizen could have little control over the production of another Rutherford, he did have a great amount to do with the production of the conditions which might result in the emergence of another Rutherford. These conditions were within four fields: agriculture, social legislation, racial equality, and education. Sir Guy gave special emphasis to the education system which he said must be reformed and amplified. What pleased his audience was the fact that Sir Guy challenged the future rather than regurgitated the past.

Prior to Sir Guy's address, Mr Clark opened the ceremony by welcoming the guests, among whom were Sir Ronald Algie, who was last year's

School Council

One of the most radical changes taking place in the education system is a shift from the traditional teacher-dominated organization of learning to the greater participation of pupils in school organization, and decision-making. Staff and pupils at Rutherford have felt for some time the need for greater involvement of pupils in decisions and activities which affect them, and at Mr Clark's request a staff committee was established last year to investigate ways of bringing about greater pupil involvement. This committee decided that it was impossible for pupils to become more involved unless they had a strong desire to do so, and considerable discussion with pupils took place on the possibility of beginning a school council. At the beginning of this year the committee called a meeting of all pupils interested in a school council, and suggested that they decide on a structure which would suit the needs of the school, and areas of activity a council could usefully undertake.

As a result a group of about a dozen really enthusiastic pupils met in lunch hours for several weeks to gather suggestions, draw up a constitution, and organize the elections for the first school council. These pupils are to be congratulated on the enthusiasm and competence they showed. Without them the council would not have been possible.

of thanks must go to the first chairman of the school council, George Spratt, for his excellent leadership and organization, and to Glenys Lewis, the secretary, for her keeping of minutes and circulating of information. Staff members who attended council meetings and executive committee meetings have been most impressed by the quiet reasonableness and strength which the chairman has shown throughout the year, and by the enthusiasm and efforts of many council members.

Many successes have been achieved by the council. Among the most important tasks they have undertaken have been these:

Organizing:

- Socials for various form levels.
- The Car Rally on Rutherford Day.
- Pupils for the local Corso collection.

Assisting in the organization of:

- The first school ball.
- The wheelbarrow race for the S.C.F.
- Operetta arrangements.
- The school newspaper committee.

Arranging for pupils:

- Lunchhour study rooms for 5th and 6th forms.
- A 6A common room.
- Repair of drinking fountains.
- Erection of notice boards.
- Provision of soap and towels in girls' toilet
- Permission for girls to wear slacks for P.E. in winter.

Two major activities have been their attempts to overcome the problems of litter and vandalism around the school. During the second term they organized an anti-litter campaign which was very effective in improving, temporarily at least, the appearance of the school. Through the discussions of council members with their classes, pupils

During the first term elections were held and have been made more aware of how both litter the council began its meetings. A special vote and vandalism make the school a more uncomfortable place for the pupils themselves, and this should help pupils to prevent some of the mess.

Several sub-committees have been established for investigating complaints about uniforms and grooming checks. Their main problem has been getting enough reasoned and thoughtful response from pupils to build a well-documented case. For instance, only six out of fifteen fifth forms bothered to return a questionnaire that was circulated to them on girls' uniform. Many pupils have criticised the council for lack of action on these matters, but it can be seen very clearly from this instance and others that the main problem is the inability of most pupils to suggest workable alternatives or to support a reasoned case by thinking clearly and passing on their opinions to the council for action.

Next year, returning council members have arranged to meet within the first fortnight to work out a calendar of social events for the year, thus avoiding some of the timing difficulties of this year, and to organize the elections for next year's council.

Although the council members have sometimes found their classes apathetic or unable to bring forward helpful suggestions, the council has had a very successful first year. It is hoped that all pupils will next year take a lively interest in making their council work smoothly. The more pupils show their readiness to think, talk and work on council matters with reasonableness and enthusiasm, the greater the share they will earn in making decisions which will ensure a happy school life.







THE LIBRARY

With the end of this year comes the end of the first full year in the new library, a building playing an important part in the life of the school. Expansion in book stock has been rapid, with over 1,500 new books being added to the library. bringing the total stock to over 11,000 books.

In the reference section, both the arts and science sections have been built up, with increasing use being made of them by senior pupils. The psychology shelves have seen rapid growth with the introduction of Liberal Studies and other non-University Entrance options, largely under the enthusiasm and guidance of Miss Pountney. The fiction section has seen a considerable increase also, in all types from science fiction to easy reading.

This year has also seen continued experimentation in the layout and library system, and we hope to have a permanent arrangement by the end of next year. It has also been necessary to move the main entrance after three panes were broken, due to the blustery wind blowing the doors open. The inconvenience caused during alterations, however, was well worthwhile, as the change of location has remedied the problem.

The brightly coloured chairs, the sanded and revarnished tables and the addition to the pupils' art collection have added to the general brightness of the library.

It is a 91ft. by 67ft. building, equipped with allay the fears of those who think Technical a few of the muscle-building, fat-crushing and





TEAM TEACHING BLOCK

After two years' preliminary planning, the work on the team teaching block is at present under way and the building will be ready for use at the beginning of the 1970 school year.

The lecture theatre is the main feature of the block and will seat 140 pupils. There are no windows and the theatre is completely air-conditioned. A projection box is associated with the room and provision will be made for showing moving films and slides. The room will also have its own overhead projector. Leading off from the theatre itself is a large storage and preparation

Demonstration experiments can be set up on a mobile bench, which may be slid out and placed in position at the front of the lecture room. Provision has been made for water, gas and electricity to be plugged into the movable bench.

The block also has four seminar rooms, each half the size of a normal classroom. After a topic has been introduced to the large group in to accept the standard plan.

the lecture theatre the group may break up into smaller units and move into the seminar rooms for further discussion.

Provision has also been made for seating bays on the south side of the block, so that in good weather seminar groups may be conducted out-

Although the team teaching block is basically a teaching unit, the lecture theatre will prove very valuable for small assemblies and for gathering together groups of up to 140 pupils for lectures by outside speakers.

One great advantage of the lecture theatre is that it will provide the opportunity for more pupils to be taught by senior teachers than would be possible under the conventional classroom arrangement.

The block has been designed by Mr G. J. Ellott and is particularly tailored to the needs of the school. We feel that it is an advantage to have a block built in this way, rather than have



SIXTH FORM DINNER



The School Sports were as usual most enjoyable, with the boys breaking seven records and the girls six. A mere handful of boys went to Pukekohe but made their presence felt. We ran out easy winners in the Western Zone and were fourth (unofficially) in the Champion's meeting. At Mt. Smart the girls gained placings but did not do as well as we hoped. However, the Junior Cross Country team ran magnificently to gain 3rd place in the A grade and the Relays team was 6th, but only one point behind 4th in the A Grade Relays.

Nevertheless, athletes helping to compile this article strongly expressed the view that too many

of our school's representatives thought that they could rely on their natural ability and just a little (sometimes private) training, but were obviously and rather painfully disillusioned when faced with top line competition from athletes who had prepared themselves properly. Undoubtedly, those who train regularly on a proper schedule for months rather than weeks prior to the big day have demonstrated that they get the greatest enjoyment as well as the most success. Small unofficial inter-school meetings have been requested which would provide much interest and enjoyment if difficulties of arrangement can be overcome.

Honours were usually well spread. 
