Editorial . . .

Apathy has been endemic at Rutherford this year. The disease has been found in all aspects of school life, educational, sporting, cultural and social. Attempts have been made along anti-apathy lines — questionnaires have been sent out, agitators have aroused the School Council to belated action, but these people have brought upon themselves the suspicion that they are accusing others of apathy merely as a way of setting themselves above the common mob, and taking one further step up the scale to yet another apathetic rank.

Perhaps our pupils find that this educational establishment is too large, too impersonal, with a serious lack of communication and individual contact, so that its members are rounded up as a bunch of pasty-facers without personality, without individuality, even though with minds; whenever the titbit of opportunity is dangled before them they find it hard to rally together.

Or perhaps they merely mirror the attitudes of the rest of society — a society which previously had to work and fight for all its freedoms, its privileges, its luxuries, but which today, in a time of prosperity and permissiveness, demands little initiative and energy. Hence, within the school we find, as in society at large, indifferent, intolerant dissenters who dislike and knock whatever is provided for them.

In developed countries life is now ordered and worked out for people; they have nothing original to think or do, and it seldom seems to them that they might have something to contribute. A computerized, mechanized world offers only an unaltering, stereotyped pattern of 'subsistence'. An impersonal self-centred attitude that puts little store on inter-personal relationships and creativity of thought and action, develops. The result is apathy. The motto would seem to be, "I want, I won't, and who cares?"

Do we need the cataclysm of another world war, or of an invasion from outer space to stir us from our apathy? Or cannot the cure begin at the beginning — in the schools where the minds and attitudes of the future public are formed?

It is up to the individual — does one come to school to learn, to achieve in the realm of one's ability, for each of us has ability, no matter how deeply it may be hidden beneath layers of reticence, prejudice, and hair; or do we spend our school days, shortened to the extreme, too often, in moaning, leaving litter, shutting our mouths when we should open them, wagging our tongues continually when they would be better stilled, passing the buck and pretending not to care, just biding our time until we get clear of the place?

Our attitudes at school reflect what our lives will be, for although getting out into the world, beginning a career, may be a new start, our personalities still belong to us — and if they have been stifled for years and years of school life, how will they express themselves in this new-found freedom? Are they not already dead beyond repair?

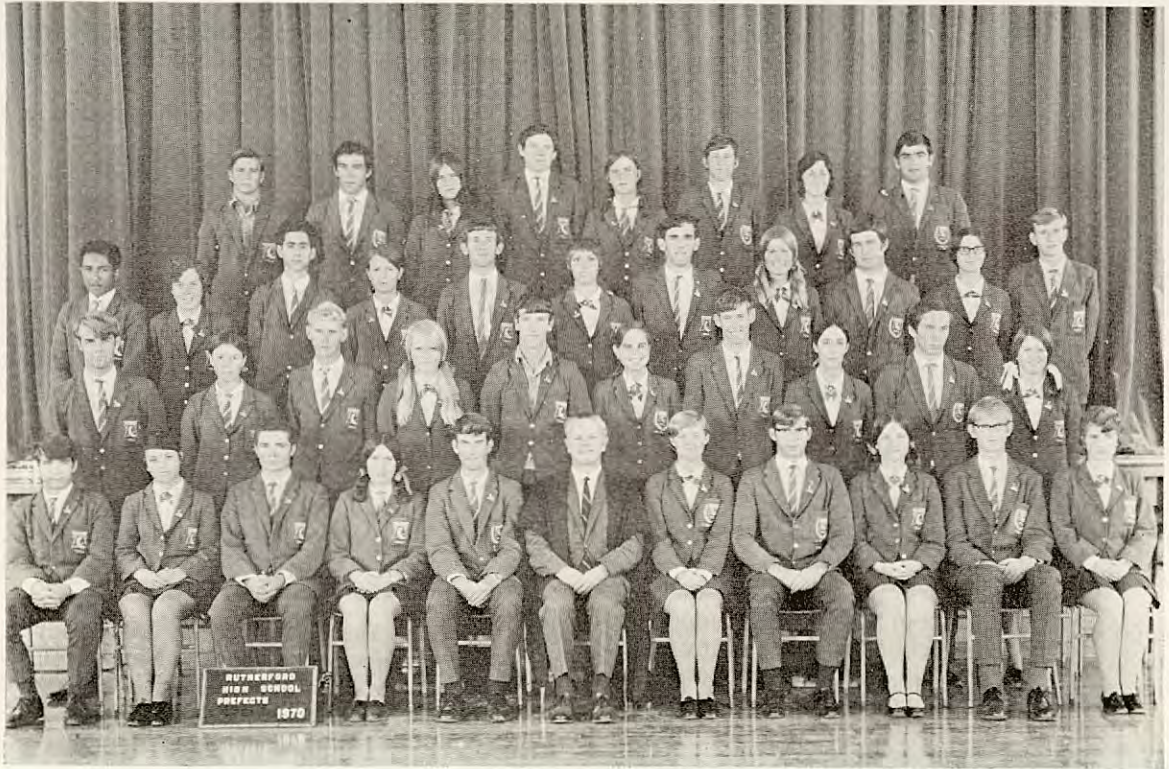

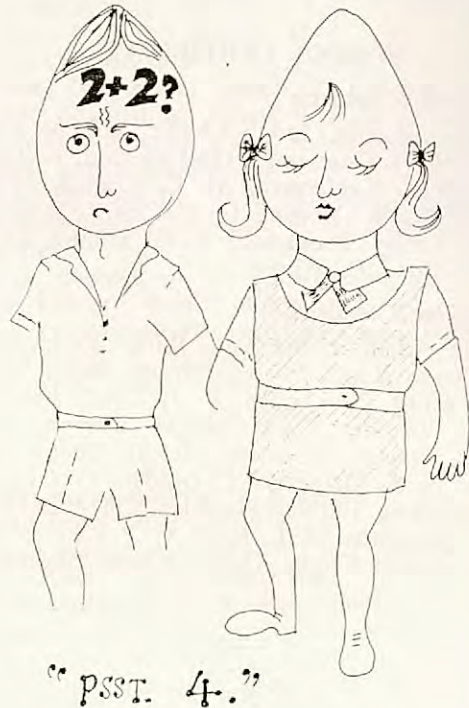

Rutherford Memorial Day

Rutherford Day has now been established as a traditional part of Rutherford life. This year it was again the successful and significant event it has been for the past eight years.

In the traditional way the ceremony was opened by Mr Clark who welcomed the guests among whom were the Right Reverend Bishop Gowing, who was this year's guest speaker, representatives of the Board of Governors, Te Atatu Maori Committee, Past Pupils' Association, Rotary Organisation and wives and husbands of staff members. Mr Clark also mentioned the greatness of Lord Rutherford, echoing the words of Sir Ernest Marsden, one of Rutherford's associates: "Young New Zealanders have never had a

finer example set before them than the life and career of Lord Rutherford."

As Lord Rutherford had made such a renowned contribution to the world in the field of science, it was fitting that Bishop Gowing should consider in his address some other contribution which New Zealand could make to the world. Since the Bishop felt New Zealand had a significant role to play in solving the world's racial conflicts, he chose Racism as his topic. He pointed out three facets of Racism which make it such a degrading factor in our society. These were: first, that it places one race in a superior position to another, secondly, that it leads to oppression, and thirdly, that it necessitates some races being inferior to

others. To illustrate these points, the Bishop referred to the racial situation in South Africa — a situation which he hoped would never arise in this country.

In the past, New Zealand, with its policy of non-discrimination, had a very favourable racial image in the eyes of the world. Here, no-one because of colour is denied the right to vote or to marry whoever one pleases, and there is no government restriction of movement. But Bishop Gowing pointed out that New Zealanders must not only work to maintain and reinforce this position, but they must also be concerned with the situation of other less fortunate countries.

Bishop Gowing expressed a desire for all to have "a vision of the world as a family" with all people, black and white, or "coloured" and "colourless" as he fittingly preferred to say, work-

ing together for the progress of mankind. With this ambition, Bishop Gowing suggested, New Zealand could indeed make a vital contribution to the world.

Bishop Gowing's address was well received by the audience who relayed its relevance to them, and who appreciated the challenge to achieve racial unity.

A lighter touch was added to the ceremony by the pupils singing under the direction of Mr Holibar, "This Land is Your Land", and the Jewish folk-song, "Hahvah Nahgeelah".

Following the ceremony, the staff and guests were served a delicious luncheon prepared under the direction of the Homecraft Department.

Thanks to the co-operation of all concerned, Rutherford Day must again be placed high on the list of successful events in the school year.

Two other boys who depend on our help, are Edward Nxumalo of Swáziland and Arthur Steele of India. Like some of you, Arthur learns French as a second language, but Edward learns Zulu. It's his best subject.

Our income this year has been given a much needed boost by several form efforts. 3H, 3J and 3G ran sweet stalls, 4E a car wash, 3B a soup stall and 4A put on their own special version of Macbeth. 6B2 however, are the best weekly contributors. Paulette Livermore continues to be Rutherford's champion Christmas card seller.

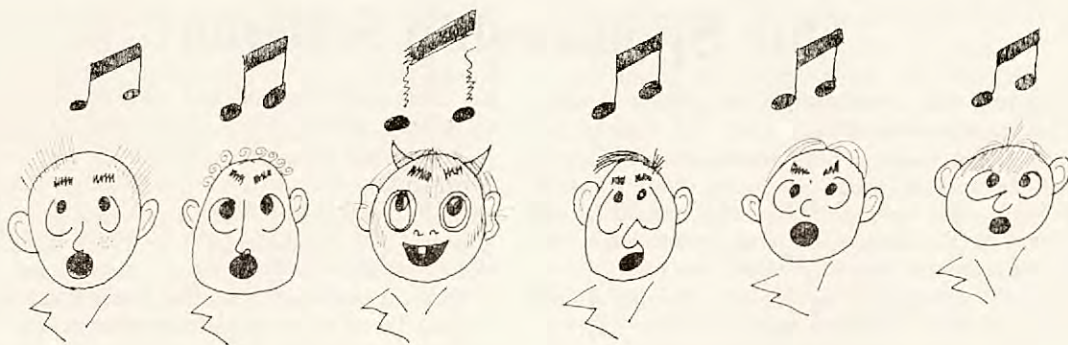
A chorus of about thirty-five fairies and peers of the realm complemented this.

An innovation this year was the use of a full orchestra for the first time. In previous years



an arrangement for reduced orchestra has been used in order not to swamp the light voices of the principals but "Iolanthe" seemed a good chance to try the fuller arrangement and judging from the number of comments the experiment was very successful. The orchestra used was mainly the Rutherford High School Night-Class Orchestra together with some members of the School Orchestra, some ex-pupils and a few interested outsiders. The pianist was Terrence Lascelles.



Two choruses from the operetta were performed as part of the Te Atatu Primary Schools' Festival on 29 September.

In the production of the opera many teachers and pupils helped. Among these were Mrs Stevens, Mrs Parry, Miss Kwan, Miss Barbour and Mr Beckingsale (Chorus Coaches), Mr Reid (Scenery), Mr Needham, Mr Davies, Owen Saunders, Chris Ginders (Stage Managing and Lighting), Mr Sinclair, Glen Adair (Front of House) and Mr Laver (Makeup).

Mr B. J. G. Holibar, for the third year in succession, was producer and musical director. A production of this magnitude required a vast amount of effort and dedication on his part. The sincere thanks of all who benefited from this operetta, whether by participating in it or by enjoying the performance as spectators, are due to Mr Holibar for the many hours of work he put into its production.

SCHOOL PLAY NOTES

This year's school play, "Romanoff and Juliet", by Peter Ustinov, was put on by a cast and stage crew largely composed of last year's Drama Executive, with the help of some newcomers and ex-pupils. After the chaos of rehearsal and preparation, some degree of ability was displayed on the two nights of performance of this political satire, particularly on the final night, when the audience, cast and backstage crew all enjoyed the swing and wit of Ustinov's brilliant writing, which was beautifully framed by Mr Green's visually clever sets. This was the first time that Rutherford has attempted a straight three-act play for a full evening's entertainment, and the Drama Executive hope that this new tradition will continue. Plans are already under way for next year's production, and we hope that, with the help of the many people inside and outside the

school who have already co-operated with us, next 1971's school play will be as resoundingly successful, and will help to spread the idea that drama isn't just School Cert notes on Julius Caesar, but a way of enjoying life, whether as a member of the cast or a member of the audience.

FESTIVAL WEEK

Modern man has fragmented his totality into specialized compartments. He has put his art galleries on a distant hill and made his tools functional. Art is now a Culture-Vulture thing; a mask assumed for a particular occasion — not a living, happening thing. Our Education System reinforces this. The Whole Man is not.

A Festival Time can only be a patchwork affair, a tiny attempt towards integration. Nevertheless, not an insignificant one. A time for exploring and discovering afresh the possibility of the feeling world: the emerging life on the potter's wheel, singing sounds, movement and music, flowers, making things, puppets, plays, things of the hand, the heart, the voice; seeing new things, doing others.

May there be many future such Festivals until the need no longer exists — when Man is Art and Art is in Man.

TEAM TEACHING BLOCK

This year we have had the use of the new specialist block built in 1969. It is a large attractively-designed block which includes a lecture theatre seating 140, seminar rooms, an office and a preparation and store room.

The Team Teaching block is an answer to some new problems in education, particularly in senior classes. Experiments costly in preparation time and material and films on short-term loan are now

practical propositions for the school. New departures can be made in teaching with audio-visual aids, and slide projectors, overhead projectors and movies are regularly in use.

The new block also allows greater flexibility in the use of teaching staff. No longer does one teacher have to cover wide expanses of material; the special interests and research projects of particular teachers can now be used to the full extent. It is a system which benefits both teachers and pupils. The normal method employed is the specialist lecture with class — teacher follow-up, often in the seminar rooms.

We have been using the lecture theatre for some more unorthodox purposes as well. The Student Council delegates find it ideal as their meeting place, and on Thursdays the Open Forum is held there, as an ideal place for open discussion. It has also proven superior to the hall for some small dramatic productions. 4A staged scenes from 'Macbeth' there in the second term, and less formal classroom drama work has been successfully done as part of fifth-form group sessions.

After a year in full use, the block has received no grant from the Education Department for furniture, and it is to be hoped that desks, chairs, teachers' furniture and curtains will be provided by the beginning of next year.



PUBLIC SPEAKING

Open Forum and the School Council have this year provided considerable opportunity for pupils to express opinions, and have made redundant any special club for discussion activities. The benefit of increasing pupil participation in public speaking was seen clearly in the two formal activities of the year — a debate organised by the Junior Chamber of Commerce and the school Speech Contest.

Debate: Mark Rassie, Chris Ginders and Patrick Grubb debated against a Kelston Boys' High School team on the affirmative side of the subject "That royalty improves intra-commonwealth relationships". Although the Rutherford team lost, they spoke most creditably and gained valuable experience from the encounter.

Speech Contest: This year the semi-finals were held in lunch hours, and we were fortunate in having the Team Teaching room as an excellent setting for the contest. Speeches were all of a very high standard, and the improvement over the last two or three years was commented on by the judge of the finals, Mr N. Woods who before becoming First Assistant at Glenfield College was Head of English at Rutherford. We thank him for his willingness to judge the contest, and for his most helpful advice to participants.

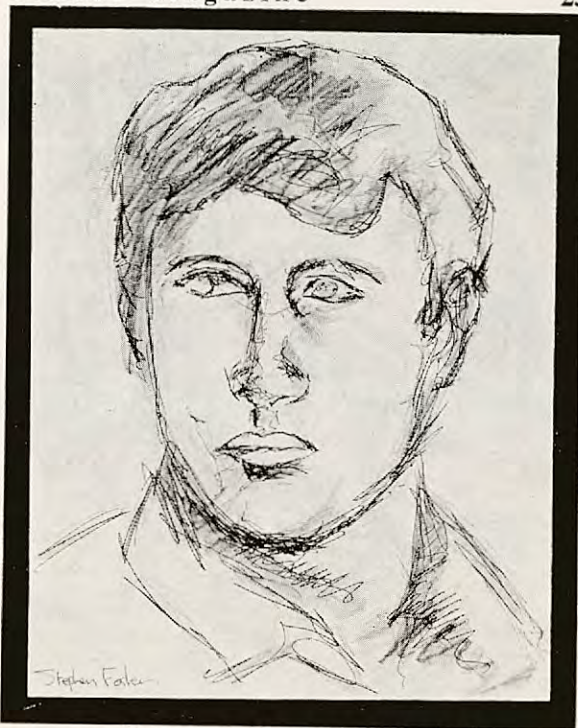

ATHLETICS

Speaking generally there was a slackening of enthusiasm this year. We lacked the well-known stars of recent years. For example, our Auckland record-smasher, Rota Carrington, was troubled by an old injury and did not compete — we wish him well in 1971. The split lunch hours precluded lunch time coaching and bus pupils training after school had to find their own way home. But what was very noticeable was how few were interested in the regular training and coaching that brings health, enjoyment and success.

The upshot was some poor performances in our School Sports, a third instead of our usual first in the Zone Championships, only one boy and one girl Champion of Champions at Mt Smart and it was perhaps to our advantage on the inter-school scene that the relays were cancelled. On the brighter side there were intermediate distance boys who trained hard and these put up a very fine performance in the inter-school steeplechase. Also during the training for the relays there was a group who showed keenness to train and who will provide a nucleus of both track and field athletes to build on next year.

All praise went to those who did uphold the name of the school by outstanding feats and to those who did their very best in training and competition whether placed or not. Carol Stainton, Ray Moore, Paul Connelly and Stephen Taylor figured prominently while Debbie Riley, Arihia Carrington, Roger Samuels and David Verner should be mentioned. Lorraine Stillman was outstanding but there was no inter-school competition in long distance for girls.

A pleasing aspect this year which should be mentioned is the prominent and successful part played in all school competitions by pupil officials. Our thanks to them. People who are physically unable to take part can perform a most valuable service here.

SCHOOL SPORTS

There were major changes this year. Races were run over metric distances and the boys ran a track steeplechase — a popular event which may find its way into the inter-school competition. The new split lunch breaks precluded the running of preliminaries in the fashion of previous years. Again with pupils taking much responsibility for official duties staff were able to work with all non-competitors on ordinary school work.

Finally house competition was replaced by form competition and the whole school watched the form relays with much enthusiasm evident. In

fact 5E5 were so enthusiastic that they very "cunningly" ran a good runner from 5E1 in their team, won the race, and were amazed at how vehemently the others objected and how promptly they were disqualified by unappreciative umpires.

By far the highest standard of real competition was in the Intermediate Boys' distance events. We cannot truly convert mile and 880 times to 1600 and 800 metre times by mathematics but as a rough guide the Intermediate Boys' mile record of 5 min 17.3 sec would convert to about 5 min 15.5 sec for 1600 metres. Stephen Taylor won it in 5 min 2 sec. David Rickett was second 5 min 2.9 sec, and Paul Connolly third in 5 min 6 sec. In the 800 metres their placings were the other way round with Paul Connolly first and again at least five boys "breaking" the previous record. It was good racing built on good training.

However the Intermediate Boys' champion was John Nesbitt who defeated Connolly by excelling in both sprints and field events. The other champions were:

Senior Boys: Ray Moore who also broke the triple jump record. He was closely followed by Atchison and Hillman.

Junior Boys: Ralph Lucas was ahead of Olive and Samuels.

Senior Girls: Sheryl Creamer barely headed off Sandra Spooner, the two sharing first and second placing in the same four events but Sheryl broke the long jump record by a foot and ran a "record" 13.3 sec 100 metres.

Intermediate Girls: Here Carol Stainton was quite outstanding, setting new standards for the record book in the four events in which she competed. Karen Williams was record with her wins in shot and discus.

Junior Girls: Jackie Clarke won all three sprints with Debbie Riley and Linda Hayhurst sharing the honours for second with Karen Willetts also second had the 400 meters been an established girls event. It was a pity that frequent rain disrupted the sports and impaired some performances.
