Guest Editorial

One of the outstanding impressions I gained overseas was that in most countries education is thought of as a continuing process. In New Zealand we tend to think that education finishes with the end of formal schooling at the age of fifteen or sixteen.

The diverse cultures and the concentration of population in Europe constantly break down any tendencies towards nationalism and isolation. Because travel is so easy and so cheap, continuing education is inevitable. Much of Europe is industrialised and, with increasing automation, retraining is essential. In New Zealand we tend to get our qualifications for a job while we are young and then do little to extend them or even keep them up to date.

Again, in Asia and America education goes on long after school has been left behind. With the vast hordes of people, the pressure of unemployment and the constant and ever necessary diversification of production for trade, there is always a strong incentive for education.

When New Zealanders return from abroad they are conscious of our insularity and our tendency to be inward-looking. This reveals itself in our attitude towards foreigners who criticise our ways — we suggest that they should return with all speed to their own countries.

Visiting celebrities — and others — are asked, soon after their arrival, what they think of New Zealand, and we expect them always to be loud in their praise of our island paradise.

There is much to be proud of in New Zealand but much of what is praiseworthy is a gift of nature, for which we can take little credit. Many things are done immeasurably better overseas. Young New Zealanders are being encouraged to travel — this is excellent for our people and our country. Travel ensures our continuing education and puts into perspective our ideas about our country. It gives us standards of values by which we can measure New Zealand.

After seeing young people in a number of countries, I wonder why it is that we accept the scruffy standards of dress from America and England — perhaps it is because this is what we see on T.V. and in advertisements, many of which originate in these countries. If we travelled more we would see that these standards are utterly rejected in France, Germany, Russia and S.E. Asia. By seeing different standards we would be able the better to set our own.

We would also have a greater appreciation of the beauty of our country. This would ensure that we did not litter our schools, our parks and our streets, nor destroy the scenic beauty of our lakes to generate electricity, nor fill in our harbours as rubbish dumps, nor allow industry to pollute our rivers.

Travel would give us confidence to judge our own country for ourselves, to make use of achievements and discoveries from overseas and, above all, to ensure our continuing education. Most of you will have a good educational foundation by the time you leave school but it is up to you to add the superstructure. Travel will help you to do this.

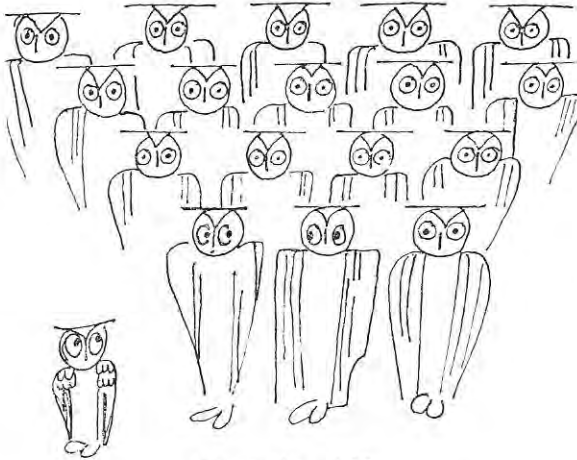

The Student Council's accomplishments in this, its fourth year, were of the same standard and quantity as other years. It organised senior and fourth form socials. A subcommittee for school grooming presented its report to Mr Clark.

From this hats and gloves were abolished and some of the other suggestions will be discussed with the Board of Governors and with teachers. The remainder were taken back for the new grooming committee to work on. The Council decided that the school was of sufficient size to maintain a valuable luxury for student use. Though this is an impressive list of achievements, the trend of Council's irrelevancy to the pupils has worsened. More than ever the Council has been thought of as "them" rather than "us". An attempt to communicate better by class publication of Executive minutes and assembly announcements had little apparent effect in combating this apathy.

Here Mr Clark's words of warning in 1969 are particularly applicable. These were that it is impossible for pupils to become more involved unless they had a strong desire to do so. No school council can flourish without leadership.

More would have been accomplished this year if the position of Chairman had not been in a state of flux, so that a continuity of policy was not pursued throughout the year. However, there was enthusiasm and a wealth of ideas from council members, especially from a core of seventh formers and some executive members.

With the new constitution now well established and the emphasis on student amenities and organised activities, the pattern has been set for a more productive future for the Council and the School.

DEBATING GROUP

The Junior Debating Group, whose numbers have ranged from 20 down to 6, began in Term 2 to meet on Tuesday lunchtimes, to argue informally on the problems of the world. Despite publicity at assemblies probably few people realized the dedicated debating that was taking place while they wolfed their peanut butter sandwiches in the hall.

The nucleus of the group, Jan Trezise, Joanne Keswick, Michelle Patterson and Catherine Healy, created a bastion of (female) wit and intellectual discrimination. Mr Harvey had the dubious privilege of defending the male viewpoint against such an Amazonian front.

FESTIVAL WEEK

For the third year in succession a festival week was held at Rutherford at the end of the second term. This year a wider range of events and displays was held, and the result was, we hope, that the pupils of the school were made more aware of the quality and variety of work being done around the school, and also had the opportunity to see this work.

Several sessions of lunchtime films provided contact with such topics as the art and sculpture of Michelangelo, the culinary arts of Japan, and future developments in film-making. Also at lunchtimes pupils inspected displays of work done by evening classes in such areas as floral art, ceramics, spinning and weaving, basketwork, and lapidary. A visiting portrait artist, Mrs P. Griffiths did rapid sketches of pupils volunteering to sit as models. A chess tournament held during Festival Week is reported elsewhere in the Magazine.

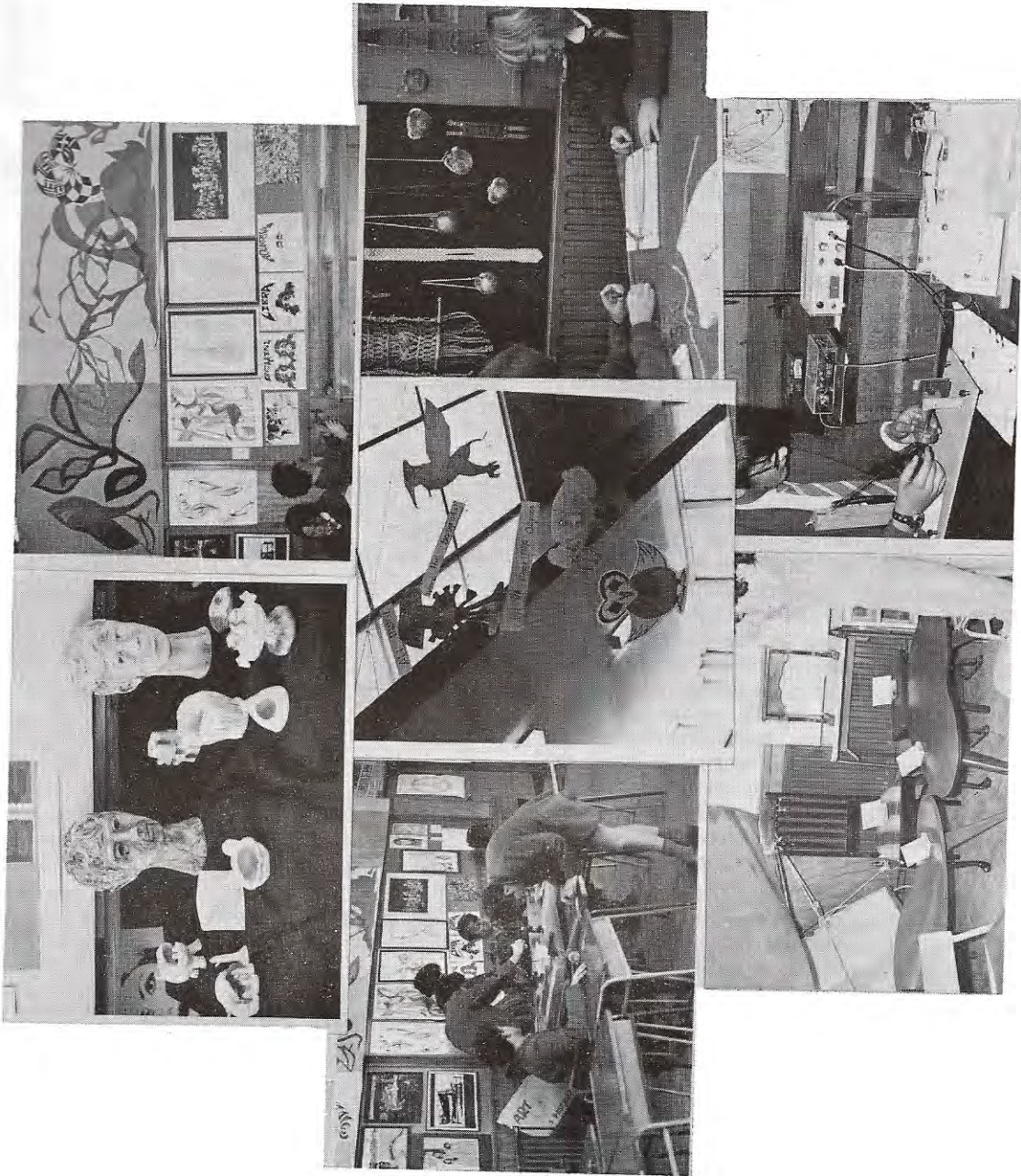

"THE GONDOLIERS"

This year's opera was the sixth in the series of Gilbert & Sullivan works which the Opera Club has presented over the last few years. In order these have been — "Trial by Jury", "H.M.S. Pinafore", "The Mikado", "Iolanthe", "The Pirates of Penzance" and "The Gondoliers".

During our rehearsals this year we had more than our fair share of difficulties so that the already daunting task of putting on one of these large-scale shows became especially forbidding about half-way through rehearsals. However, we

overcame these difficulties one by one until just prior to the dress rehearsals when laryngitis raised its ugly head. During the three weeks covering the final rehearsals and the actual performances hardly a person in the cast remained unscathed and during the performances several principals had to carry on valiantly while suffering noticeably from "the plague".

With all these minor disasters scattered in the wake of "The Gondoliers" it is surprising that it was such a success yet a success it was. Audiences were bigger, if anything, than previous years and from the response at the performances and comments made afterwards it was obviously a worthy successor to "The Pirates of Penzance".

The cast was larger than the usual Gilbert & Sullivan and when two main principals dropped out early in the second term we faced a difficult situation. This was overcome by the help of two people (from outside the school) who made an outstanding contribution to the success of "The Gondoliers". These were Mrs Elizabeth Lott who shone in the part of Gianetta and Mr Bill Drinnon who made a commanding Don Alhambra del Bolero. The other sixteen principals were taken from pupils ranging from Forms III to VII with the chorus also from similar levels. Cathy Wilson, from 7C, made a vivacious and charming Tessa, partnered very ably by David Smart as Giuseppe; Linda Arthern from 4C acted and sang (in spite of laryngitis) most capably as the Duchess of Plaza Toro and Ricky Pope as the Duke, brought out much of the humour of his scenes which were further enhanced by the work of Nina Pedrotti and Kerry McKay. In the small part of Antonio, Richard Taylor, of 3C, showed that he was a welcome addition to the cast and other members who performed well were, Moira McKay, Frances Veldhoen, Dorothy James, Sandra Morris, Kevin Garbutt, Terry Peters and Stuart Forsyth. Jan Sutcliffe, who was to have taken the small role of Inez was not well at the dress rehearsal and was ill for the first two performances but recovered sufficiently to do the last two shows. Mrs Holibar, at a couple of hours' notice, stepped into the gap and the Opera Club was very grateful for this timely assistance.

As usual many teachers helped with the production. Mr Reid made his customary contribution by providing us with two admirable stage sets. These were stage managed most competently by Mr Lewis and his team of boys, Mr Davies arranged the lights (assisted by his team of boys), Mr Laver was once again doing wonders with make-up and Mrs Ashman and Mrs Veldhoen created a magnificent set of costumes.



The huge task of teaching the words, music, acting, movement and dancing was shared out amongst six teachers — Mrs Lewis, Miss Kwan, Miss Robertson, Mrs Dunn, Mrs Armstrong and, of course, Mr Holibar. Through many months this team plodded on patiently towards the final goal.

As in several previous productions the orchestra was largely made up of the Rutherford High School Night Class Orchestra together with some outsiders (who have helped for a number of years) and also several members of the School Orchestra. The orchestra work this year was probably the best we have had yet. The Producer and Musical Director for "The Gondoliers" was Mr Holibar, who once again has won the admiration of all who were privileged to attend a performance of this extremely well produced operetta. Congratulations to him, and to all who worked so perseveringly for its success.

DRAMA

SENIOR PLAY

This year's senior school play, "The Little Red Schoolhouse", was a homegrown workshop satire on education as she is spoken in New Zealand. It briefly traced the ups and downs of Fred, as he proceeded through school and into teaching, through skits, sketches and songs. There are many things which are likely to remain unknown about this play; for example, was it the prohibitive cost of royalties which prompted Miss Brame to write it, or merely an altruistic desire for social reform? Why were no two performances identical in content? Why did the flying Teddy Bear in the final scene of Act I invariably hit our good samaritan, Mrs Shortis, fair amidships? And why, after the factual content about present day education revealed in some of the scenes, are several of the cast still considering teaching as a career?

Although the play was a challenge to the cast, for it relied on good timing, spontaneity and versatility, it was a reasonable success, running for three nights at school, a daytime performance at Epsom Secondary Teachers' College, and an afternoon matinee later at School. Perhaps the best performance was given at Teachers' College, to about two hundred student teachers; they were a highly appreciative audience; and their stage put the cast on their mettle. The nicest compliment came from an anonymous spectator at that session: "I never knew school pupils could be so interesting and work so hard." It was a bouquet the cast well deserved. Others in the team which got this impossible play on the boards deserve honourable mention, especially the musical director and co-producer, Mrs Apáthy. This was her last year with the play, and we will miss her greatly for her good cheer, her ability in varied fields, and her knack of remembering, and sorting out, those little details the producer managed to forget. Likewise, our warmest thanks to Mrs Shortis, who defined the idea of property mistress as a general refuge of good sense in a period of storm. There were many who made the production possible and who deserve mention; those we thank, even if it was something as small as the loan of stapler or string; for without them, the play would not have run smoothly.

It was a feature of this year's play that, at several performances members of previous school play casts gave us their encouragement. We have moved from the "Romanoff and Juliet" of 1970, through the ambitious workshop plays "Oh, What A Lovely War" and "Little Red Schoolhouse". We hope that the tradition of the play will con-

tinue at Rutherford, for it has afforded a lot of people great pleasure (even if they weren't the audience).

LIBRARY

A library to many is only a building where books are kept but the School Library does more than just this as was made evident by the ap-

pearance of the interior during Festival Week, when numerous posters and displays were put on show: mention must be made of 4H's efforts with their displays throughout the year. It is very good to see that the Library is so fully integrated with the rest of the schools work and activities.

However, the prime function of the library is the provision of books, and in this respect full credit must go to Mrs Parker, without whom the library could not function as the well organised unit it is. Mrs Kellaway, Mrs Wooller, Mrs Bean and Mrs Ford have all been very generous with their time; the amount of extra work and dedication of all these people is fully appreciated by all who use the library.

Pupil help has fluctuated. Again it was the old story of a great number of eager volunteers at the beginning of the year but ending in the majority of the work done by a few — thanks to Pamela Brown and Hugh Dormer and the "boys upstairs" Ross Keswick, Paul Shortis and Stephen Matheson. Because of the great numbers wishing to use the library, especially in the winter months, a card system was introduced so allowing only a certain number of 3rd or 4th formers in at a particular time; so keeping the numbers to a manageable level. The provision of a room for the "homework brigade" also helped with this problem of "too many people and too little space." With more stress placed upon individual pupil research and study there is a need for a separate Reading, Research Room in the library, it is hoped that this space could be provided at some future date.

While some years ago only relatively simple pieces could be attempted this year's group has tackled with considerable success some of the standard orchestral works such as the 'Rosamunde Overture' by Schubert. 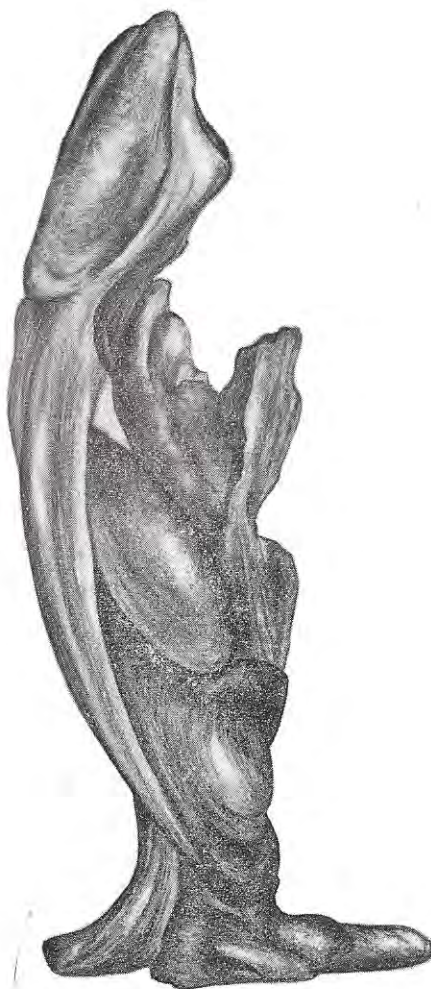

A NEW SYSTEM OF SECONDARY EDUCATION

At present there are some 11,000 secondary school teachers in New Zealand each paid an average wage of \$5,000 per year. Thus \$55 million are paid out every year by the Education

Department. This is to provide an "education" for some 200,000 school pupils who often do not appreciate what is being done for them and how fortunate they are. Of these 10% are senior sixth and seventh form pupils.

I suggest that the Government saves the nation \$55 million each year and replaces teachers with a more economic system. In a typical school 13% of the staff were administrative, 25% held posts of responsibility and 62% were teachers without any specific function. Naturally in any realistic plan only the 62% teachers and some of the 13% administration could be done away with and the actual saving might be only \$35 million.

The teaching staff could be replaced by inexpensive programmed texts where pure factual material is to be committed to memory as is the basic idea of education kept alive by the tradition of examinations. However, some subjects taught require more "free thought" and this can be provided in the form of handouts to be discussed by the class, which will respond enthusiastically given such opportunity. Minor supervision will be required and this will be provided by the 20,000 senior pupils in schools. The numbers remaining to gain a higher education will, of course, rise when the new system is introduced. The more able pupils will assist those with lower ability thus consolidating their knowledge and gaining a better understanding of what they must learn. This is already evident in school pupil tutoring schemes where pupils assist those in the forms lower than themselves.

However, the advantages of a secondary education scheme with few teachers is more than just economic. There are distinct sociological advantages. The teacher — pupil relationship is unique in society being in total contrast to the parent-offspring relationship of the home. The teachers vary so much in character, age, temperament, personal attitude and style of teaching that confusion results in the mind of the pupil. A traditional resentment stems from lack of communication especially in the junior forms. This is not the atmosphere for learning. All this could change with the new system of education. The children could feel amongst their own kind. The harmonious atmosphere could promote learning and stimulate the enquiring minds. Naturally adults would remain as heads of departments preparing and correlating courses and curriculum. Some routine office typing could be done by commercial classes.

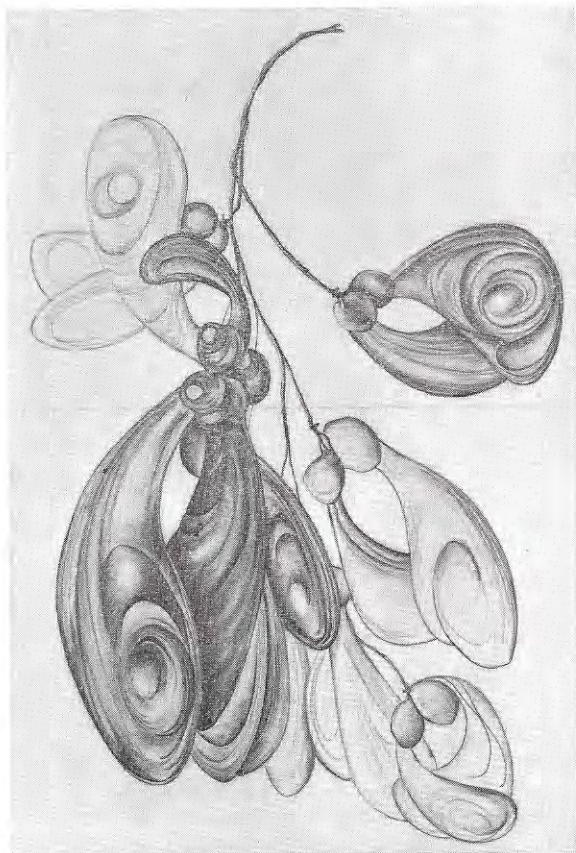

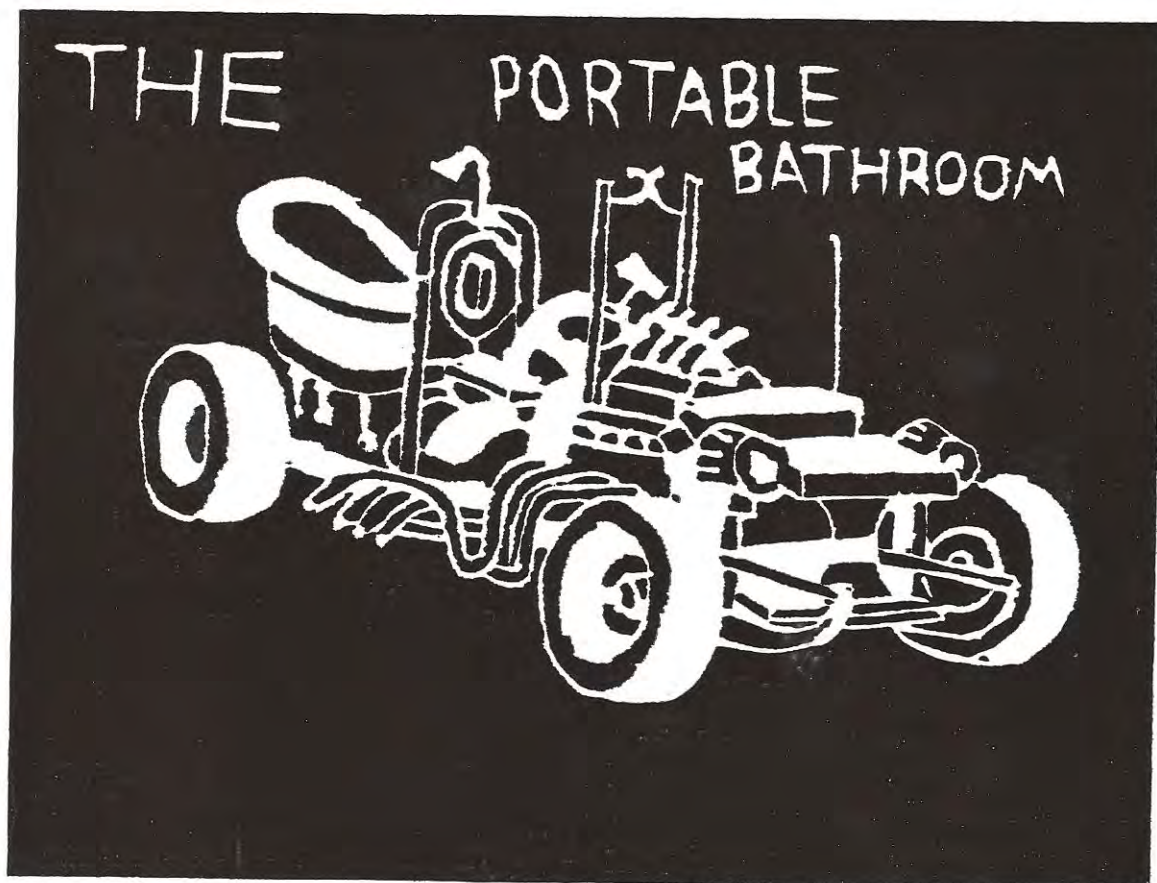

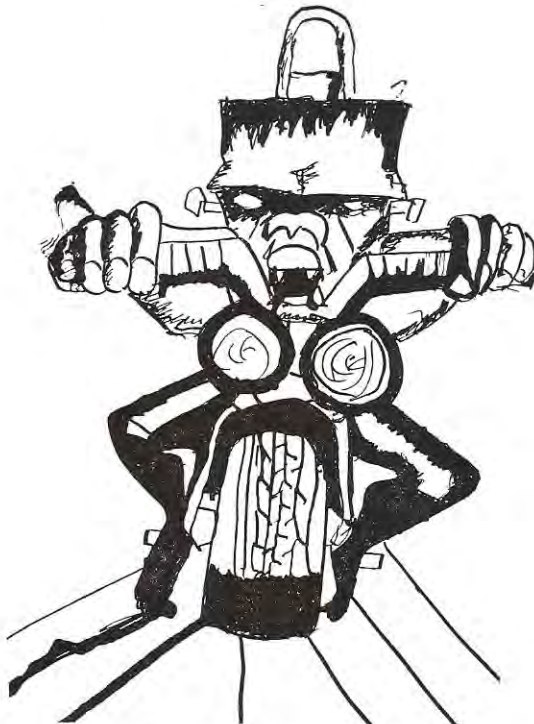
