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## Editorial

"Much study," we read in Ecclesiastes, "is a weariness of the flesh," and that is a sentiment which even our less biblically-inclined pupils are likely to approve of. Less explicable might be Francis Bacon's view that "Studies serve for delight," and that "to spend too much time in studies is sloth." Has not the year's academic grind established beyond doubt that study is anything but delightful? And is it not the pupil who does no study at all that is described as slothful?

Bacon's words indeed have a strange sound to modern ears. What to him and his contemporaries was a luxury and a privilege has become a dull bore to so many of those to whom wonderful opportunities of studying are handed on a plate. One of the quirks of human nature seems to be that even the most pleasurable and fulfilling occupation, if made obligatory, becomes an imposition to be detested and struggled against. Perhaps the current fashion of emphasising "rights" and "freedoms" rather than responsibilities and the value of self-discipline would account for the distaste many young people feel for what is involved in accepting the educational advantages provided for them in their own interests and at considerable public expense. Bacon would no doubt be staggered not only by the extent of these advantages but also by the deep indifference or even fierce rejection they often meet with.

The teacher, despondent, perhaps, because of this situation, and the conscientious but fatigued student, will find it refreshing and stimulating to observe the interest being shown by adult members of the community in returning to school. Some twenty or thirty of these will be attending day classes at Rutherford next year. Not only has life made clear to them the value of study, but they also show a recognition that educational gains are to be made only at the cost of personal sacrifice. Most of them will have to fit their studies around domestic or employment responsibilities not shared by our regular pupils. And all are facing an inevitable degree of embarrassment in entering a unique situation, and the possible tedium of associating with large groups of pupils of younger age and alien interests.

It could well be that one of the most beneficial side-effects of this scheme will be the provision of an incentive to our present pupils to accept and value the chances they can now take with such relative ease.

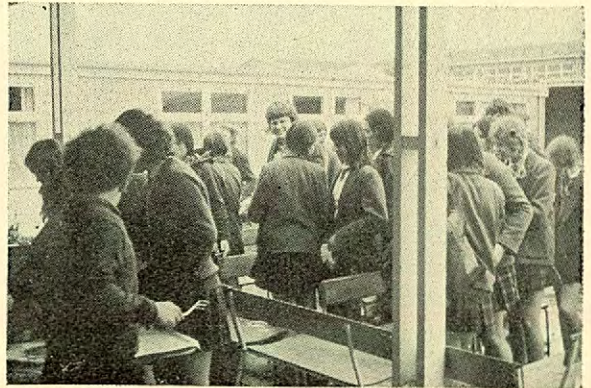
### THE GREAT 3F S.C.F. SAUSAGE SIZZLE

### COMMUNITY USE OF THE SCHOOL

In 1974 we hope to see much greater use made of the school. We believe that the facilities we have could be of great benefit to residents in Te Atatu. The intended use of the school will occur in several ways.

1. Adults have been enrolled from Forms 5, 6 and 7 for 1974 and will become members of classes alongside the ordinary pupils.

2. We hope to extend the scope of evening classes and make provisions for classes to be held during the day and at weekends in addition to the usual classes on Monday to Thursday from 7 - 9 p.m.

3. We hope to be able to extend the use of the gymnasium. This is at present used for evening classes and also by the local badminton club. No doubt other organisations would like to use it and other activities could be carried on there.

4. We hope to make the library available for study purposes and also as a social centre for people who may wish to use it for card playing and similar quiet activities.

### THE FUTURE

The future development of the school will depend on two things:

1. What do the local people want;

2. How much money is Government prepared to grant so that extra facilities may be provided.

We would like to see the swimming pool covered in and heated so that it could be used all the year round.

We would like to have a social centre which could be used by the day pupils as a lunch and quiet recreation area during the day, as well as by the community at night.

The intended use should also make greater provision for our day pupils — some classes for senior forms could be held at night with pupils having time off during the day for sport and recreation. It should also be possible for day pupils to enrol in evening classes — something they cannot do at present — and to do practical subjects outside of the normal school hours if they have an inclination that way.

What we want is for the school to become a focal point for the community, for the local people to take a full part in the use and administration of the school and for everyone to make greater use of it than they do at present. This is what we see as a community school.

### RUTHERFORD BUILDING PROGRAMME

It is our sincerest hope and wish that our building programme is completed before some of our original buildings collapse from old age or are dismantled by disgruntled pupils!

New buildings that should be available for next year are the Senior Science Block near the Primary School grounds and the Drama Complex adjoining the Hall and Music Room. This latter should allow our budding Thespians full scope to develop their latent abilities and perhaps a young Rutherford scientist will put the atom back together again in the Science block! Would this help resolve some of the problems of natural human frailties?

It is hoped that early in 1974 the new 7th Form Common Room will be completed — although it must be remembered that the exigencies of the Building industry may well upset still further the best laid plans.

The Library mezzanine floor extensions are expected to be completed during the Christmas holidays with a comprehensive Resource Area attached to the Library on the North side during the course of the year.

Room 50 in "D" Block is to be converted to a Lecture Room with seating for some 60 persons; Room 60 to a Study Room with very smart carrells; Rooms 32 and 42 in "C" Block into Maths and Language Resource centres respectively and negotiations are under way for another Team Teaching Room and also a second Gymnasium, although these are likely to be some distance away. Fortunately 1975, '76, '77 and '78 are as yet brand new and untouched!

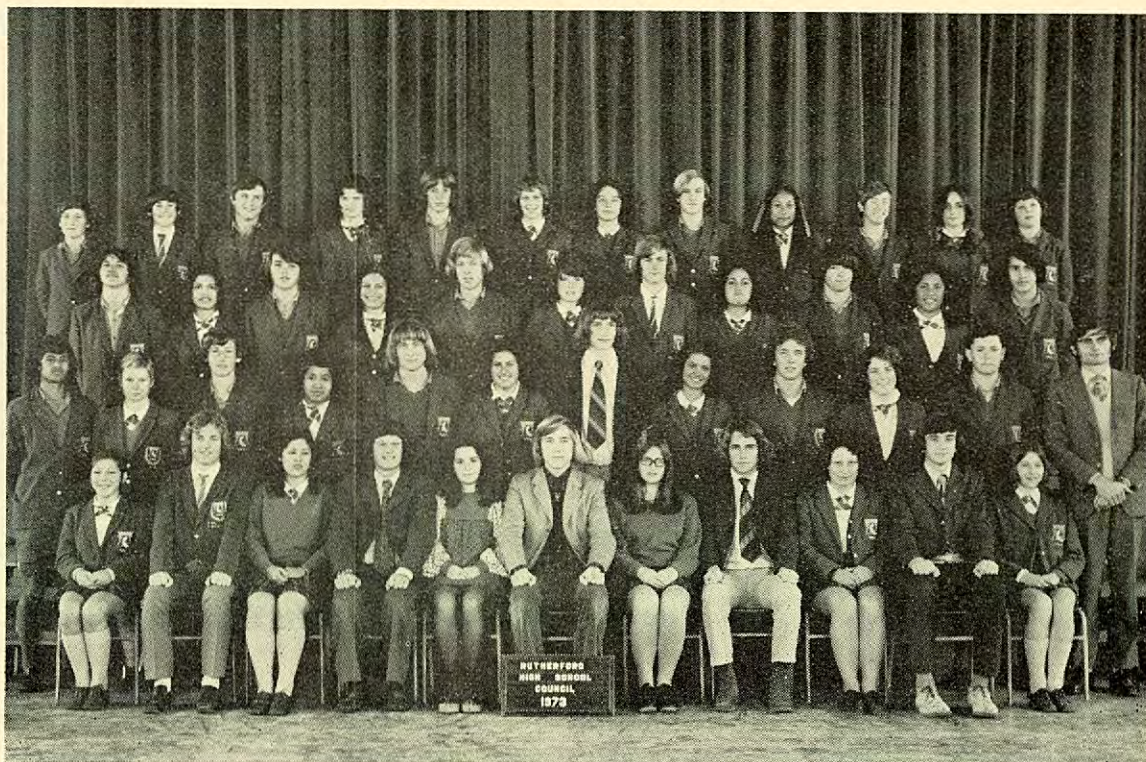
It is anticipated that further alterations to the Staff Room will give Staff facilities almost equal to those to be enjoyed by the 7th Formers with their Common Room!

This year the Council, going into its fifth year, featured significant modifications suggested by the head pupils. This modified council differed from councils past in five ways:

1. Separate form levels councils gave way to a Junior Council, Senior Council system which eased administration and communication difficulties which existed in the old system.

2. There was only one delegate representing each class, compared with two per class in previous years. The resultant reduction of council members meant that each council was maintained at a reasonable size.

3. Drastic changes were made to the structure and size of the Executive. This year there were only eight members on the Executive, an ideal size for making competent decisions, with

minimal delay. The two Council chairmen were on the Executive as of right, as were the four head pupils. The other two members were elected from the 5th and 6th Forms.

4. The Executive members were expected to attend both Junior and Senior council meetings to give advice and to ensure that the entire council was fully aware of the council activities at all three levels.

5. The Council wasn't bound by any written constitution as such. This allowed the Council to function with a good deal of flexibility.

With the initiative shown by members of the Council it had a number of successes:

- (a) The Lincoln Road - Henderson bus.
- (b) Saturday morning school clean-ups.
- (c) The establishing of a guitar club.

- (d) Fund raising efforts, e.g. Tolpuddle Concert and the wheelbarrow race.
- (e) The third and fourth socials, and the groundwork for the School Ball.
- (f) A talent-quest in festival week was given support by the Council.
- (g) Lunchtime dances in the gymnasium.
- (h) Groundwork for the establishment of a public telephone in the school grounds.

The present system that has been in operation for one year has great potential, and it is felt that if some of the less successful aspects of the system are remodified the School Council

can look forward to a most successful year in 1974, assuming of course that "school spirit" is maintained at the encouraging level experienced this year.

After last year's very successful "Gondoliers" it was thought that something different from Gilbert and Sullivan might be a welcome change. Several shows were investigated and these gradually narrowed down to four, three of which had to be passed over for various reasons — for some (e.g. "Fiddler on the Roof") the initial expenses were so exorbitant that we could not hope to pay for them while other (e.g.

"Camelot") were not available for performance by schools in New Zealand. We therefore chose "The Beggar's Opera" which was not too expensive to start with but had the disadvantage of dealing with disreputable people such as prostitutes. Some disapproval, from more conservative elements, was a possibility but in fact, little of this was expressed if, indeed, it was felt.

Because of the nature of some of the parts

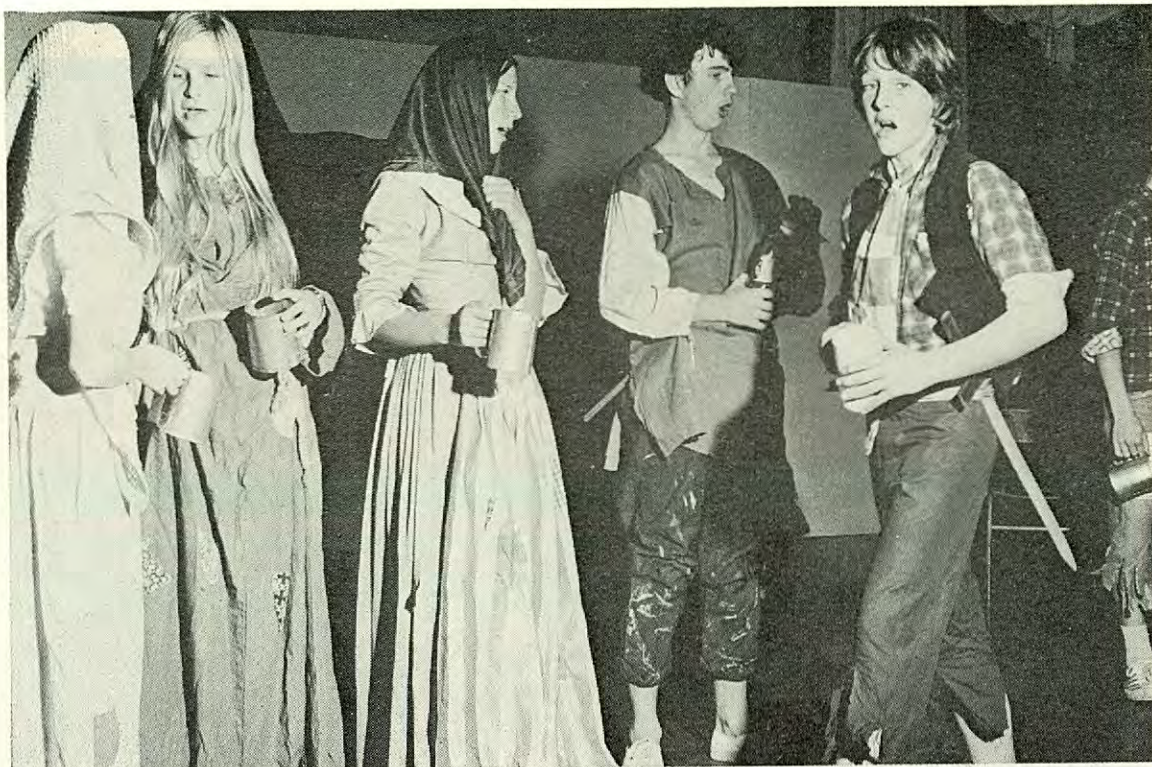
we were pleased to accept the help of three or four adults who offered, early in the year, to do whatever they could to assist. (Perhaps we were trying to turn Rutherford into a Community College before the Minister of Education had given his approval.) However, as in previous years, the cast consisted mainly of pupils of the school.

The set up of "The Beggar's Opera" was, in many ways, quite different from a Gilbert and Sullivan show. With the latter a comparatively few principals assisted by a large chorus is the general thing, but with "The Beggar's Opera" there were many small parts together with two or three larger ones with only a small chorus. The cast for this show worked very well together and there was a very good "one-family" feeling throughout the season.

As often happens, towards the end of rehearsals disaster struck — one of the main adults collapsed and went into hospital. David Smart of 6H quickly stepped into the gap and gave a very creditable performance as Mr Peachum, acting a type of character he had not previously attempted. He was partnered by Mrs Holibar as

his drunken, sluttish wife. Neither of these pair had any scruples about betraying their rather dubious son-in-law, Captain Mascheath — a part which had also given us some anxious moments and which was eventually very ably filled by Mr Dimery. The Captain, not content with Polly Beachum (Moirá McKay) as his partner, must also have Lucy Lockit (Karen Thorn) as well as half-a-dozen others. Small wonder, then, that he ended in prison, in the custody of Mr Lockit (John Clark). Lucy helps him to escape to meet his henchman, Filch (Kerry McKay) only to be betrayed again by Mrs Trapes (Joy Arthur). Eventually all is righted but not before Jenny Diver (Esther Juhasz), Mrs Brazen (Yvonne de Hoag), Mrs Vixen (Robyn Pope), Mrs Coaxer (Angela Buck), Betty Doxy (Shirley Reiher), Mrs Slammekin (Susan Hudson), the Jailor (Terry Peters), the Beggar (Ricky Pope), Matt of the Mint (Michael Beuvink), a Tavern Keeper (Colin MacDonald), several children and half-a-dozen babies have appeared on the scene. The accompaniment was provided by the Augmented Rutherford High School Night Class Orchestra which included several pupils from the school.





The Production and Musical direction for "The Beggar's Opera" as for the last seven shows, was by Mr Holibar (assisted by Mr Dimery and Mrs Armstrong). The sets were by Mr Green and Mr Giles. Mr Lewis was stage manager, Mrs Lewis prompt, Mrs Ashman once again performed wonders with costumes and Mr Laver was to be found in his accustomed place at the make-up table. Several other staff members and pupils helped in various ways with backstage work, front-of-house, suppers and other jobs too numerous to mention.

At the conclusion of the season a party was held in Room 9 where cast and orchestra mingled to the accompaniment of cups, glasses and plates.

The operetta group later performed three of the choruses from "The Beggar's Opera" as an item for Rutherford Day.

### THE SCHOOL ORCHESTRA

This year the School Orchestra has continued the policy of rehearsing in Room 9 at 3.15 every Friday afternoon. As in previous years the orchestra has had a core of enthusiastic players who turn up regularly to each rehearsal and a few fringe members whose attendance is not so regular. In addition we have been pleased to have two teachers (Mr Hunt and Mr Giles) as permanent members as well as a member of the Night Class Orchestra who assists at each practice.

During the year the School Orchestra has combined with the Night Class Orchestra to play for the Primary Schools' Music Festival and some members also assisted in the orchestra for this year's "The Beggar's Opera." At the end of October the two orchestras combined once again

### DRAMA NOTES

1973 has been a year of both good news and bad news, in the world of Drama at Rutherford.  
**The Bad News:**

In the first place, what promised to be a challenging and rewarding production of Arthur Miller's "The Crucible" by the Seniors (the play is studied in the sixth form and generally is found very popular among the set books) was abandoned, for this year at any rate. A major factor in the cancellation of the production was the ill-health of its producer, Miss Brame, which forced her to hand over the job to someone else. Disappointingly however, although a group of enthusiastic teachers headed by Miss Patterson rallied to take the show over, they found it impossible to cast the play from the very small group of Seniors still interested. It is to be hoped that in such a large school and one which has had a very strong tradition in drama, next year's Seniors will make up for what has been a major lack in this year's school activities.

It was with very much regret that we learned that Miss Brame was leaving to take up a new position at Mount Roskill Grammar. She has worked hard not only as director of several major school productions, including "Oh! What a Lovely War" and her own "The Little Red Schoolhouse," but also to foster a spirit of drama in the school, and we feel that Mount Roskill are lucky to have the benefit of her experience and enthusiasm.

### The Good News:

The Juniors are very much alive and healthy in the field of drama. As we write these notes "The Caucasian Chalk Circle" (a very impressive name for what is really the old, old story about whether the girl will get her man although in this case the bird gets two men, even though one's only seven years old), is still very unrehearsed, uncostumed and with lines unlearned, while the producer Mr Harvey, is wishing he could crawl out of the school gates and head for Tahiti with the so-far nonexistent takings. By the time you read this however, provided that flu, frustrated producers and high blood pressure over the Power Station haven't killed the cast off, you'll have seen and heard gypsy Michelle reveal all about gorgeous Grusha (alias Joanne Tjaden) and her journey across the mountains and ravines chased by the bloodthirsty Ironshirts (the unlikely trio of Grant Stockley, Nicholas Haidar and Peter Woolmore) who want to return young Mike to his real mother, the nasty Governor's wife (Joanne Keswick). You'll also have thrilled to the court case of the century in which the crazy Judge Azdac (Brant Dainow) orders the two hefty women to pull the kid apart before the audience's eyes. And you'll have cheered as the lights go down and Grusha and Simple Simion, the soldier (Michael Jordan), with their ready-made family dance off into the sunset. This, at any rate, is what we hope you will have seen. At the moment we have a cast of 46, most of whom have something to put on, thanks to the needle and thread of Mrs Corban and Mrs Harvey, all milling around on the mountain — and ravine, peasant cottage and palace bestrewn floor of the Team Teaching Room, while Mr Harvey yells alternately "speak up" to those on-stage, and "shut up" to those off-stage, and Miss Harvey wanders around dazedly grabbing people whom she can teach to "mooooooo" and drop their jaws, a rather difficult subject to grasp. And, as yet the mountains and cottages, etc. are waiting hopefully for Mr Giles to design them and Mr Armiger to manufacture them.

Two innovations to the school's drama activities make up the rest of the good news. The

## TRAMPING CLUB

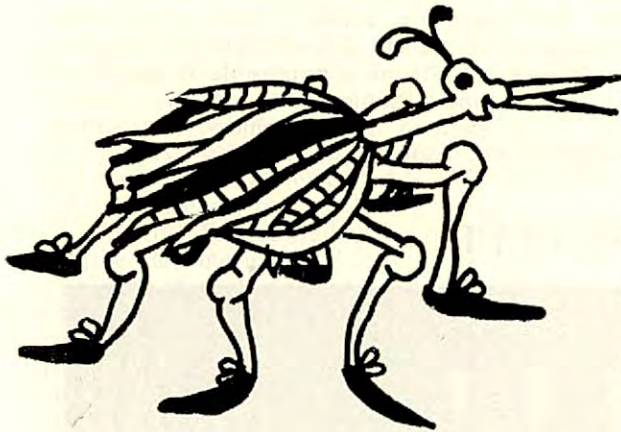

1. Tuition classes on Mondays after school, teaching both beginners and more advanced students.

2. A 6th Form hobbies group in periods 4 and 5 on Thursdays conducted by Mr Drabble. In the first of the two periods the group listened to guitar styles of people such as James Taylor, Neil Young, Stephen Stills, Jose Feliciano, etc.

Speaking in favour of Progress, the team indeed did this competently. We all look forward to some enjoyable fixtures next year.

There was comparatively little individual Public Speaking practised this year. Senni Kelderman represented the school in the Auckland final of the Anthony Eden Public Speaking Contest, and was placed fourth. This year's topic concerned the contemporary issue of the Commonwealth Games, so the contest engendered somewhat more interest than usual.

A phenomenal crowd of junior and senior orators entered the Prepared and Impromptu Contests. Judge, Miss Brame, and spectators alike were very impressed with the standards which prevailed here. It is to be hoped that the same levels of ability and enthusiasm will be as prevalent next year.

### THE RUTHERFORD FILM SOCIETY

During this year a film society was established at Rutherford High. It began operation in the second term with 150 members and so far this

### THE DAY THE SCHOOL COUNCIL WENT TOO FAR!

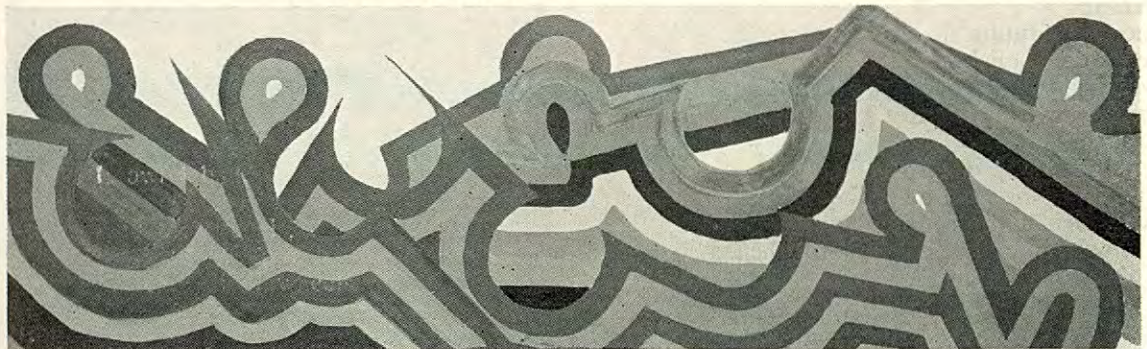

**SCHOOL ATHLETIC SPORTS 1973**

This year's Athletic Sports were considered by all those associated with them, to have been a success.

Over 900 students competed in an average of three events each. With large fields in all preliminary heats and field event elimination rounds, there was keen competition to secure a place in the finals. Consequently, the standard of performances in both track and field events was very high.

Great credit must go to the students of Form 7 who undertook the responsibility of officiating at both the preliminary and finals meeting. They carried out their responsibility perfectly and in no small way contributed to the happy atmosphere and smooth running of this year's sports.

Many performances are worthy of special mention. Alfred Pukepuka the eventual Junior Champion won the Junior Hurdles and Shot Put events in fine style, breaking a long standing



record in the latter event with a put of 36ft 2½in. He went on to gain a second place in the Discus event. A very promising third form boy, Alfred looks set for a successful athletics career at Rutherford.

Another Form 3 boy, Willy Pritchard shows great potential as a high jumper. His winning jump of 5ft 1½in. is a new record.

There is a great spread of talent in this area of the school which augurs well for the future.

Intermediate boys events were dominated by Brian Annan, Glen Creamer and Mark O'Keefe. It must be remembered that these are amongst the best intermediate athletes in Auckland and that to come second or third in this company is no indication of poor performance. Indeed, athletes like Thomas Waitai, Grant Wilson, Anzac Pritchard, Garth Haines and Ross Gleeson have shown that they can more than hold their own in inter-school competition.



The Senior Boys section was memorable for the tussle for places between arch rivals Ralph Lucas, Dion Cosgrave and David Moore. Ralph finished the day with an exceptional record of four first places (100m, 200m, 400m, High Jump) and one third place (Long Jump). His High Jump of 5ft 5in. is a new school record.

Lorraine Keen's performances in the Junior Girls' events were excellent. Lorraine gained first places in the 100m, Long Jump and High Jumps. Results which gave her the Junior Girls Champion title.

Other very good performances were seen from A. Molloy in the Discus and G. Milina in the Long Jump and High Jump.

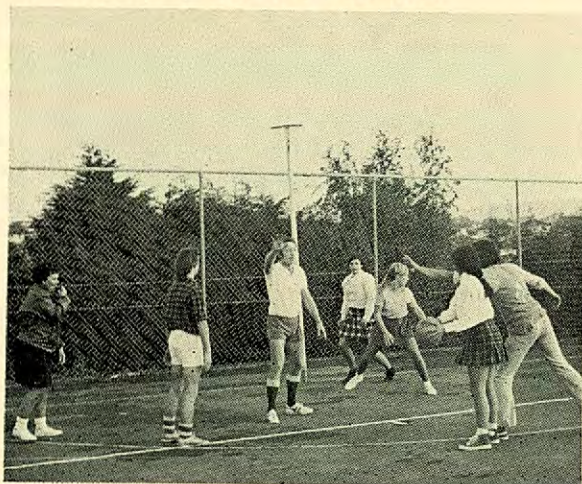
In the first term the staff issued a sporting challenge to the senior school — a shield would be awarded to the winner of an eight sport contest.

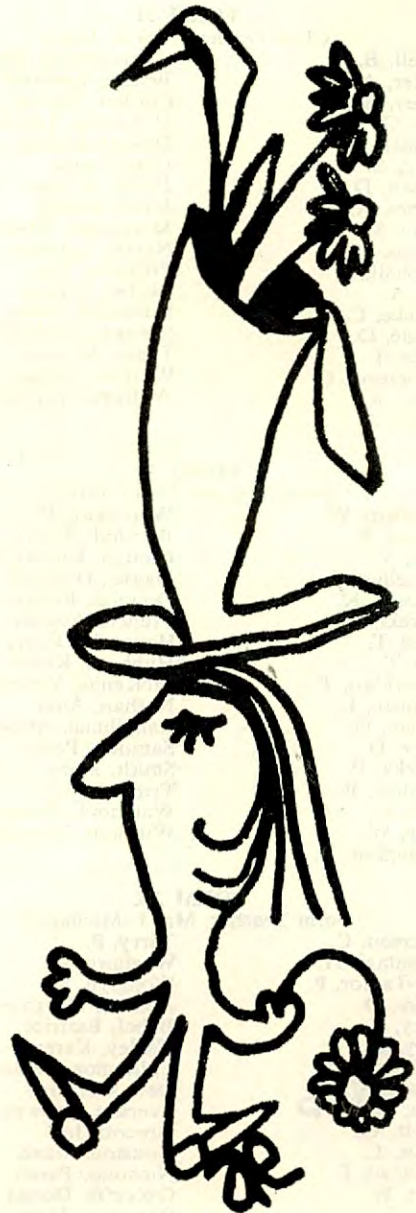
