The School Photographic Club started officially this year, with the use of the newly equipped Darkroom in the Art Department. The Club met on Mondays after school, and was mainly occupied in the first two terms, with learning the printing and processing techniques. The standard of camera work and photo-finishing improved gradually to a good quality.

A display was rather hurriedly put together to make a small showing at festival week. A more comprehensive, display hopefully of noticeably higher quality is planned for the third term.

One of the major items, helping in the improvement of each individual member's work, was the discussion at club meetings. Individual problems that cropped up all over the place, were able to be solved by group knowledge. The Jargon of Photography took time for new members to learn, but most can now talk about ASA numbers and focal lengths etc. so as to baffle any outsider.

The initial jump into photography has meant that with some good experience in processing film, at least half of the club members will be doing at least partial processing in some darkrooms, by the end of the year.

Photography being what it is, an expensive hobby, advice on how to save money, and get good quality equipment, passed from member to member. Members with less expensive cameras learnt how to improve their results, whilst those with more expensive equipment were still learning, especially from their mistakes.

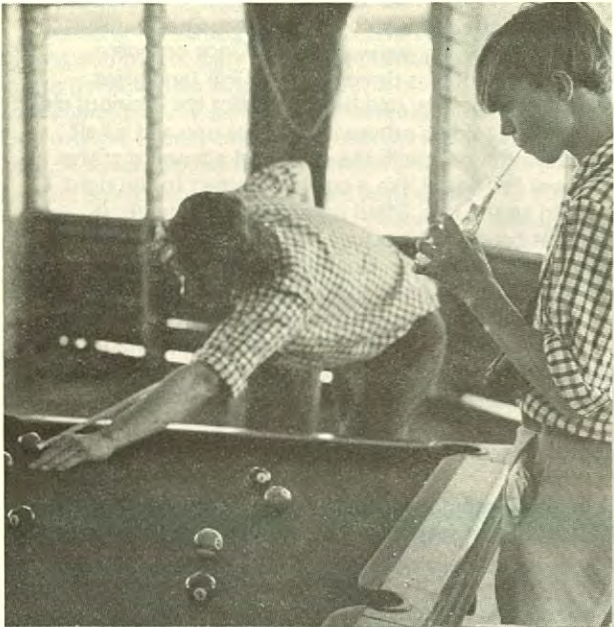

## WESTERN SAMOA—FIJI ISLANDS FIELD TRIP

In the May holidays a group of enthusiastic students and staff continues the tradition long established at Rutherford, of participating in a school field trip — this time to Western Samoa and Fiji.

Rutherford's Field Trips aren't the superficial, loafing tourist-type holidays. You have got to be tough. You must be prepared to rough it, to mix in with the locals, to eat the locals foods, to get to the nitty-gritty and let the mud squelch between your toes. No hot showers, no soft beds to cuddle up with a teddy and, above all, no television. This way its possible to get the feeling of the place and an understanding of how and why people live the way they do.

### THE ITINERARY

Our field trip was great. We were the first overseas school to ever visit Western Samoa on such a venture, and the experience was tremendous. Without a doubt Western Samoa is the heart of Polynesia. Tradition and customs are rich and strong, and Samoans are a justly proud and generous people. Our hosts were the boys of Aveli College, renowned for their hospitality and entertainment of visitors.

In Samoa there is no sense of time or routine and happy confusion became part of our way of life. We were lucky, participating in *fia fias* (singing and dancing), the *kava* ceremony (traditional welcome), the *su'a* (a family welcome for Romina Anapu) and Samoan rugby and cricket. We went to assembly every morning and sat in on classes at work. We experienced White Sunday and attended a church service.

It was great fun sliding down the *Papase'sa* rocks into a pool thirty feet below, sniffing the ginger plant, crunching on cocoa beans and watching boys steal bananas and pineapples. We sat in the Prime Minister's seat at Parliament House, and collapsed on Robert Louis Stevenson's tomb (after getting up at 5.30 a.m. to climb Mt. Via). We journeyed across the island of Upolu and along the island, and visited Vailima (government house).

We slept in a fale, had one meal prepared on a umu and ate taro and breadfruit, taro and pork, taro and palasami, taro and bananas, taro and more taro. (Constipation and 'the other extreme' were problems, but like true Rutherfordians we gritted our teeth and accepted our lot.)

Samoa is paradise. Beautiful. Fragrant. Smiling. left-hand drive. Bone-breaking roads. Pigs. Dogs. Fowls. We didn't want to leave and one departure was a tearful one.

We won't forget that last day. We didn't want

to go to Fiji and, if we had known what was in store for us we certainly wouldn't have left. Our plane was late (pilot training we were told). Once on board and in the air it was three hours to Fiji (and great weather all the way said the pilot). But the ominous cloud formations told us otherwise and for one and a half hours we flew through the centre of a tropical storm. We were buffeted like a cork, slammed to the right, crashed to the left, lifted up and banged down. It was seat belts all the way. I had never seen such a queue to spew before. But silent bodies, green and white faces with poached-egg eyes found their regulation paper bags were too small for this ordeal. Have you ever seen Mr Laver on his knees in the loo of a rattling aircraft? Or Mr Aitken look like a waxworks image of a Buddha with glasses? It all came out that day and several yards of Rutherford guts was fed doubtless to awaiting grateful sharks twelve thousand feet below.

With relief we landed at Nandi and our White Knuckle flight was over. Fiji was like being on another planet. No Polynesians here. No taro or *Fia Fias*. Instead we smelled Indian curries and saw temples and mosques and ploughs drawn by cattle. Lautoka is a 'little India' in Fiji, and the heart of the sugar industry, and shops filled with transistor radios awaiting the greedy clutches of selfish pink tourists.

Further around the island of Viti Levu we found 'Fijian country' and the hospitality of the villagers at Nananu. This isolated village had been devastated by hurricane Bebe, and had withstood battering seas and the worst floods for thirty years. Crops had been ruined and materials for bures hard to get. Yet despite the plight of these people we were welcomed. The freedom of the village was given to us, a *make* (entertainment) was arranged and there was always the *kava*. The poverty of Nananu was almost beyond our comprehension yet the village is just over a thousand miles (three hours) away from Te Atatu.

While the people of Nananu battled with existence we battled with mosquitoes and Miss Dillon battled with toads. It was fitting for Mr Laver to lecture to us on the life style of the toad and to physically impersonate on the floor the peculiar habits of tropical lizards.

Suva at last. The fermenting multicultural melting pot of the South Pacific. A city of extremes. Gigantic tourist hotels. Colonial bungalows. Shanty towns. Narrow streets, shoeshine boys. Beggars. Bargaining in Cumming Street. Japanese cars. Indian lollies. Fijian baskets. Australian department stores. American tourists on a Russian ship. Rutherfordians looking



for souvenirs at the market place.

Along the famed Coral Coast to Nandi we passed tourist complexes galore and were fortunate to lunch at the famed Fijian Hotel. Care for a bite to eat? Milkshakes at sixty cents here. Hamburgers, \$1.60. One orange, twenty cents. The tourists have everything here. A beach, boats, fishing airconditioning. Can you imagine being sealed in a hygienic plastic bag? No dust here. No taro or kava. No Nananu villages, no toads, or mosquitoes, and definitely no constipation or 'the other extreme!

On the plane home I wondered what I was. I am certainly a New Zealander. I am Lucky. I am well off. but perhaps I am selfish and greedy. I could be more friendly and helpful to others. I could enjoy life without material possessions. It's funny that I hadn't thought much about these things before.

#### POSTSCRIPT:

The 1974 field trip has opened up exciting possibilities. A suggestion that in the near future students and teacher exchange between Rutherford and Avele College, Samoa, on a one term basis, is being seriously considered.

A field trip to the South Island has been planned for May 1975. This will be the fifth probe Rutherford has made to that distant corner of our land. Volunteers queue up, for Mr Aitken's soup is delicious and the silhouette of Mr Laver in his nightgown is a sight to behold.

For third and fourth formers 1976 should be a year to remember. An expedition to Malaysia and Singapore (and perhaps Indonesia) is planned. Mr Sinclair could well be there with his trusty panama hat, Mr Coughlan with his pack of cards, Mr Laver with his frying pan, Mr Aitken somewhere in a suitcase, and Miss D. and Miss W. bringing liberation to the female species of these SouthEast Asian Lands.



### RUTHERFORD IN PERSPECTIVE

All of us have at some time said that our school lacks spirit but does anyone know why this is so? It is therefore my purpose to look at the school objectively to try and get some insight into the problems which have almost eradicated school spirit from our establishment.

Rutherford is known for its willingness to stick its head out in the development of new ideas and improvements in education. An example of this was the Evaluation Day which gave teachers and pupils an opportunity to put forward ideas which they felt would improve teaching throughout the school.

But it is my opinion, shared by many, that our school's desire for the ultimate in academic success has too often overlooked the emotions of people. It is people who make up any organisation; without people no business, society, club or school would exist. Rutherford High School is, therefore, not a collection of buildings that stands on that wind-blown, over-exposed bit of land in Te Atatu, but a collection of approximately 1700 pupils and staff, each with varied interests and emotions.

When these people are happy, there is school spirit. They are not happy.

Any amateur psychologist will tell you that to stimulate creativity one must have an interesting environment to work in. It was suggested in an Evaluation Day report that Rutherford was more forbidding in appearance than Paremoremo. Battle-ship grey is the colour of the Navy, and the Police and Justice Departments — and Rutherford High School. Rutherford is a place to study and create; battle-ship grey does not stimulate these activities. Let us hope that the colour for the forthcoming re-paint will be a better choice.

The second major reason for the lack of school spirit is that in relation to other local high schools Rutherford is far too conservative in its grooming regulations which seem to all pupils and many staff members to be too stringent. A more liberal attitude would reduce friction. When people develop resentment they protest. Pupils at Rutherford protest by demolishing toilet blocks, defacing school equipment and dropping litter.

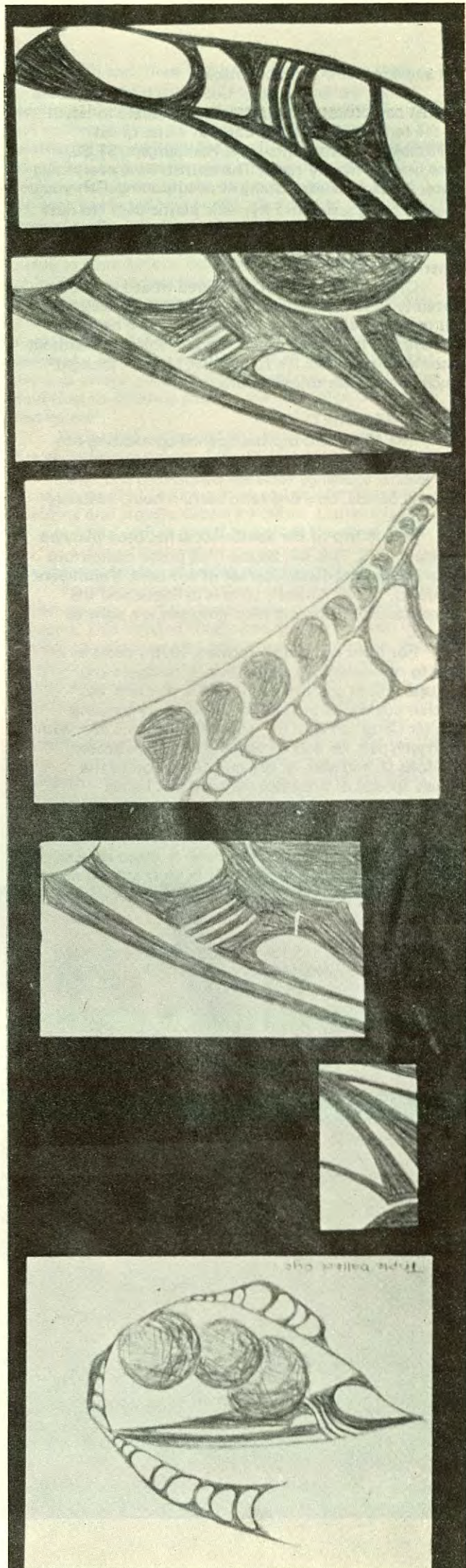
This year School Council has recognised these activities as forms of protest and although it can do little about school regulations, it can do a great deal about cleaning up the school and generally improving the environment in which we work. This jump on to the environmental band wagon is perhaps the major change of policy our School Council has made, and as it did not occur until halfway through the year little benefit may yet be seen. However, here are some of the things we feel we have achieved; a day-long clean-up of litter; a grant to the school of \$50.00 for trees and shrubs; a rubbish-tin redistribution programme; and major changes in uniform regulations, notably mufti for the sixth form.

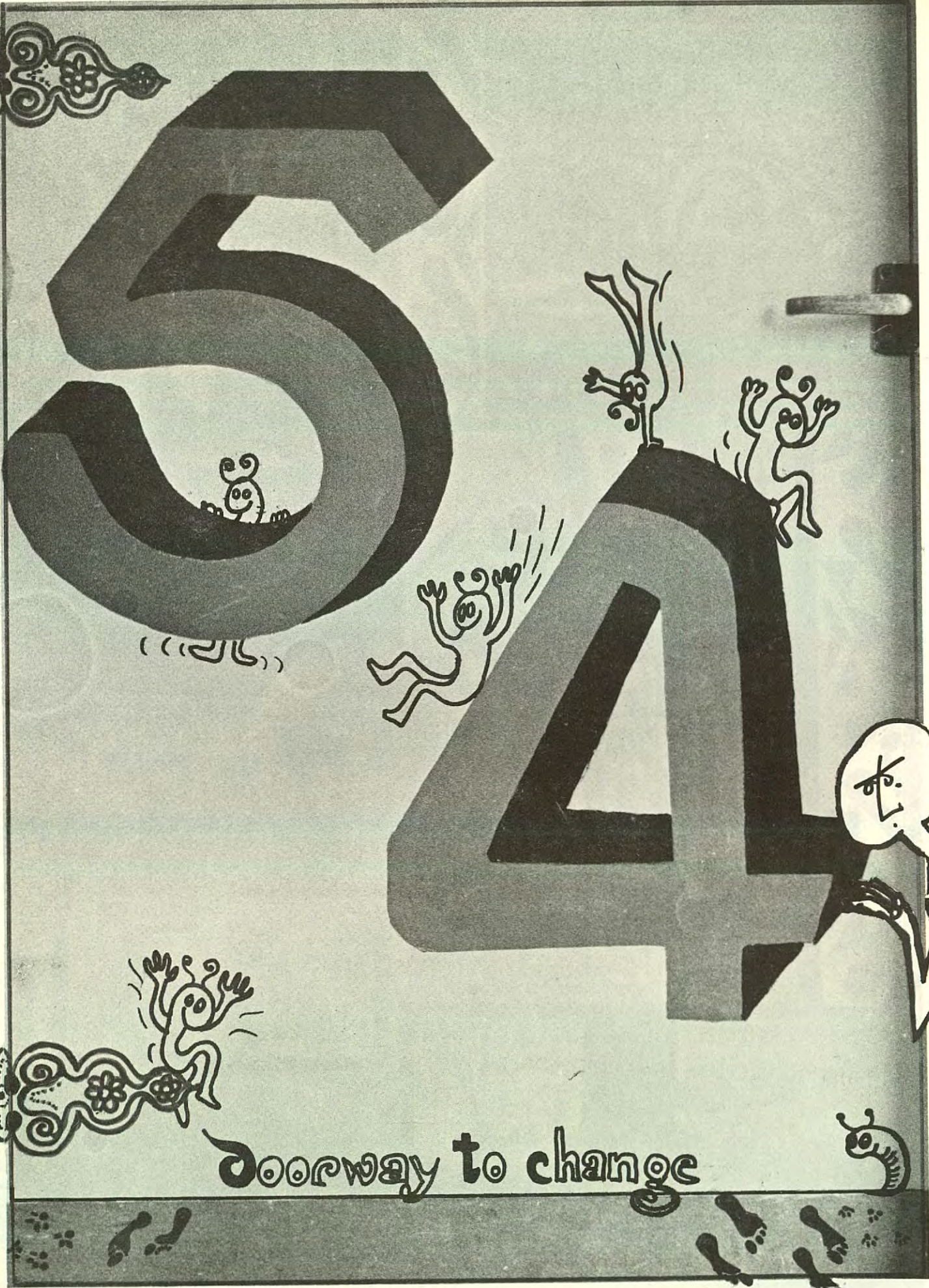

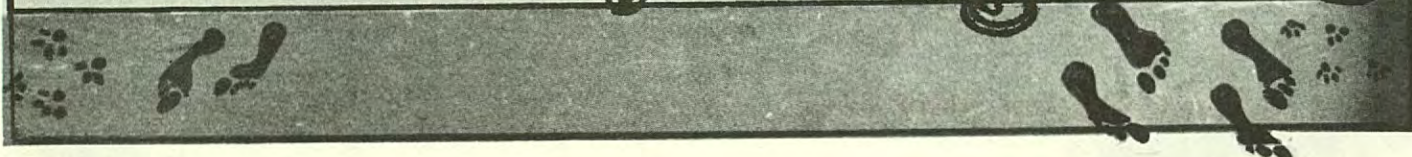

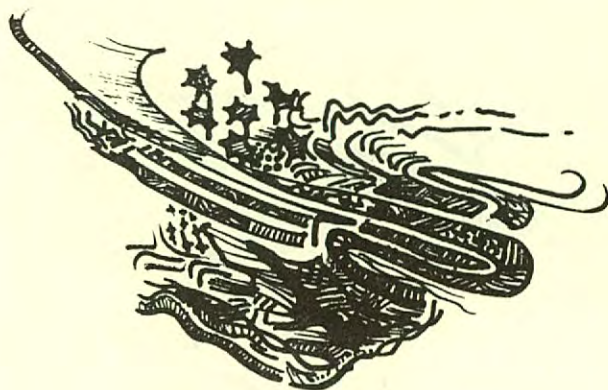
### YOU DON'T KNOW WHAT YOU'VE GOT 'TIL IT'S GONE

### MORNING OF THE EARTH

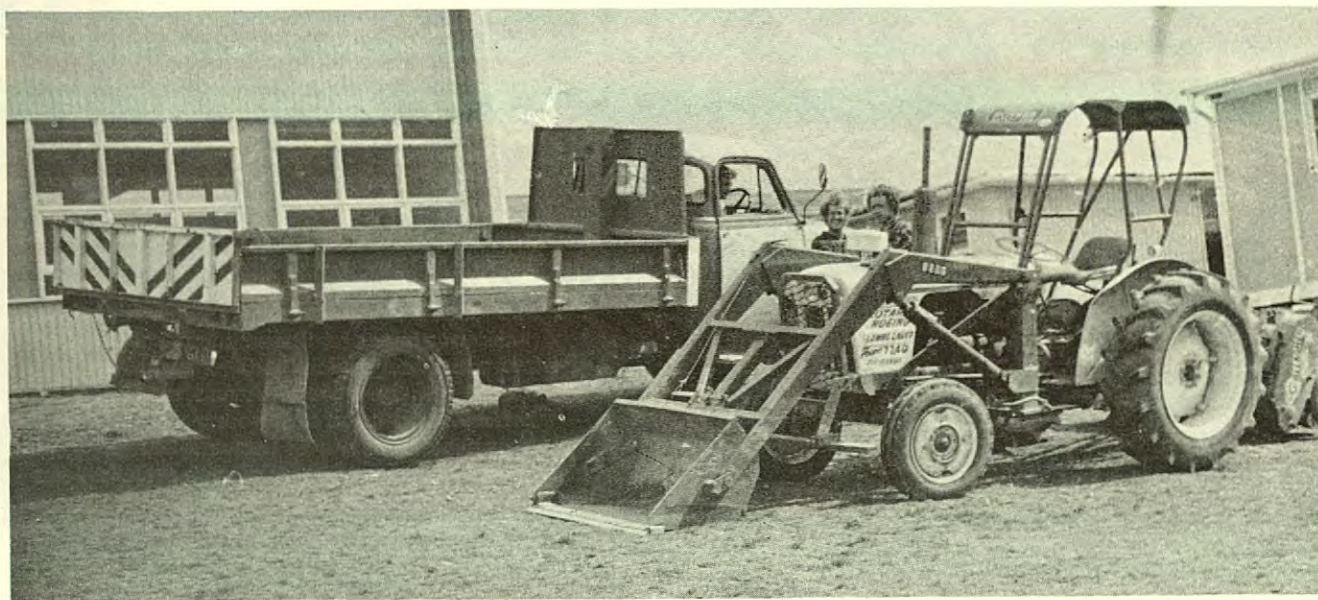
I saw the sun today
