Because of Miss Corston's influence Rutherford has always been a coeducational school in the fullest meaning of the word - girls have at all times enjoyed equal status and the number of women staff have balanced the men.

We say goodbye to her with sorrowful hearts but rejoice with Kelston in their good fortune in gaining a Principal with lots of first class ideas and a progressive philosophy of education.

For this year, however, all is not lost. Work is proceeding at a feverish pace on three One-Act plays which will be presented for a two-night season early in the third term. We ardently hope that by the time this magazine makes its appearance these three comedies will have taken an honourable, if modest, place in Rutherford theatrical history.
Plans for next year include the possibilities of a modern musical and an entry in the $\mathbb{N} . Z$. Theatre Federation One-Act Play Festival, but the success of these plans will depend entirely upon a vigorous and enthusiastic response from members. All third form pupils this year took part in Rutherford's first Outdoor Education Camp held at Hunua. This area provided plenty of opportunity for the three main aims of the camps - Challenge, Self-Discipline, Enjoyment. All third formers spent two and a half days at camp and almost all of them said sadly as they left on the bus home, "Why can't we stay longer?" A true indication of the enjoyment had at camp. Of course some activities were tackled with less enthusiasm than others. Cleaning toilets, burning rubbish, sweeping bunk rooms, for some strange reason, were not tackled with the same vigour and energy as bushcrashing, eeling, map reading, swimming, bridge-building, stream walking, climbing the pipeline. The highlight of each camp was the long dayhike - a choice of 3 hikes of varying degrees of difficulty, each full of challenge and full of fun.

Of course lots of mistakes were made at our first Outdoor Education Camp, but it was a challenge physically, mentally and socially to pupils and teachers - a very exhausting experience for some but at the same time full of fun and laughter.


THE EASTER TRIP TO MAYOR ISLAND
The bus was to leave at 6 from Auckland, but arrived an hour late in the main street of the dead and deserted coastal town of Tauranga. Out popped eleven unruly kids in the charge of a somewhat embarrassed, recently adopted Mum (Miss Wilson). The tents were finally pitched when the midnight bell had rung. We had to make the most of the foot freezing five hours of sleep we were to get before we had to rise and shine, just to catch the boat to our final destination - Mayor Island.
After a long journey by boat, we set foot on solid ground again, only to have to set up camp for the second time in twelve hours. This was to be home for 3 days.
All of us kids (boys included), under Mum's eye, prepared meals, which if not attended were missed, and you just went hungry. Cooking over gas was all right, but washing dishes in pots that couldn't hold a bread and butter plate was something else! So we finally let the sea be our tub, and the sand our pot cleaner.
The reef was the highlight of the trip. Seeing schools of brightly coloured fish swimming among the seaweed was incredible.
We finally arrived home by bus at about llp.m. Monday night.

The South Island couldn't have expected us because there were no brass bands present at Christchurch International (I hesitate to call it that) Airport, however they very soon realised that we, R.H.S., had arrived. That was Friday, May 9th, 1975. Thirty two pupils and six ever so brave teachers departed from Auckland International (I'm sure of that) Airport and sixty three minutes later arrived in that wild part of the dominion that we had heard so much about but could not enter until we formed a large enough group to ward off the natives in times of crisis.
After our luggage was collected we all made our way to our 'yellow Cougar bus' which was to be our transport for the thirteen days of fun and games that lay ahead. That thirteen days was to take us through Fairlie, Queenstown, Invercargill, Manapouri, Milford, Alexandra and then back to Christchurch.
On the way to Fairlie we stopped at a Canterbury mixed intensive grassland farm (which to the disappointment of some did not grow carrots). Various farming techniques were explained to us but in the excitement of the sheep escaping all was soon forgotten. Who did leave the gate open anyway? Thank God there was a country boy handy, (a sort of Little Bo-Peep who lost his sheep) and within minutes this courageous young Aucklander had all the little baby lammies back in their pen. SPIRIT OF ADVENTURE - VOYAGE 36 5-15 AUGUST 1975
On Tuesday 5th August at lOa.m. we joined the ship at Marsden Wharef. We were given our wet weather gear and we then packed all the provisions on board. On this trip there were 27 trainees and 6 permanent crew. We were divided up into three watches, Red, White, and Blue, and we were then told our sailing stations for the next three days, after which we would swap to another position.
The next day we were woken at 6a.m. We had Phys Ed on Marsden Wharf, and then we sailed out of Harbour, heading towards TiriTiri and then to Mahurangi for our first night at sea. From Mahurangi, we went to Kawau, Pakatoa, Te Kouma Harbour, Coromandel, Waiheke and Motuihe. The whole trip was neat and we had a gunny time.
The ship has a book for records set on different voyages. These include: 14 second streak by the Captain, 14 people in one bunk and 15 on one chair. On our voyage we set several new records - a 14 second streak to the top of the mast by one of the trainees, 73 prunes eaten in one sitting, and 14 guys in one shower.
Next year there will be another chance for Rutherford pupils to join a cruise. My advice is, don't miss it.

On Saturday September 8th, at 9.50, Air New Zealand Flight TE404 took off from a grey windswept cold Auckland International Airport, and 2 hours and forty minutes later it landed at Tontouta International Airport, New Caledonia. About 1 hour later we arrived at the Noumea Hotel on the Baie de Citrons (Bay of Lemons) and our holiday had begun. We disembarked from our bus and diced with death crossing the road, because all French and New Caledonian drivers are maniacs, and they all drive on the wrong side of the road. So there we stood, the cream of Rutherford High School, Nrs Rainer and her French Phrase book, shrieking: "Il perd du sang." (he's losing blood), which bore no reference to the occasion, Mr Hunt with his movie camera at the ready, Mr Haigh arguing with the people in the hotel Mr Stewart chatting up some girls in a car, and Mrs o'Neill having a well deserved rest, a thing she was to do with great dexterity, and quite frequently, later. After settling in, we all decided to go and watch some native cricket, which is played entirely by women. What a shambolic affair. There were 4 women at the wicket at the one time, with a rather evil pile of bats of assorted shapes and sizes behind each set of stumps. The idea was to score as many runs as possible - how they achieved this was a totally different matter, I don't think anyone quite figured how it was done. On Sunday we went to a Melanesian Festival called Melanesia 2000. It was quite an affair. It was designed to portray the Melanesian way of life, showing their customs, dances, rituals etc.
On Wednesday we went on a trip to Mont Dore for a native meal called a Bougna. On the way we visited the historic missions of La Conception and St Louis. These are very old churches and the stained-glass windows in them were very beautiful. The Bougna was run by a French woman, who does this especially for the tourists. It is the Melanesian form of a 'hangi', and consists of potato, sweet potato; taro, yam and chicken, all bathed in coconut milk, wrapped in banana leaves, and cooked in the ground. I don't know anyone who didn't like it. On Thursday we went to the Amedee Lighthouse. This stands on an island 28 km south of Noumea, and is the third largest in the world. It is 53 m high, which is a long way up if you have to climb it.
On Friday we had a free day to spend our few remaining francs on the irresistable souvenirs. And that night our last dinner was enjoyed at the local restaurant, "Le Sydney". Next morning (Saturday) we packed up and left for the airport. We staggered on board our D.C. 8 for the return voyage, and we finally touched down at 3:50. Was it worth all the money? I think I could speak for everyone in saying: YES. And I know we would all like to thank Mr Haigh and all the other members of staff who made the trip possible.

Eighteen months ago Rutherford was officially designated a Community School. At that time phrases like "Community School", "Community Education", were flowing readily from the lips of teachers because we all thought these things were a jolly good idea. We still do - more so now than before, but do you understand what these phrases mean? Let me try and explain. Community education is a process of education designed to meet the needs of the whole community - and not just the students who must attend school because they are too young to leave. Remember that the word education applies to any activity which meets the needs of an individual or a group. Learning to play badminton or indoor basketball; learning to bake a cake, studying for an examination subject or learning how to live with your neighbours - these are a few of the thousands of learning experiences which can come under the general heading of "education". At school, students work to a fairly well defined curriculum. However, once away from the wchool these restrictions disappear and every subject, every skill, every opportunity that the eager school leaver has ever yearned to experience is awaiting him (or her) - and he knows he has another fifty years of life ahead of him (probably half of it leisure time) in which to satisfy his hungry appetite for learning. Or does he? The truthful answer is no. Firstly the majority of school leavers are unaware of the fact that they will continue to develop and change in mind and body with every day that passes. These changes require mental, physical and emotional adjustments. Making adjustments successfully means learning how to cope with them - new job, a need for additional qualifications or training, marriage, growing children, responsibility, increased leisure time, family health, retirement, bereavement. These are just a few of the adjustments most of us will have to face in our lives. Secondly, even if every school leaver was aware of his changing basic needs, he would be fortunate indeed to live in a community which could offer all the necessary services, educational opportunities, recreational facilities etc., necessary for his continued development. Community Education is the process which works towards this ideal situation in the community. A Community Education Programme is the stage at which the majority of the community become involved, by attending classes, joining a social or recreational activity, and so on. Community Education, in order to arrive at a programme which meets the many and varied needs of all sectors of the community, requires the understanding, support and involvement of many people. . The community must look at itself and ask some questions.
"Is this a 'good' community to live,work, bring up a family in?"
"Does this community offer opportunities for the individual to develop as a person?"
"What does this community have in the way of facilities, services, people, that can help to make this a place where opportunities for development exist?"
"Can I help?"
Although every school belongs in a community and is therefore a community school, the term as it applies to Rutherford means that we have recognised our responsibilities to the wider community. Rutherford High School with its extensive human and physical resources is moving towards involvement in the total process of Community Education in Te Atatu. We are but one of the many "learning centres" on the peninsular catering for the educational needs of a minority group. Students, parents, teachers and the community at large must learn to regard 'education' as a lifelong process involving the Community as a whole - not only those privileged by age or intellect to attend a formal institution.
