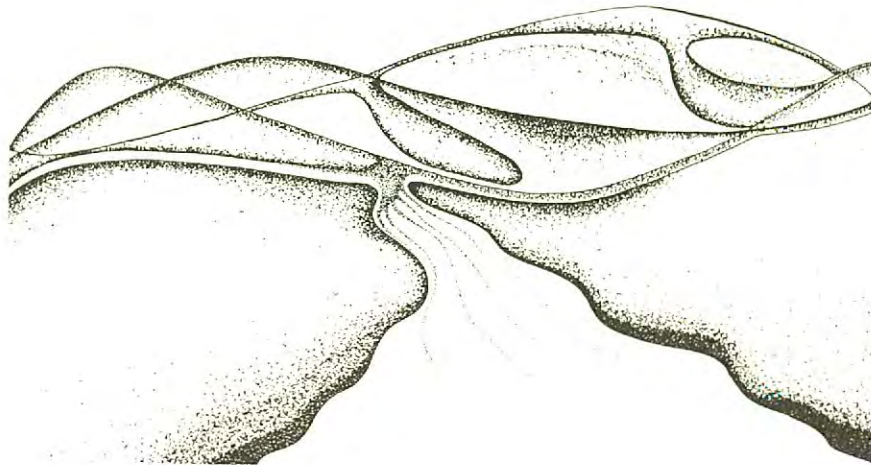

THE FLIGHT OF THE HERON



Each year in a February junior assembly, we are reminded of the origin of our emblem, the kotuku. In the earliest days of the school the kotuku, or white heron, swooped across the Te Atatu peninsula, a harbinger of good luck and happy omens of a bright future for the new school under its wing.

That was sixteen years ago, and the school flourished and soared like the kotuku, as its early members sensed the excitement of being part of a new community, lifting the place with enthusiastic idealism. Each year the kotuku and its mate returned to the area and surveyed their territory. In Maori legend the kotuku guides man in his search for enlightenment, skill and knowledge. This quest is part of the Rutherford tradition, and students in the early years won for the school a reputation that is proudly held. The kotuku seemed an apt symbol.

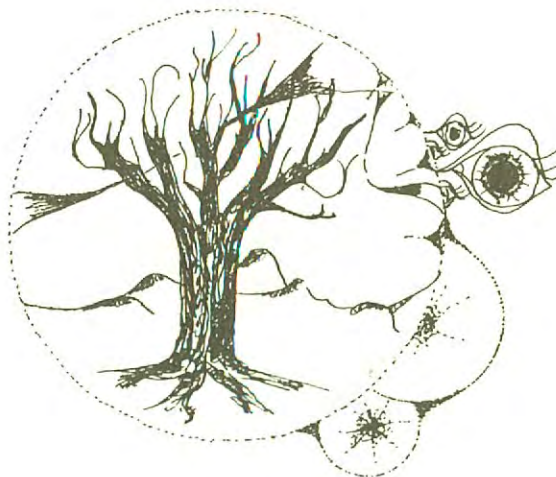
However, it is a few years now since the kotuku has been seen regularly over the district. Has our spirit-bird flown to newer lands, has he grown old and tired, has he become extinct, does he feel no-one cares or needs him?

Early members of the school, like the kotuku chicks, have flown the nest. They are to be found in all walks of life - trades, professions, commerce - and in many countries of the world. The oldest of our former students could soon indeed be parents of second-generation Rutherfordians. Will these young people follow the same quest here that their parents did? As the Maori legend tells us, the three baskets of learning for man's use on earth can be sought from the supreme God, Io. Will our second generation students seek and find them or will they find that the kotuku's spirit has taken flight like the heron itself, if it feels its purpose is empty?

We must protect the things that are worthwhile and ensure that the spirit for which the school has been justly proud does not become extinct. We wax our surfboards, we tune the engine of our Kawasaki 500. But do we, with the same enthusiasm, polish our caring for others, do we tune up our involvement with the whole community, do we really concern ourselves with enlightenment and through this gain skill and knowledge?

The kotuku has left us; we should wonder why. An empty nest is a barren and hollow symbol.

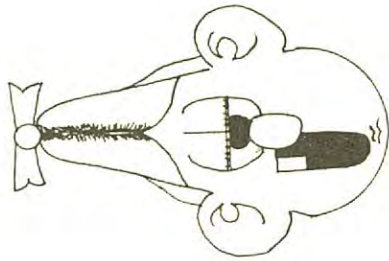

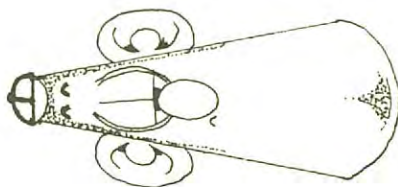

PUPILS TOLD OF THEIR VITAL ROLE

The continued progress and development of New Zealand and the quality of the future depends on today's youth playing an effective part, Miss Denese Henare said yesterday.

Miss Henare, who is a barrister and solicitor and a member of the Royal Commission on Contraception, Sterilisation and Abortion, was speaking to students, staff and guests at Rutherford High School on the day set aside to honour the school's namesake, Lord Rutherford.

She told pupils that effectiveness relied on collective action.

"Doing your own things or doing nothing at all is an indulgence we can ill afford," she said.

Sit Back

"Throughout the world there is conflict, suffering and war. Bitter confrontations exist on practically all issues and challenges cry out from moral, social and political levels.

"We cannot and must not sit back in individual ease and watch the world go by."

Miss Henare said it was important for people to know what they wanted and how best to achieve their aims.

She also felt it was time to extend social engineering and to increase understanding in the field of "people communications."

"Much time, energy and skill is expended upon material inventiveness, new technical possibilities, yet social engineering is sadly neglected," she said. "We must not lose sight of ideals. We must not become slaves to dreams or servants of regrets.

"Ideals still hold true. It is simply that they have not been thoroughly tried."

Miss Henare said people who wanted their expectations realised must act immediately before the march of malignant progress walked over them.

But she urged students to realise and respect that other people lived in the world and regard must be paid to reasonable action.

For the last sixteen years Mr Berridge has been described by pupils as "the big teacher" for few on the staff have exceeded his height and few still his breadth of shoulder. He will be remembered not only for his build but also for the outstanding contribution he has made to Rutherford.

As a foundation staff member Mr Berridge was responsible for setting up the Technical Department and guiding it through its growth of the early years. When he was appointed a Dean in 1970, the emphasis in his work gradually shifted to the administrative side of the school and especially after his appointment as Senior Master in 1973.

Pupils in his technical classes were fortunate in being taught by a teacher of his calibre and sincerity - only his best was good enough and he expected a similar response from his pupils.

It was on the sports side that Mr Berridge made his greatest impact. Since, in his younger days, he had been a topflight player of tennis and rugby in North Auckland, at Rutherford he used his expertise to coach many school teams in these codes. Later he took up cricket, playing for Te Atatu Club and coaching a junior school team. (Who can remember when he was knocked out by being caught on the chin by a hard driven cricket ball while he was umpiring an interschool game?) His enthusiasm for participation in sport benefited hundreds of Rutherford pupils and even after a recurrence of an old injury forced his retirement from active coaching he maintained his contact with teams as a spectator. With his large, multicoloured broly, he was a familiar figure at Saturday matches.



But what of the man himself? To a newcomer he was, perhaps, a little awesome but to those who knew him better he was a modest person with a sense of fairness and deep concern for others. Endowed with a puckish sense of humour, an extensive vocabulary and a colourful turn of phrase he could make his point, if need be, by merely changing the expression on his mobile face. A man with a great many interests - a person who will be missed by both the school and the community.

We congratulate him on his appointment as Deputy Principal of Whangaroa College and extend to him and Mrs Berridge our best wishes for the future.

The trip included a look at the enormous Golden Circle Pineapple Cannery, lunch among the koalas, kangaroos and snakes at the Lone Pine Koala Sanctuary, a trip up Mt Coot-tha to view the huge sprawl of Brisbane, and a tour of the inner city. Our first impression of Australia was one of gum trees, brown grass and houses on stilts.

During the afternoon we set up camp. Our tents consisted of one pole in the centre and a peg in each corner, and it didn't take long for all of us to get the knack of erecting them - although some people, like Miss Corston and Mrs Williams required the help of some of the masculine members of the party.

While at Rockhampton, we visited a huge open cast mine at Mt Morgan - the size of it alone, was enough to take our breath away. Shopping was good in Rockhampton, and many purses were considerably lighter after an afternoon shopping.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION CAMP

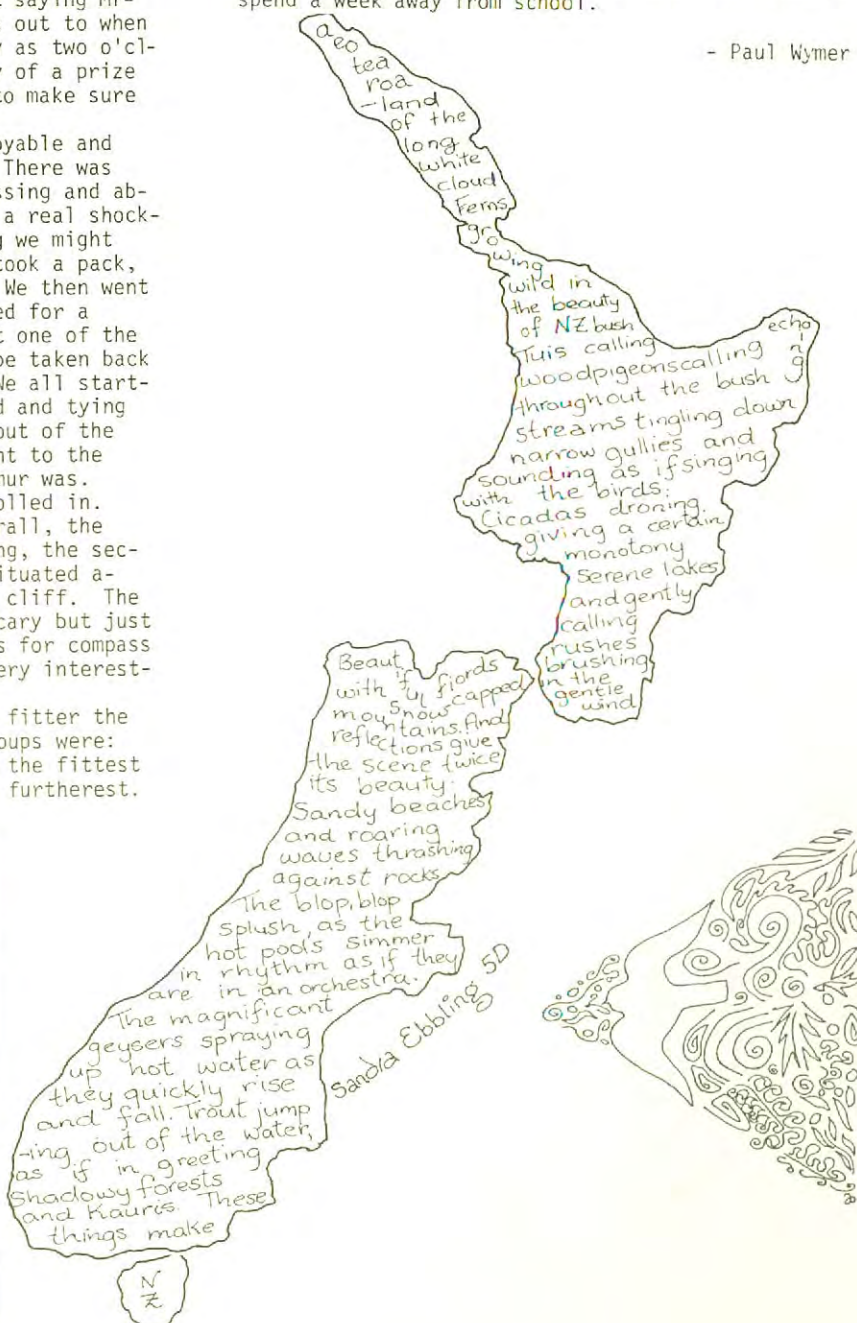

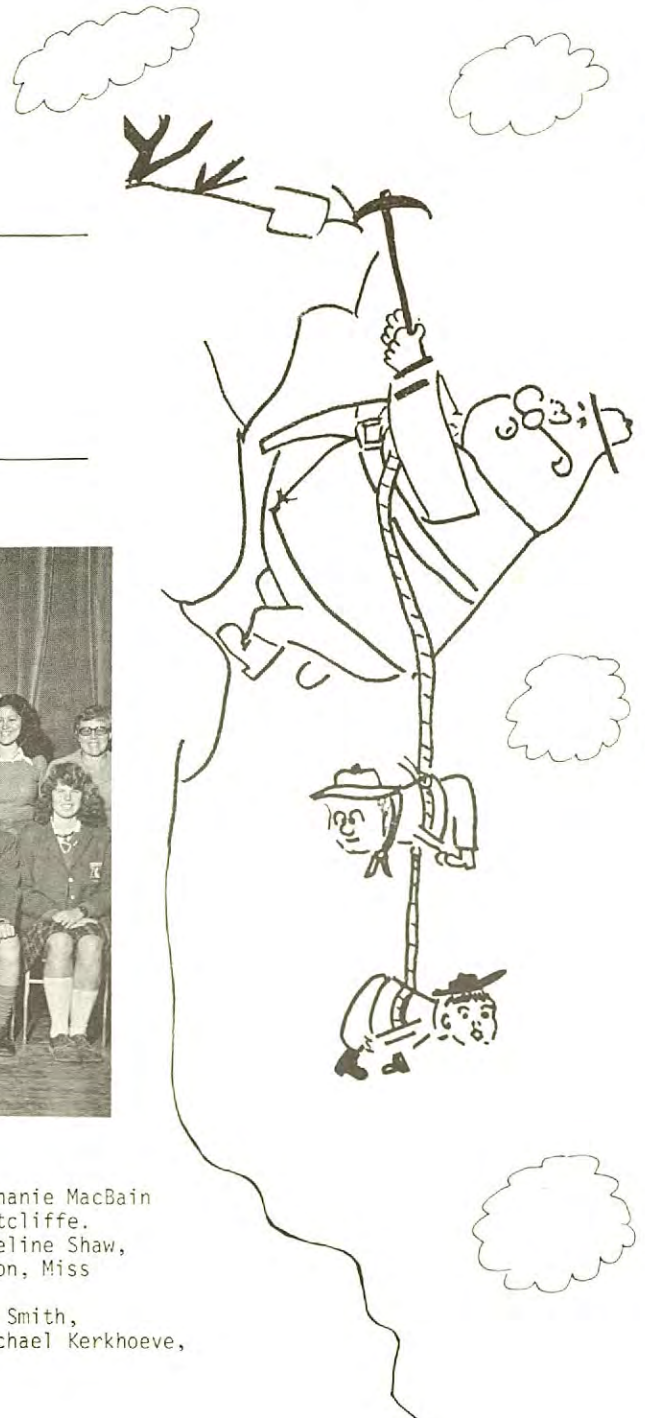

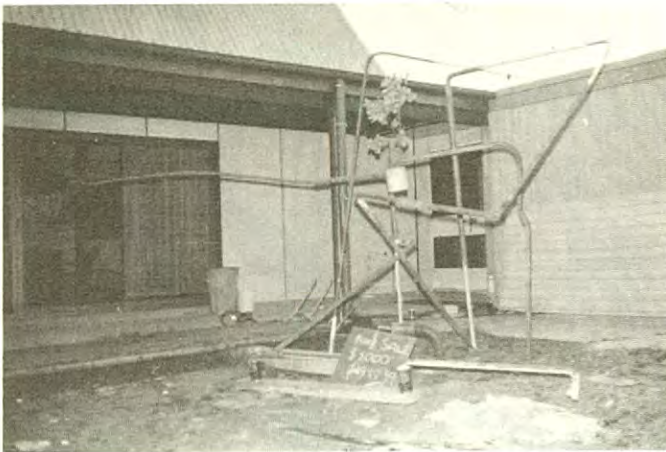

The candy dropped off the laden Rosalie, and suddenly it was coming faster than I could eat it, but what could I do?

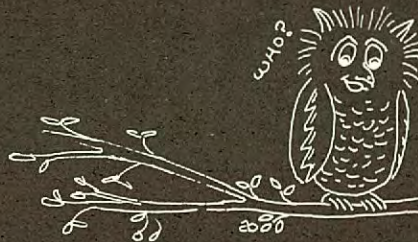

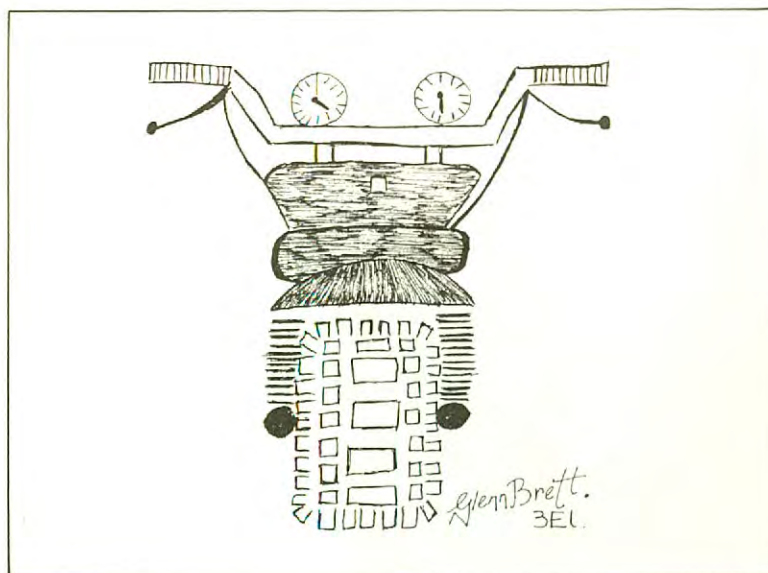
1st XI HOCKEY

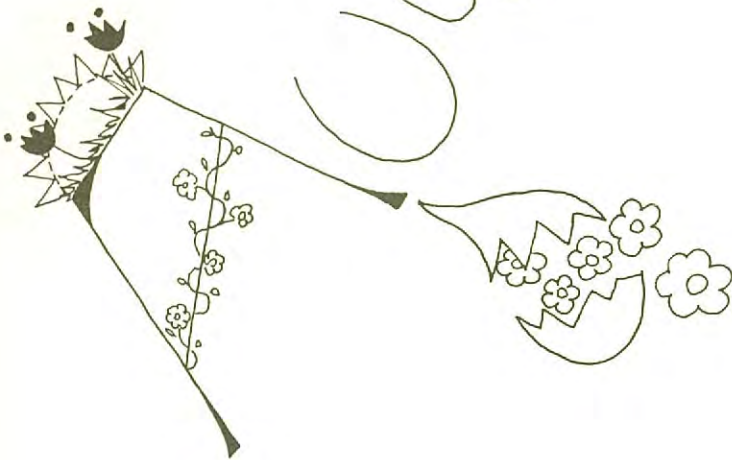
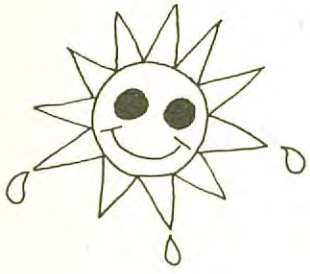
