PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

There is an old Chinese curse which goes along the lines "May you live in interesting times!" Well, in this Millennium year it is indeed very true that we live in interesting times.

The key then to human happiness has to lie in our **attitude** to those local and world changes.

Rutherford is an extraordinary school in the atmosphere it preserves, the goodwill it displays and in the range of achievements it encompasses.

The Effectiveness Review undertaken by the Education Review Office "Rutherford College is a student-centred school with a diverse campus, strong tradition and inclusive culture. The campus includes facilities for Maori, pre-school and community education. Pride in the school's heritage is reflected in annual celebrations of Lord Rutherford's achievements and a school tradition of effective science education. Trustees, staff and students maintain an excellent school tone.



Students make the most of the high quality learning opportunities. They are well-motivated learners who demonstrate pride in their achievements and their school. Compared to schools with similar characteristics, a high number of students leave the school with qualifications, including success in University Bursary examinations. They gain high levels of entry into tertiary education and employment.

Effective curriculum leadership supports a culture of continuous improvement. A good level of compliance with legislative requirements characterises board administration. The board conducts its business efficiently." These comments by the Review panel are indeed cause for pride.

We record with gratitude that four laboratories, four computer rooms and twelve classrooms have been upgraded.

Having noted these things, my concern is focussed on the relevance of much of the curriculum taught in these "interesting times" and the huge challenges of creating a campus more attuned to and equipped for the notable variety of our student population academically, culturally and socially.

Leaders Report

Three deputies, two Head Girls and a Head Boy ... Rutherford has had more than its fair share of head students this year. Head girl, Natasha Walker was accepted for Teachers College; Deputy Head Girl, Ga Young Choi left to return to Korea with her family. Shivonne Prasad accepted the role of Head Girl and Angela Lowe became her Deputy. Paul Erbs, Head Boy, was supported by Joshua Goddard.



The first major task of the head students was to select members for their Student Executive team. Senior students applied for this privilege and once accepted they worked co-operatively with the Junior Council.

Mufti Days, the third form Barbecue, Daffodil Day - collecting in support of Cancer research and the introduction of a recycling scheme at school were the areas of focus during the year. The recycling scheme was organised by the Environmental Committee and it was chaired by a member of the Student Executive.



Organisation of the major social event of the year - the school ball, occupied the feature spot during term two.

There were several perks to being a head student. Among them were meeting and greeting guests on Rutherford Day; joining them at the

luncheon afterwards and getting an insight into the staff domain.

We made several discoveries this year. Not least of these was the realisation that we had put ourselves in roles of frequent scrutiny from the staff and the students. Both had certain expectations of us and our

goal this year has been to strike a balance between these.

We hope our efforts to be worthy head students has been worthwhile for all who judged us - it certainly has been for us.

Students Reaching Students

Our Students Health Promoting team started off the year with a BBQ at the school pool. This served as a planning and team building day. As part of Sanitarium's promotion for the breakfast drink 'Up and Go', the school received approximately 1 200 samples, these were distributed by the SRS team to promote the importance of breakfast. Some of the SRS team took part in the Sexual Harassment Contact people training day and are now recognised for this role throughout the school.

Fia Fia night was jointly organised by the SRS and the Pacific Island group. It was good to have two groups combine to promote Health issues as well as share talent.

The major issue that has been highlighted throughout the school over the past two years has been that of 'Smoke Free'. This continues to be a focal point with emphasis on feeling good about yourself, 'Hauora' total well-being.

The SRS aims to recognise Health issues concerning students, physical and emotional well being. It is hoped that as a Health Promoting school, we can all strive to improve the health of all school personnel, families and community members.

Sexual Harassment Contact People

This year 27 students were trained as sexual harassment contact people by Ms Tai and Ms Falkiner.

Students were selected with regard to their ethnic background; gender and willingness to undertake the role. They are accessible to any students in the school grounds to talk things over if they feel that they are being sexually harassed.

The contact people introduced themselves at Form Assemblies and their photo has been distributed to Form Classes for reference. A group of staff are also trained in this role.

Next year we hope to widen the focus of the training programme so that these students will be able to mediate all types of harassment issues.

Junior Council

This year's Junior Council has consisted mostly of year nine students with two brave year tenners flying the flag for their level.

It has been impressive to hear the quality of some of the discussions with several initiatives having been taken, including a homework survey, and a concerted attack on the perennial problem of rubbish around the school.

A number of Junior Council concerns have been discussed by the Student Executive, and it is hopeful that some solutions can be found to the problem of students' bags and their weight.

Early in the year, the council expressed concern that the school should encourage re-cycling. That, too, was an issue addressed by the Student Executive, with the result that re-cycling facilities have been promoted and used throughout the school.

Tomasi Matofa was an efficient chairperson early in the year and Charlotte Hall took on the secretary's role. In Term Three Tomasi having decided to withdraw, the chair passed by popular vote, to Karis Wolfgramm.

Student Advisors

These are senior students who were trained by Graham Johnson and Jan Tosswill to support and encourage our junior students who have been referred by their dean for peer mediation.

Demand for this service necessitated a second recruitment of advisors. They meet every Monday at interval for group supervision with Ms Tai and Elenore Byrne, our School Psychologist. The advisors meet with their student at least once a week during SSR, helping them with their homework or setting personal/behavioural goals for the following week.

The role modelling done by the seniors epitomises family looking after each other.

particular was spotlighted for the high calibre of teaching it provides our students.

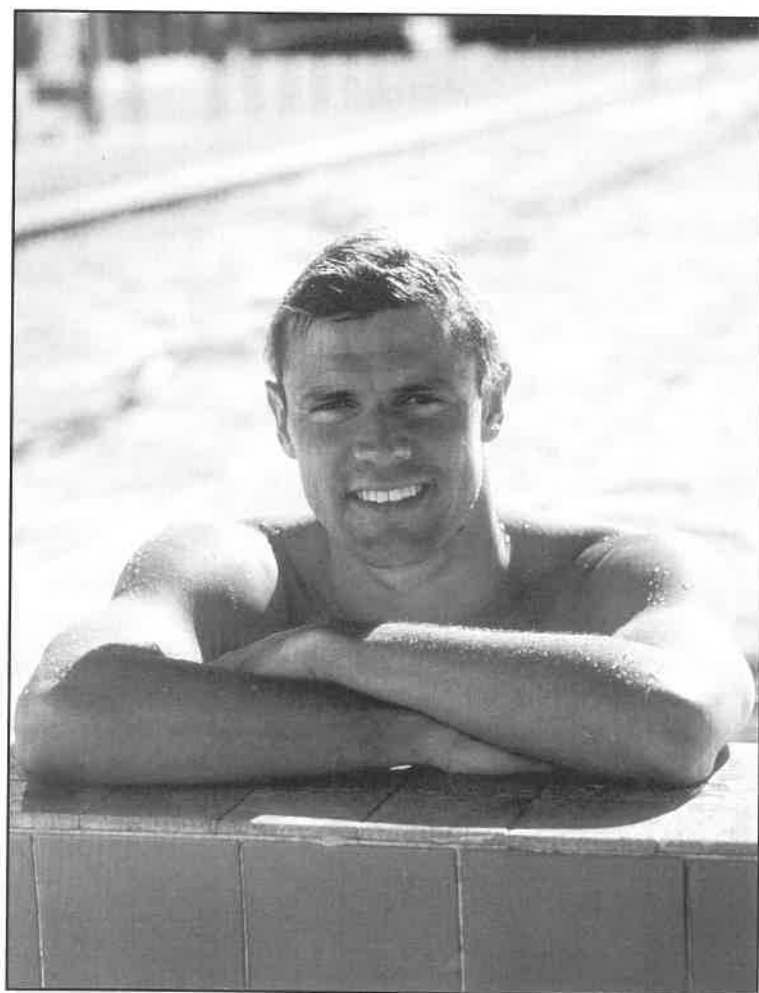

Although this play was written in the 1940s, it still related a lot to us as students and as teenagers. The humour in it was still funny after 50 years of change and also having been translated from German. Mr Farrimond suggested ideas to perfect this performance. As soon as he announced that we would practice the play on the abandoned Motutapu Island I knew that I would enjoy it. Before we were assigned roles Mr Farrimond took us through a metaphorical task of relating the main theme of the play to one that we might be familiar with. The play being about rights and ownership, we related it to Maori land issues. Once we got through that, we could actually begin to understand how to perform the play. Mr Farrimond treated us like a professional acting cast. We read through the script to get a feel of the characters and which ones might suit us and we suggested our ideas to him. But the final choice was his.





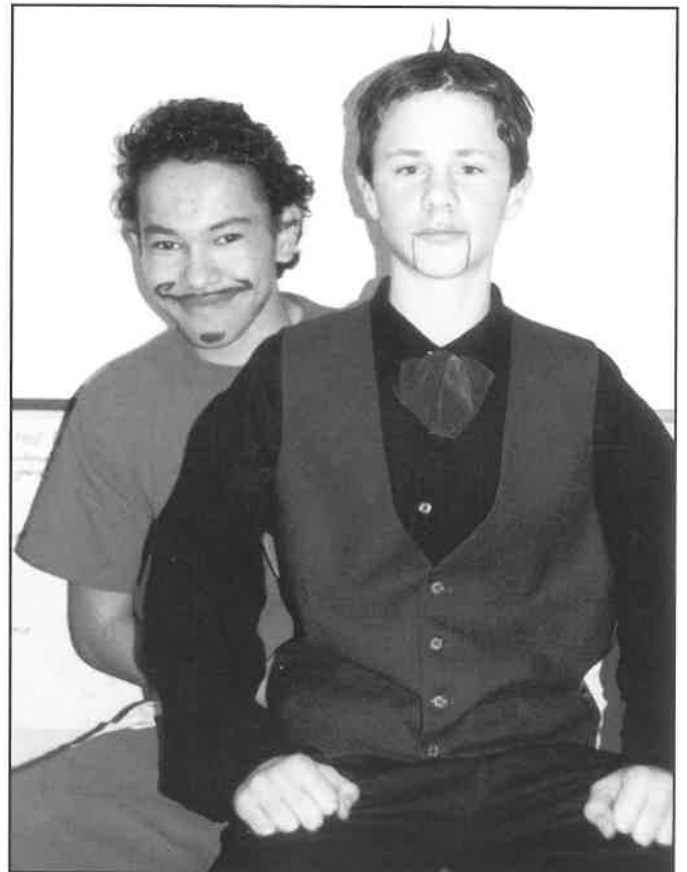
Once in role we were able to practice our lines and then 'unpractice them' as Mr Farrimond would say. This meant we could not perform lines as if we were remembering them, we had to understand them in the context of the play. The eight day expedition on Motutapu Island included a large hall, where the play was practised until perfect, a cabin by the beach, where we slept and socialized and just open land – the key factor of location choice. Mr Farrimond believed that the best way to practice was over a period of time on a place where there were no distractions and you could go off at any reasonable time and learn your lines. We could not do this at school. It was a very effective idea. We built the set of the play - boxes were scraped and painted; the bamboo curtain poles were pulled out of the grass and cut to size. We did it all ourselves.

The best thing I found I got out of the trip, was the closer relationship with each cast member. If you are close as a group then you are able to help each other improve without any misunderstanding. We laughed at each other's mistakes and congratulated each other on their progress and performance. This made it a lot more comfortable for me and I think the rest of the group too. Once home, we knew it would be fine. We told each other that even if we did make mistakes it didn't matter. It has given me an experience that I will cherish.

MY EARLIEST MEMORY

I have had this story told to me many times. So many in fact, that I'm not quite sure any more whether what I'm saying is my own memory or that of those bearing witness to it. Nevertheless, I will attempt to express what I know of my earliest memory.

The year was 1987, and the sun was shining bright on my small family, consisting at that time of my two parents and me. Although we lived on Waiheke Island, we were currently staying in Auckland with my parents' friends John and Caroline. We had moved across because my mother was nine months pregnant and about to give birth to my little brother.

Early in the morning of 13 July my father had said to me, "Ryan, today you're gonna help me in the workshop." I was delighted because I had a fascination with my father's carpentry work.

That is how I found myself on my father's shoulders, giddily trying to help him repair a window in the outside room. I remember how the sun reflected on the window, shining and causing me to squint from atop my lofty perch.

"Hold on" my dad said, "We're out of screws. We'll go get some more from the workshop."

I rode like a king on my dad's shoulders, past the gigantic greenhouses containing the tomatoes of John's business, past the main house, past the small orchard around the back to the looming workshop.

The workshop was aptly named, and although from the outside it appeared to be any other building, upon entering it you are issued quite a shock. The only sources of light are the doorway and the small window at the far end of the room. The workshop itself is filled with row after row of machines large and small, each equipped with a series of large drills or blades. For a child like myself, going into the workshop was always a thrill, for it appeared to be a dark cave, or a secret lair to something exciting. My father, stooping to fit us both through the door, entered the workshop and walked to the far wall, at which there was a large desk. He placed me on the floor next to him and began rummaging through the contents of the desk, searching for the screws he required. I immediately sneaked away to explore. I was seldom permitted to enter the workshop, so I seized the opportunity. My father was absorbed in his work, and did not notice me straying from his side. I walked around like a kid in a candy store, examining all of the tools with quiet awe. Eventually, I came to the biggest machine of them all, a huge timber-cutting machine loomed before me; its serrated teeth grinning invitingly at me. With my parents warning about not touching the machines ringing in my ears, I approached the grinning beast. I ran my hands over its cold metal surface and then examined my dusty hands. The thrill of doing something so forbidden almost caused me to

tremble and intoxicated with excitement I reached my left hand up and under the safety guard of the blade. Resting my thumb against the serrated edge I stretched out my other arm and flicked the large switch with my right hand.

The sudden sound caused my father to whirl around and what he saw made his face contort in horror. I lay sprawled on my back, the shock having thrown me three feet from the machine and I was covered in blood. "Oh, no!" he cried and sprinted over to me. He knelt on the ground beside me and straight away noticed my thumb, or the lack of one. It had been completely severed from my body. I lay in shock, staring straight ahead, not uttering a sound.

My father picked me up and ran outside, screaming for John with all his might. John came running around the corner and stopped dead when he saw my blood soaked body.

"Get some ice, now! NOW!" my dad yelled.

John went sprinting back around the corner and my dad tried to comfort me. He ripped some fabric from his shirt and put it over my hand trying to stop the bleeding. I blacked out.

I woke up in the hospital with my arm in a cast and my parents looking over me. After eleven hours of surgery my thumb had been sewn back on. I remember my mother started to cry. Then I fell back asleep. That is my earliest memory.

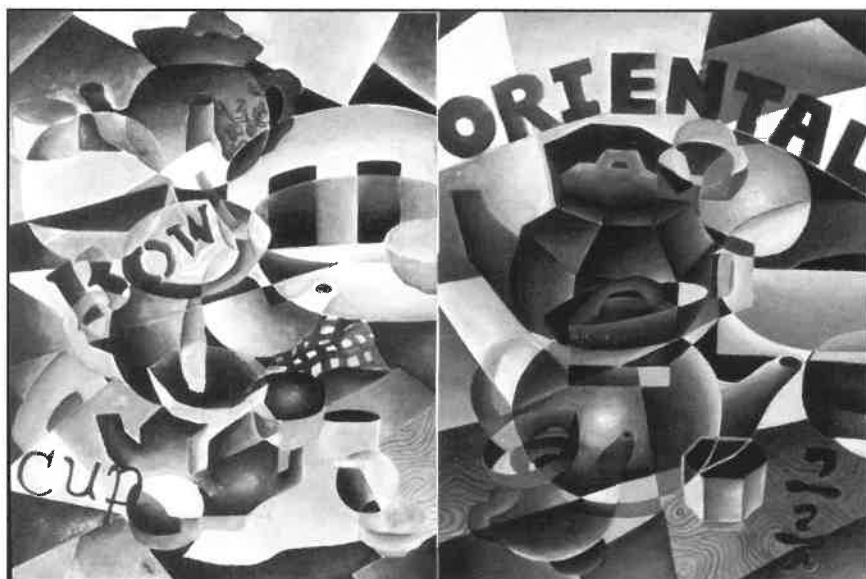
“SPEAK THE SPEECH I PRAY YOU ...TRIPPINGLY ON THE TONGUE”

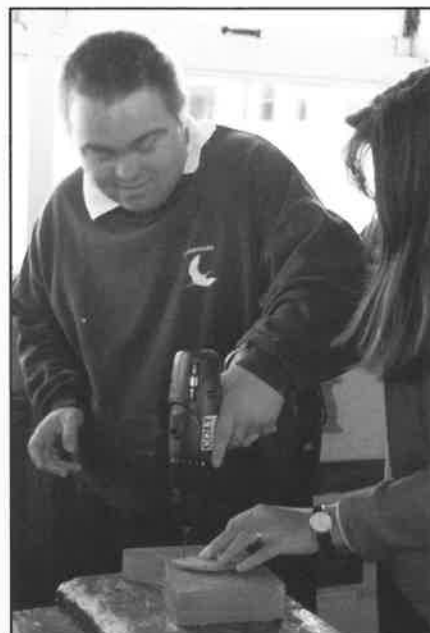

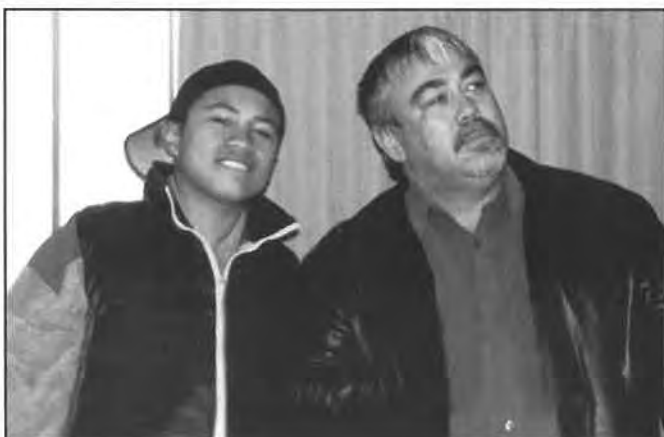

Mentoring Programme

We are particularly grateful to members of our community who have undertaken the mentor training programme; for their time, energy and wisdom they have shared with our students.



Peer Support

The Peer Support Programme which has been running at the College for the last five years allows senior students to have their leadership skills refined at the end of Year 12. This enables them to mentor the Year 9 students in a structured programme that develops self confidence and self esteem and enables these new students to integrate easily and feel comfortable in a large school environment.

On our activities morning, teams faced the challenge of nine skills activities which were enjoyed by all. These were tasks that needed team co-operation, including transporting water through multi-sized pipes, conveying the entire class some distance without touching the grass and walking over obstacles on stilts. This forms a base that provides family size groups of support to raise the standard of achievement and behaviour for all students in all areas of learning.

Studio show cast utilised the opportunity to complete homework during non-performance time.



School Trip to Japan



Seventeen senior students and Miss Martell (accompanied by her friend Sumi) went on an educational trip to Japan during the two week holiday break in April. The purpose of the trip was to learn about the Japanese way of life and culture and practice the Japanese language which they all were learning at school. Some interesting differences were noticed between our cultures, here are some of them:

- Students all have to wear slippers around the school (provided by the school)
- Some houses have tiny shrines outside the gates of their houses
- Most people who live in the city have no garden at all
- Japanese people never wear their shoes inside the house and never walk around anywhere (including inside the house) in bare feet
- There are not very many no-smoking places in Japan

- People carry pet monkeys around in public on their shoulders
- Public playgrounds and school fields seldom have any grass growing on them, they are just plain yellow clay

The tour group visited Osaka, Hiroshima, Kyoto, Nara, Gifu and Tokyo. They experienced two homestays as well as hotel and hostel life. A highlight of their trip was the visit to our sister school in Gifu, Teikyo Kani High School.

Monday 17 April 2000

Today was our first day at our sister school, Teikyo Kani. On the school bus this morning we passed through what Japanese people call countryside, forested hills and flat rice paddy plains. When all 17 Rutherford students and Mr Edmeades had arrived at school we went downstairs to their gymnasium for a welcome ceremonial assembly. We had to introduce ourselves to the school in Japanese and that was a bit nerve-racking for some of us! Christina



did a Pacific Island dance and my host sisters Noriko and Yooko played a traditional Japanese harp. Jung gave them another speech in Japanese (he almost forgot what to say!) and presented the school with a book about New Zealand.

This was the beginning of the school year for Teikyo Kani's students. A bell chiming in the Big Ben tune signalled it was time for our geography lesson. A Teikyo Kani teacher based our lesson on the Gifu area, delivering it in Japanese. Fortunately, Miss Martell was there to translate it for us! Then came the cooking lesson. We made sushi and onigiri (salmon-flavoured rice balls wrapped in seaweed). After a bit of confusion with the Japanese instructions, we finally had the food made and posed for photos with our finished products. After lunch was a calligraphy lesson, Teikyo Kani students are taught this as a subject. We all had a turn at writing the fancy art-form of complicated kanji characters and some of us were so good at it that the teacher pinned them on the wall and drew big orange circles around them (this means 'great work!' in Japan). Even Mr Edmeades showed his expertise in calligraphy! PE was our last lesson of the day and we joined a class of Teikyo Kani girls in the gymnasium. This was a lot of fun, a lot of shouting and a bit of volleyball in between. We finished at 3.30 pm but it wasn't home time yet, we all had to go upstairs and clean the school! Every day after school, all Japanese students clean their schools. We were all running around with giant brooms, mops, brushes and shovels and posing for Sumi recording us. Somehow I don't think much cleaning got done! We were disappointed when the school day ended after the cleaning, for once I wished that maybe school could be just a bit longer. The school buses don't leave until 5.15 pm because most students go to sports clubs or language classes after school. After I arrived back at my host family's house at 6.15 pm I realised I was exhausted but I was very happy because I knew I'd just experienced a day that I'm going to remember for the rest of my life. With Rutherford and Teikyo Kani being sister schools, they are very different sisters.

Lampen Day

For Lampen Day, students specified their areas of interest and wherever possible an insight into these fields was arranged. Students are given two firms to investigate – studying their work ethics; conditions of employment and other factors which contribute to success in business.

Our students are grateful for this opportunity and sincerely thank the firms who hosted them.

In varying degrees, they had exposure to:

- Designing new products
- Costs of advertising
- Simulated interviews
- Role playing teller/customer services in banking
- Being on the wrong side of the law
- Tasting new ice cream flavours
- Observing the effect of computer technology in the work place
- Production lines
- Office work stations
- Hospital environment

Karen summed up the day by saying “I found the information shared by the companies allows you to appreciate the ‘behind the scenes’ aspect that, as a customer, you would not have the opportunity to experience.”

On Lampen Day secondary school students go to different companies and get to see what goes on at those workplaces. We found out what qualifications we would need to get into that job and what sort of personal qualities they are looking for.

We travelled around the whole business and got shown all the little aspects that contribute to the one big business. We saw the managers of each area and were told what their specific duties were.

The two businesses I visited were Sport Waitakere and Work and Income New Zealand (WINZ). While at Sport Waitakere, we met people who go out into the community and promote sport while they encourage people of all ages to be active and keep fit. The person I admired most there was one who has never regretted choosing to take employment there for less money than her previous job paid. She said that she enjoys this job a whole lot more. Her role in the business is that she takes a group of people that are over the weight of 120 kg and helps them to get active; whether it be just little exercises on chairs, or going for very light walks.

Work and Income New Zealand turned out to be beyond my expectations. Instead of being told everybody’s individual jobs, as at Sport Waitakere, we got to travel around the business and see them at work. From the outside, you could assume the work place to be quiet and monotonous. Wrong. Inside there are a huge number of people working on the telephones, computers and desks all keeping to a strict guideline and a goal of an 80% answering rate. While we were there the rate was at 87%, so they were above their goal.

I think that going into an already established company is the way to start. You don’t need to worry about whether your business will succeed or fail because you are not the person running it.

From the experiences at these businesses, I have expanded my horizon on how I see my life ending up. I thought that I would have a job to do with sport, but this has shown me that I would enjoy working in an office as well.

Spirit of New Zealand

"You only appreciate home when you're away from it" is a very common statement. However, from a recent personal experience, my voyage on the Spirit of New Zealand, I believe it to be untrue. In some ways I found that I only appreciate two things from home since being away. First is privacy. Imagine if you will 21 teenagers living in a room the size of my hallway - this is no exaggeration. The second is showers, you get one shower in the whole trip (on the last night) and every other day you have a swim at 6.30 am. There is nothing else that I appreciate but there is so much I miss now I'm home. Like my friends. There are 53 people on the ship and even though you only know them for 10 days you feel that you have known them your whole life. I miss the physical challenges, the 'doing' stuff you never thought you'd do. Like me for instance, climbing the rigging to the T'gallant (the second to top one) in 45 knot winds and 2-3 metre swells off the Coromandel Peninsula, to tie up a square sail before we get to the real bad weather. Riding on the bow sprit in 1 m swells from Waiheke Island to Coromandel. First I must tell you being on the yard is scary when nothing is moving. But when the boat is rolling, it is the most scary thing you can imagine (you're standing on a rope about 2 cm in diameter). Of course, I was scared. Stepping off the ladder onto the yard was probably the hardest thing I've ever done. But by the time I got down I felt I could do anything on the ship. And later in the trip I did. I miss knowing that you have something important to do each morning when you wake up. It seems that my normal life is uninteresting now. I miss the great feeling that you get being part of a team. I miss the ship. There is just something about being on the Spirit. An amazing feeling you have. It's really impossible to describe. It's like the 'Matrix' you cannot be told what it is, you have to experience it for yourself.

While on the ship you learn all the time; not facts, but skills such as teamwork, leadership and so on. There is nothing I can say that will make anyone who wasn't there understand where I'm coming from. We were sailing from Great Barrier Island to Whangarei Harbour and during a quiet hour I was sitting up on the bow sprit, looking up at the sails, all 13 aboard flying high and proud. Just seeing this astounding sight and knowing I made it happen, gives you this feeling that cannot be recreated anywhere or by anyone.

I'm going to stop now, although I could write a full size novel on my experiences. So I will leave writing by saying the spirit of the Spirit of New Zealand is only really appreciated when you're gone.

I wish that every New Zealander could have this opportunity. There are no words to describe how much I appreciated the opportunity of this voyage and how much fun I had.

Videos were also shown that day, of the lifestyles of children from various countries that the famine benefits. My first reaction was "Oh God, not those ads, the little girls waits...". This time I couldn't reach for the remote to ease my guilt of doing nothing to help, when I knew how little meant so much to the abandoned, exploited and impoverished children around the world. It seemed ironic that the amount we could earn easily from a part time job in a day or two, a child would be under bonded labour for about twenty years, working twelve hour days rolling cigarettes or some other form of hard labour to pay off the same amount. The suffering of so many children without food, water and health care was heartfelt amongst many students. This led on to buzzing group discussions of how to promote the awareness of famine in the world. The enthusiasm involved was inspirational. One quote that stays in mind is "I am only one, but I am one, I can't do everything, but I can do something. And I won't let what I can't do stop me from doing what I can do." - E E Hale.

To many people, 40 hours without food seems like a nightmare, but it is a small sacrifice to pay if it eases the suffering of many children. It is our weekend that can change their lives. The most precious gift is the gift of giving hope, encouragement and dreams, to create 'a world that no longer tolerates poverty'.
