# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The Millennium pursuit for Rutherford of Raising Achievement Standards was astonishingly well realised when the results were analysed at the outset of 2001. Students were well taught, they learned well - they responded to the challenge to get basic literacy and numeracy at the heart of their efforts.

2001 has been a year of consolidation and, in a way, anticipation of the planned changes - improvements in the teaching and learning environment. We now have an ICT aim to move this crucial area along. Our involvement in the Digital ICT project for Waitakere City and the generosity of the Waitakere Licensing Trust have boosted this thrust.



The highly successful 40<sup>th</sup> Reunion in February set us off on a very positive note. The huge crowd of past students bore testimony to their recognition of what the school means to them. It was obvious that students have taken their places in all the range of callings in society - and some amongst the very top echelon of achievers. The buzz of conversation, exclamation and affection was remarkable.

For me as the current guardian and trustee of the school it was wonderful to be able to point to achievements of the last decade and especially of the precious current crop of students and reassure the "exies" that the breadth and excellence of achievement continues to this day.

The Rutherford roll now fills the permanent buildings. We had looked forward to the trigger of roll growth to be the catalyst for new buildings especially in the Technology area. Alas this seems now not a possibility since new policy is to zone Rutherford once again. However, given an innovative staff and keen students, who says "bigger is better" - "better is better" surely. Plans for 2002 for curriculum delivery are innovative and exciting in addition to the demands of changing the assessment system.

The newly elected Board is very enthusiastic and quite determined to make clear to the student body their commitment to wise and innovative governance.

The events of September 11<sup>th</sup> are writ large in all our recollections of 2001. It is really interesting to see the positive reaction of the human spirit to suffering and tragedy. On the one hand the concrete and steel crumbled and the important documents became worthless paper. On the other, people reached out their money, their hand and their faith across the old boundaries of race, class and religion - quite inspiring in that we, the family of man, turn to each other again and find fresh ways to acknowledge the bonds of horror, the face of inhumanity and the will to rise above it to build again.

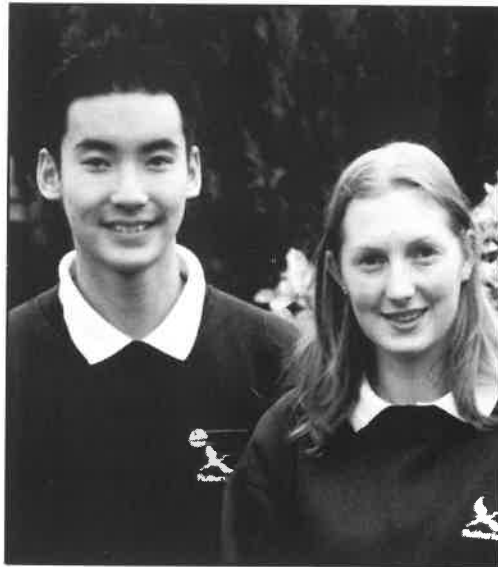
## Head Boy

Cooch, played by Ryan Benjamin, is the epitome of a laid-back country lad and Jessie Hardcastle's Aunt Dolly is convincing and evocative. Dolly thinks 'scones, pikelets and pavlovas' are the remedy for all difficulties. Cheeky has other remedies in mind, as she entices Wal away from Dolly with promises of the delights of town life.

As always, the animals steal the show. Gabrielle Luong as Jess, is making quite an impression and Michael Ward as Dog is giving his final performance in a major College production. It will be a memorable one, providing Dog can escape the clutches of Pongo, played by Amber Horner. Suvania Schuster's Dolores is delightfully provocative. Poor old Prince Charles, played by Aaron Ripley, is as long-suffering as ever; obediently, if unsuccessfully, trying to respond to Aunt Dolly's encouragement to 'do biggies'.

The ewes, Tabitha Meharg, Olive Patrick and Vicki McLaren are no more impressed by Cecil, Vincent Suifua, than they were when Murray Ball first introduced them to him and



Major, Andrew Wadsworth is still a Dog with 'Attitude', although not half as much as Horse, the Killer Cat played by Olive.

Behind all the light-hearted fun and delightful music, Footrot Flats preserves a real slice of New Zealand – a New Zealand that is rapidly disappearing in a high-tech farming age. It gives new New Zealanders a fascinating glimpse of a New Zealand beyond the city lights and puts Dinkum Kiwis back in touch with their roots.

***Along with 13 other students I was given the chance to perform as part of this years musical, Footrot Flats. It was one of the most fun things I have done but it took months of gruelling rehearsals and lots of Sundays spent at school working on perfecting our performance. 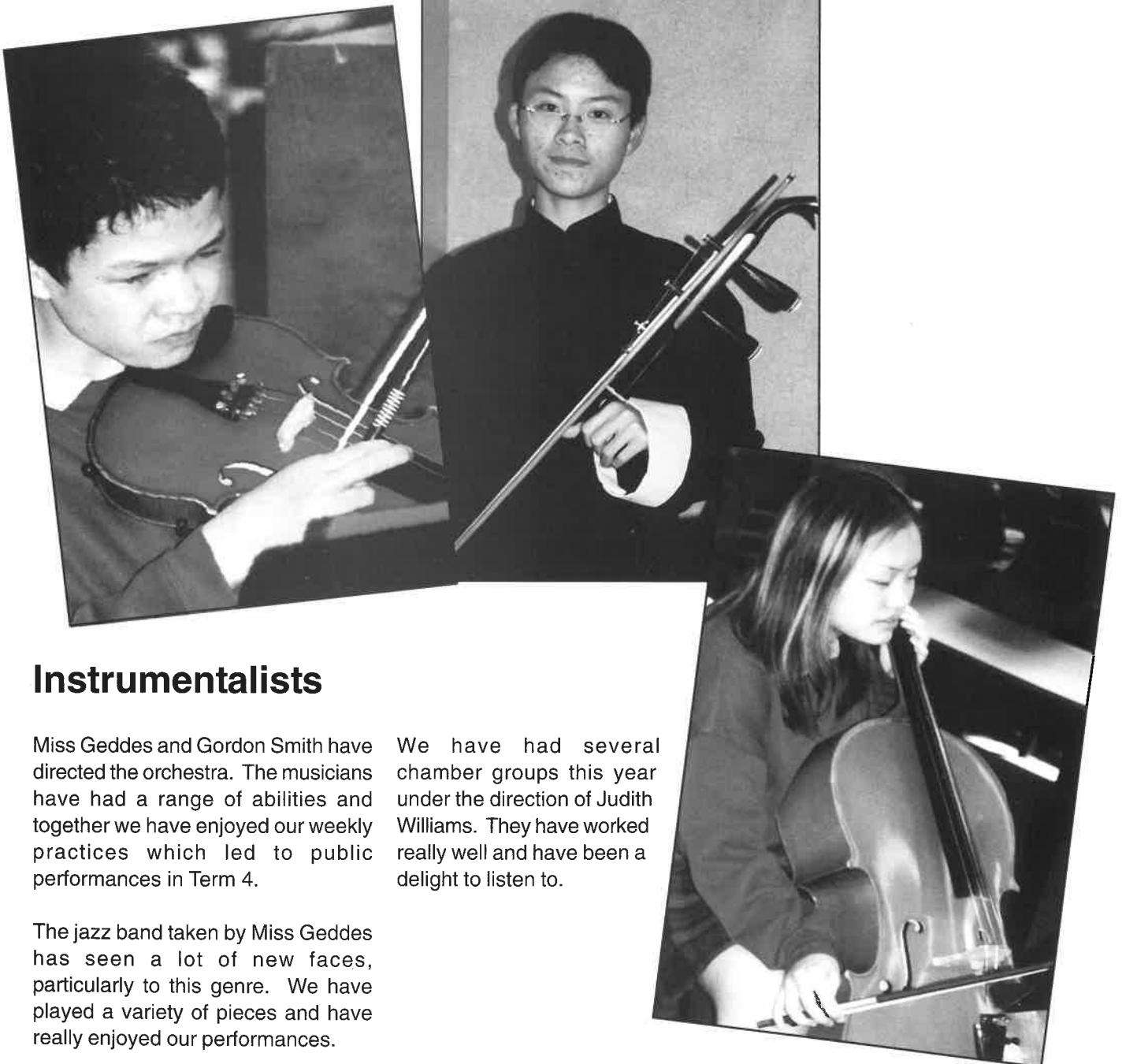
## Rambert - A REVIEW OF OUR DANCE TRIP

We do not have the privilege of choosing what subjects we wish to study, everyone sits in perfect silence as the lessons are delivered lecture style.

I stayed for a week during my holidays in a 150-year-old traditional Japanese house, surrounded by snake-inhabited rice fields. Here, I was able to see stars for the first time since I arrived in Japan. There are so many aspects of a foreign culture that you can only experience by going on a student exchange. You learn more about who you are as a person. I know that I will remember these ten months for the rest of my life.



The World Youth Society sponsors this exchange and the reciprocal deal is that Miyako Hino, Year 12, has come to stay with Angela's family and to study with us at Rutherford. Miyako is very sociable and has particularly enjoyed studying art photography - a subject not offered to her in Japan.

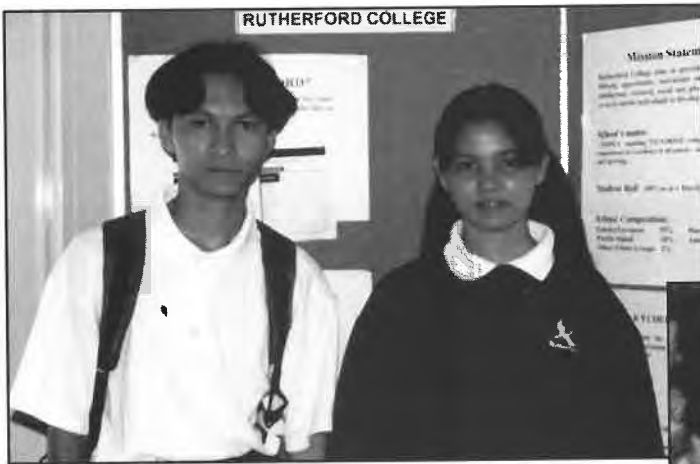

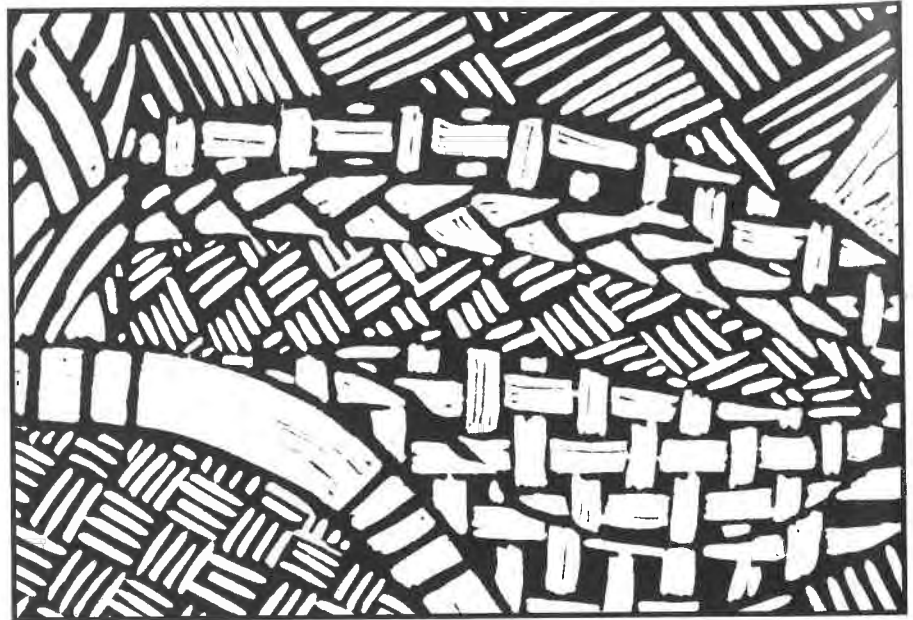

Richard ran up, amazement spread across his face, "Man I thought you were gonna get slammed! But I got it and it will be mad."

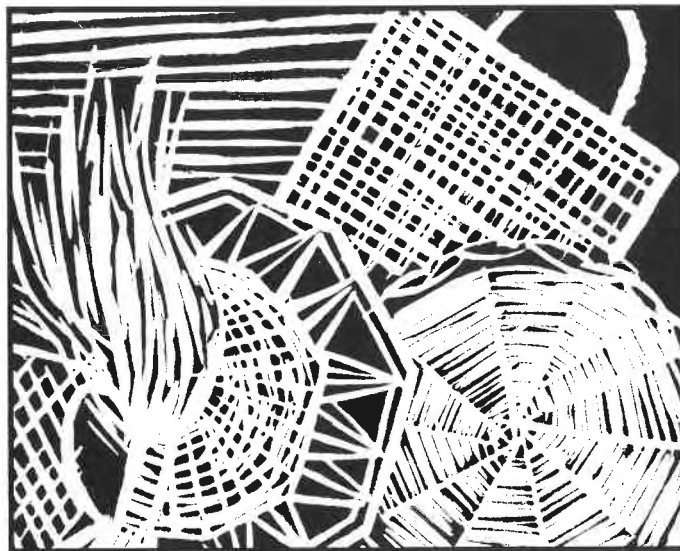
Now I seek a new adventure and the photo turned out great. That had to be the most daring thing I have ever done on my board and I will remember it forever.

**W**hen it's one in the morning and you just can't sleep, you can always pretend you're not here. Lie on your side in the darkness. Hear the occasional car drive past – headlights illuminate a patch on one wall for an instant, sweeping left to right. Watch as, inches from your face, glowing red digits usher time slowly forward. It's time to yourself – time to think, and to reflect – to play Remember When.

Sometimes, though, you just want an escape.

That's when you turn the light on, as if it could save the world. You can observe in detached interest the very slight pain as your eyes adjust and harsh brilliance floods your vision. You can twist to lay on your back and eye a bland ceiling. You can even flick on the radio and note how out-of-place dance music sounds played softly to a messy bedroom.

Sometimes, though, that's not enough.

That's when you slide from the sheets and pick your way through a cluttered floor to stand in front of the mirror. Tangled bed hair is quite becoming, soft lighting flatters the skin. Sternly fold your arms, pulling the fabric of your coat tight around yourself, and retrace your damp steps briskly, breath visible in the artificial light that filters through the rain. Your bedroom window is a yellow oblong of luminescence; you didn't switch the light off when you left. Hurry to the front door – suddenly you feel cold – lock it behind you, icy metal doorknob. Only when you're out of the noise and wet, do you realize how noisy and wet it was. You pull off your boots, short of breath and dripping slightly, ascend the stairs, shivering. Your bedroom is warm, the mess familiar... later, a damp towel contributes to the heaped belongings on the carpet. The mirror shows you a pink face and bright eyes and slowly drying hair, dark and spiky, evocative of something more glamorous than this. But for now, who cares, the bed has been kept electrically warm and is waiting for you. Change your clothes, forget what's outside this room, turn off the light. Lie in darkness and watch as time glows slowly, redly by. Let the past occupy your mind. Try not to predict the future.

Sometimes, though, it's all you have.

The Special Education Department provides a routine non-threatening and appropriate environment for students with special needs. These needs vary considerably. Some students find academic work a challenge, others may have a physical disability such as vision, hearing or for example hemiplegia paralysis of one side of the body. However, all share in the full life of both Rutherford College and the Department.

Our students attend form times and SSR. They also participate in a wide variety of mainstream classes, independently or with the support of teachers or teacher aides. Students participate in the wider worlds of sport teams and Special Olympics.

Extra support for individual learning is given in the Department. Specialist teachers work on an enriched and tailor-made timetable of both core subjects and extra subjects such as Social Skills and Living Skills.

Further support for these programmes is given by a speech language therapy and occupational therapy programme, a reading programme and extra learning support by teacher aides.

The department also provides a homework centre for students in major mainstream study and offers extra coaching when required.

Because the Department is an independent group, greater flexibility in terms of timetable, activities and trips can enhance the delivery of an appropriate curriculum for students.

We see the energy of diversity in Dance, Drama and Artwork in the Department and the hope of independence as far as each person is concerned.

How many masks do you have? I hear you say*

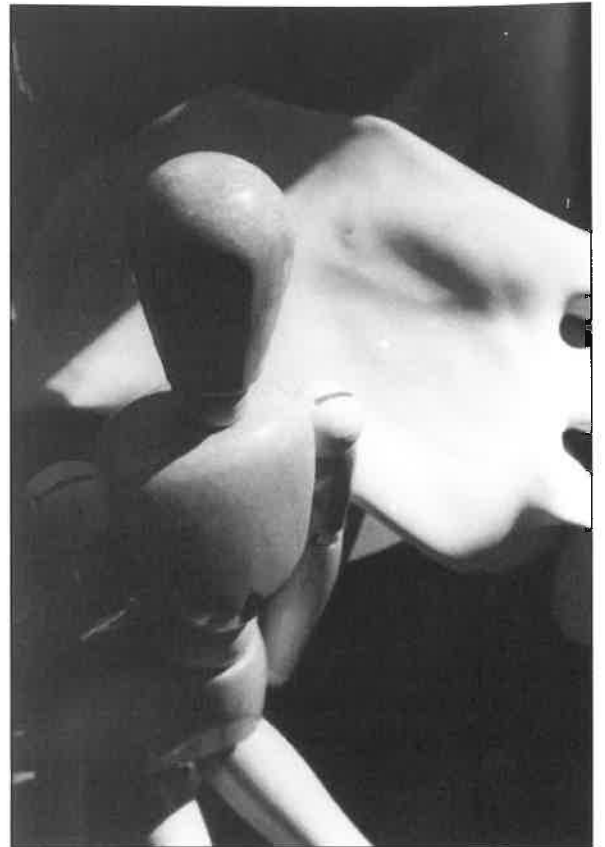

## Student Advisors

An important part of the student support services of Rutherford is the Student Advisor Programme.

Training and organisation is undertaken by Mrs Tai and Mr Johnson. It is aimed to encourage and support younger students in the transition into Rutherford College. Students from Year 9, 10 and 11 are matched with two student advisors through a referral programme. Student advisors are another advocate for the student and act in conjunction with the guidance department. The purpose of training student advisors is for the student in need to be able to relate to their student advisors as they are closer to their own age and go to the same school.

The pairing of students is important in order to develop a friendship and trust. Student advisors benefit from this too, with improved communication and an opportunity to develop skills. Two large groups of student advisors have been trained and had their services utilised this year.



## Peer Reading

An enthusiastic group of 35 Year 13 students volunteered to be part of the programme in assisting Year 9 and 10 students with their reading in the library at SSR.

It is a good feeling looking around the library and seeing 80 or so students bent over a book and especially watching a reluctant reader become more involved and developing skills.

Many increase their reading ages up to two years in a period of nine months because someone has helped them, encouraged and reinforced their ability. The library staff is very helpful in allowing us to leave our books on a trolley so it is easy to find them the next day.

Many friendships are formed and a couple of seniors have said they are off to Training College because they have discovered a skill and love of working and helping others.

At the end of each six week block, there is a prizegiving where each junior is given a book and certificate. Thank you to Mr Edmeades and the Board of Trustees for this donation. The seniors receive a certificate acknowledging their contribution of service and we thank them for giving up their time so willingly.

## Geography Field Trips Year 11

After roll call and receiving the work sheets (as the trip was part of our School C mark) we got on the bus and began our one hour trip to the Pound's farm in Kaukapakapa, north of Auckland. When we arrived, the farmer, Mike Wilson, introduced himself to us. He explained that he did not actually own the farm; he was a 35 percent share milker, which means he works on the farm seven days a week and gets 35 percent of the milk profits. He also told us facts about the farm, for example, how big it was and how many cows he had on it.

He introduced us to his wife Lesley; she gave us a short tour around the main buildings of the farm while Mike got some cows ready to milk. She showed us the calf pens and a few other sheds and explained the farming processes for different seasons and why their farm is located in a good place. She also showed us a calf that had been born six weeks premature; it was half the size of others its own age.

We moved on to the milking shed where Mike showed us the milking system, and then he brought in a dozen cows and asked who wanted to milk a cow. Everybody took a step back and looked at everybody else when, from down the end of the shed, Jermain called out, "I'll give it a go." So he went down and Mike showed him how to hand milk a cow. It took a couple of tries but he got it right. Then Mike asked if a girl wanted to try milking with the machine. Sarah said she would and she got it right first time!

Next, Mike got a tractor out and had some people to load it up with hay bales, then he put a silage bale on the other end of the tractor. Silage is grass stored in case of a drought; it had a very bad smell. Then we walked to the top of the hill while he went off to another paddock to feed out the silage. When he got back, we fed the hay out to some cows in a paddock – the cows were expecting calves very soon. Mike said if we jumped the fence and went into the paddock, we would see a newborn calf. It had only been born that morning and it was already walking. On the way back over the fence, Jane got caught on top of it luckily missing the electric wires.

Then we all walked back down the hill for a well deserved lunch break, followed by a final talk with Mike and Lesley. Tracey thanked the Wilsons on behalf of the class for sharing their farming knowledge with us. We got in the bus for a drive to the top of the hill to do a sketch of the farm.

We did an internal assessment based on our farm trip. Mrs Munro told us that the marks we got were extremely high, as the class average was 32 out of 45. She said that showed how good Mike and Lesley were explaining everything we needed to know.

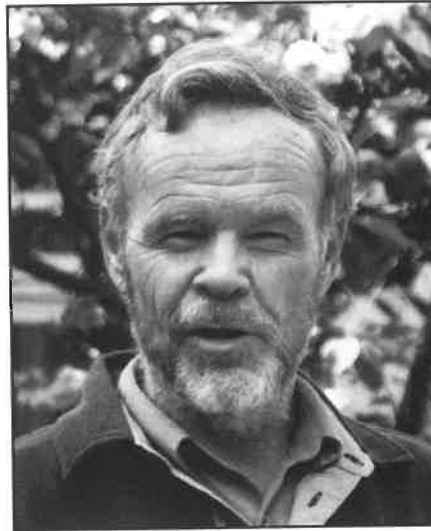
## Dave Needham

## Violet Tu'uga Stevenson

For the second year in succession, Rutherford College has lost a very long-serving science teacher through retirement. Dave Needham, the Head of the Science Department, started at Rutherford High School as a first year teacher in 1964. Born in Yorkshire, England (and still with a trace of a Yorkshire accent and the typical Yorkshire dry sense of humour), Dave did his secondary and University education in New Zealand. After four years teaching at Rutherford, Dave resigned his position and went on his OE to England where he taught for two years and travelled extensively. Towards the end of his time in England he saw a science job advertised at Rutherford, applied, was appointed and returned to the school in 1970, where he has been ever since.

Biology has always been Dave's first love but he has also taught senior physics. Appointed Head of Science in 1975. Dave has always shown excellent managerial skills and he is a great runner of efficient and effective meetings. Dave has all the qualities that would have made him a fine senior school administrator but his love of teaching "at the chalk face" kept him in the classroom for all of his teaching career - very fortunately for generations of Rutherford science students.

Dave will be missed in many areas of the school's life, not just in the Science Department. For years he was the Rutherford Branch Chairperson of the Post Primary Teachers' Association. His ability to sum up issues in a few carefully chosen words, his fearless defence of what he saw as right rather than as convenient, made him the "conscience of the staff" - maybe even the "conscience of the school". His contributions in the area of industrial relations will be sorely missed.



Outdoor Education Camps will never be the same either. Dave has shared his own love of tramping and the New Zealand bush with many often reluctant campers. In the days when bonfires were allowed at Hunua, the outcamp often rang to off-the-cuff songs composed largely by Dave. One example from 1996 and still partly remembered by at least one of those there, included every student by name. Here is an excerpt: There was Josh, Josh, dressed up rather posh at the camp, at the camp There was Leah, Leah, bringing up the rear at the Rutherford High School camp."

Dave takes the best wishes of the Rutherford family as he retires. He will have more time to indulge his interests in world travel, philosophy, reading, tramping in the mountain places, fine wine and Italian food. We wish you, Dave and your wife Margaret, many happy years of retirement - with so much to do you will wonder how you even found the time to come to school.



Violet started 2001 on official study leave to finish her Masters degree in Education Administration. Having achieved this goal half way through the year she accepted the challenge of Pasifica Education team member at the Education Review Office.

Violet had taught at Rutherford for five years; Lifeskills, Social Studies and Mathematics, as well as helping in the Careers and Transition team. 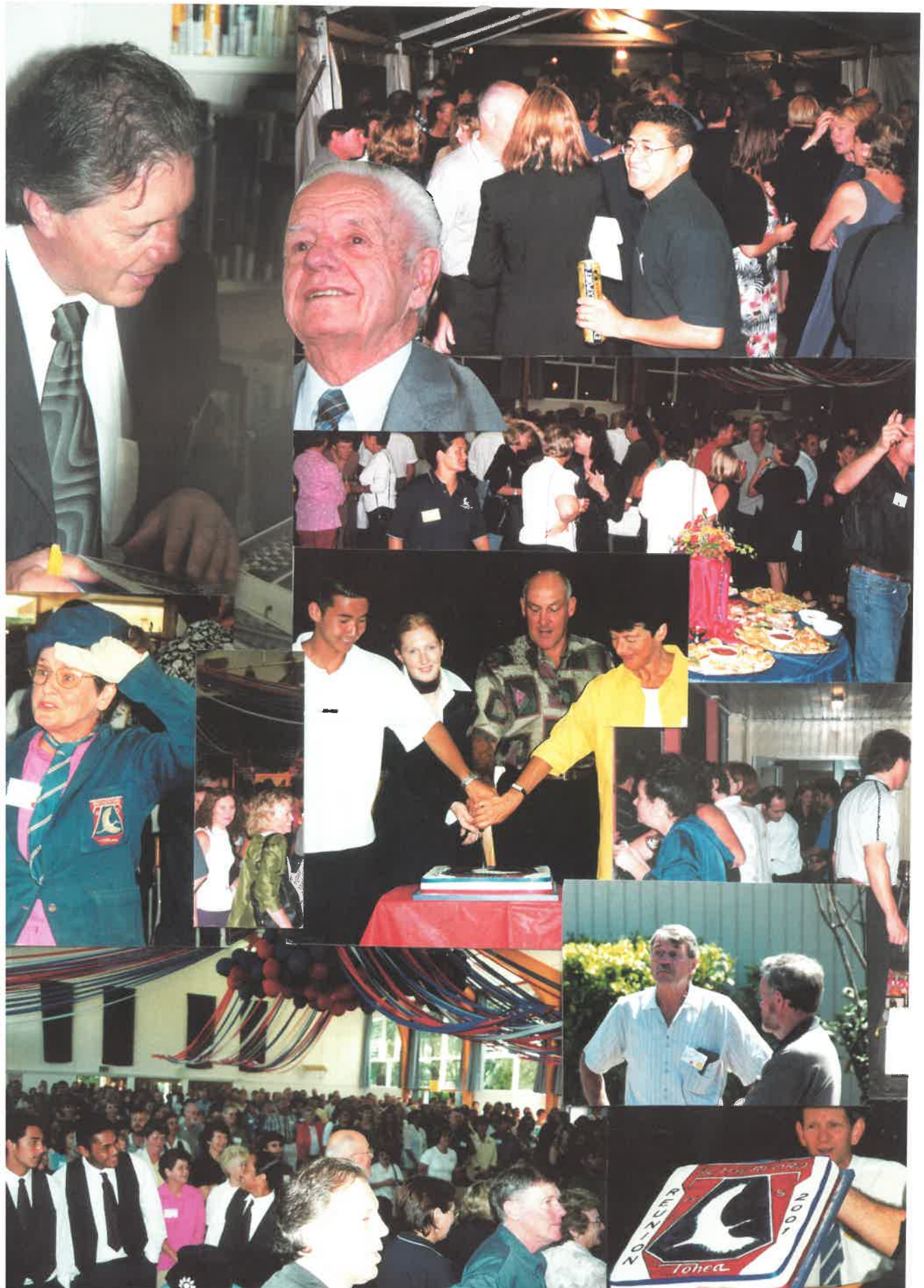

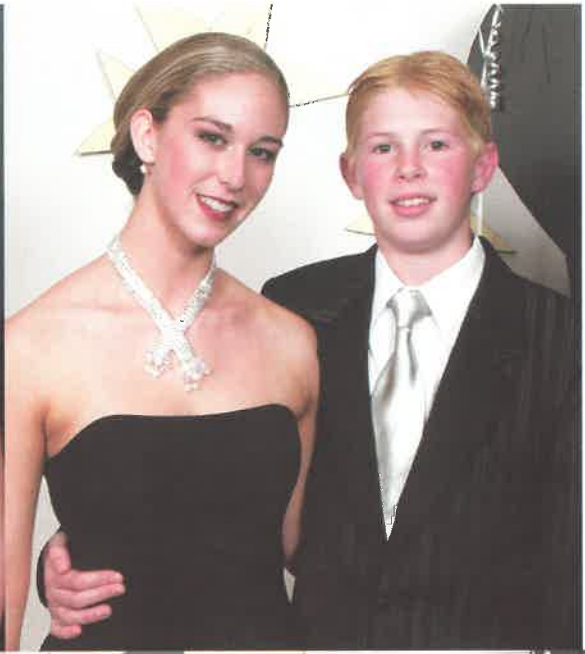

The ballroom at the Carlton Hotel was the selected venue of the senior students social highlight of the year. Italian

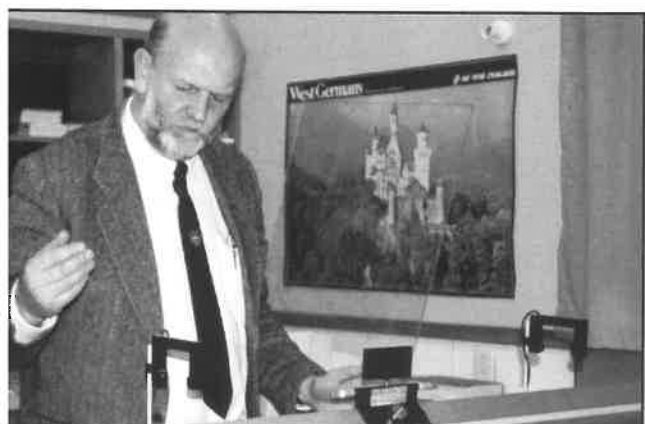
Mafia was the basis for theming which proved to be conducive to a wide range of ball attire - with and without accessories.

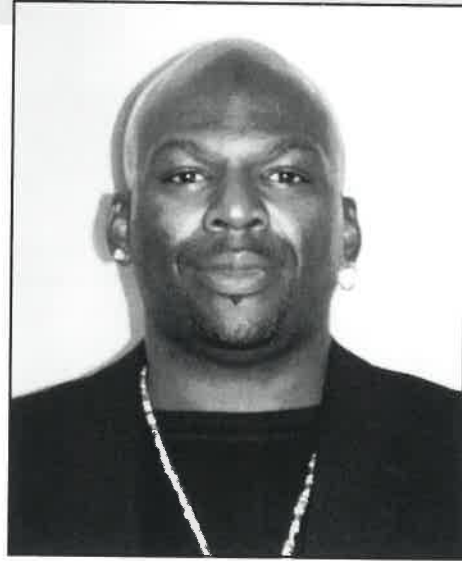
