

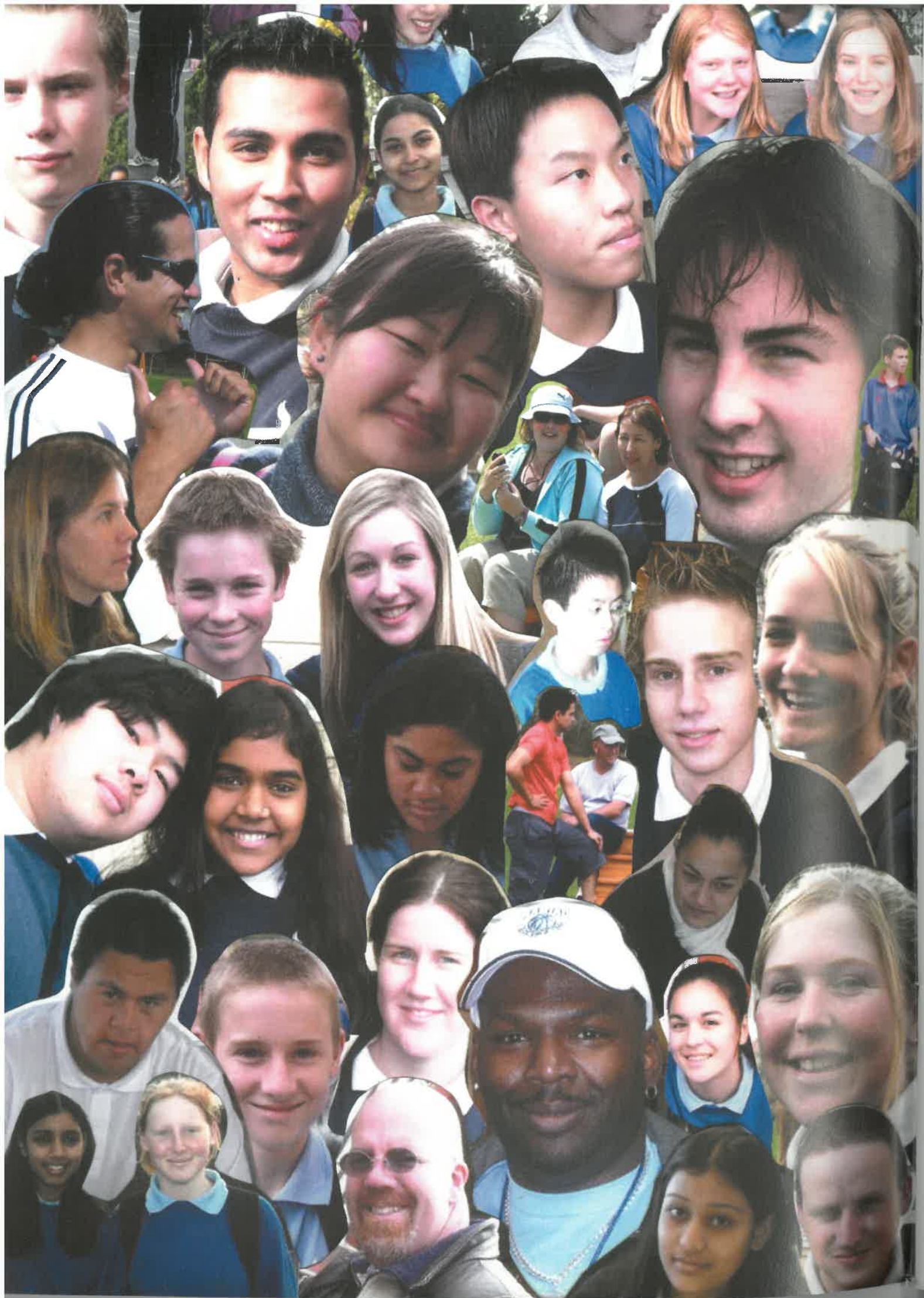

The commitment of the staff to create a bold new vision reflecting the needs of thinking learners in the so-called Information Age is exceptional. The research groups and coaching methodology have pointed to significant best practice. The dynamism of Dr John Edwards and practical experience of Mr Bill Martin and the knowledge of the international network they are building is an excellent launch pad for Rutherford College.

Planning is significantly more manageable now we know the intentions of the Ministry of Education for this wonderful site. Even more significant has been the commitment by the Ministry to build a new classroom block, which enables remodelling and refurbishing major areas of the college.

Vivienne McCracken

Viv McCracken, or Langford as she then was, started at Rutherford College at the beginning of 1971. She was an honours graduate in Chemistry at Canterbury University, and had been teaching at Riccarton High School in Christchurch.



Returning to teaching in the eighties, after raising a family, she was quickly grabbed by Head of Science, Dave Needham, when a position became available in 1986. She became an integral member of a very experienced and effective Science team.

Viv had an excellent rapport with students. She involved herself considerably in the wider life of the school – most notably on school camps, where her expertise as a Girl Guide Commissioner came to the fore. The new century brought huge changes to the Science Department – in personnel, content, method and assessment. A good time for a gentle retirement some would think – but not Viv. As assistant, then acting, Head of Department, she played a crucial role in preserving the best of the old, while embracing the new. Her sensitivity and leadership were never more apparent than in the sad days following Merv Rae's sudden death.

She also joined the team who were teaching the Kaleidoscope group. Her contribution was typically energetic and innovative. Our Kotuku, planted on the batter, is just one of her schemes. Her finest achievement must surely be the marvellous Pixie Stream project. Initially a research assignment by a talented group of students, Viv has turned it into an on-going conservation project that will be of aesthetic and educational value for years to come.

We wish Viv well, as she leads the new Science Faculty at Whangaparaoa College. She will be greatly missed by colleagues and students alike, and has certainly left her mark on Rutherford College.

Virtual Globetrotting

This year's Travel and Tourism students showed that it was possible to travel the world, without leaving home.

Two combined classes of Years 11 and 12 enjoyed a virtual world trip from the familiarity of their own desks, whilst gaining valuable knowledge about the tourism industry.

As well as learning about New Zealand's burgeoning tourist industry, the students discovered famous travel destinations around the world, and had the opportunity to plan tourist packages.

For many of the students, the opportunity to put their skills to practical use in workplace experience was a highlight of the course, and several intend to pursue a career in tourism as a result.

Employment Gates Wide Open

If education is about giving students a sound general knowledge and preparing them for the world of work, then the Gateway Scheme comes up trumps, as best possible practice. The scheme, operated in conjunction with the Waitakere City Council's business arm, Enterprise Waitakere, takes students out of the classroom for one day per week, to give them practical experience in a variety of skilled trades.

Rutherford College students have this year worked in a number of fields, including engineering; building, joinery and furniture making; the hospitality industry; hairdressing; banking; and the electrical and automotive trades, to name a few. Qualifications gained on the job are credited towards the students' National Certificate of Educational Achievement as well as a pre-trade qualification, which students could not formerly attain until they entered a tertiary institution. The success of the venture has encouraged 59 of our students to swap text books for hands on experience and several have been fortunate enough to be taken on as apprentices at their place of work.

One such venture involves students in restoring aircraft with a group of retired engineers and former servicemen, at the Museum of Transport and Technology. Corey Kemp, Thomas Houston, and Alex Eriwata spend each Wednesday at the Museum, acquiring the basic skills they will need in aviation engineering. In addition, the students receive practical physics tuition from Ray Gasparich, of the Air New Zealand Engineering Flight School, to enhance their academic programme at school.

Year 13 student, William Deare, has meanwhile secured a \$500.00 scholarship from the Electrical Supply Industry Training Organisation to further his skills in the electrical industry.

Employers, too, are delighted with the scheme. Manager of Henderson's Canam Joinery Ltd, Glenn Trainor, praised Gateway for developing the tradespeople of the future, and has, himself, taken on two full-time apprentices.

The partnership between schools, Enterprise Waitakere, and local businesses has indeed been so successful, that over 400 West Auckland students are likely to participate in next year's Gateway.



TMP Workchoice Day

On Tuesday 11 May, eighty enthusiastic year 12 students participated in a Workchoice Day organised by the Careers Department in conjunction with TMP Workchoice. The students were given a hands-on opportunity to see how various workplaces function, and what career opportunities exist in many organisations.

The first group visited the DFS Galleria (Duty Free Store) in downtown Auckland, and the New World Supermarket at College Hill. Students were surprised at the enormous variety of job roles within both organizations and were even more surprised to find that they do not necessarily need a tertiary qualification to enter many of the jobs.

Another group of students visited the Royal New Zealand Air Force at Whenuapai and experienced first-hand life on the base. Highlights included a dog handling display, checking out the parachutes and life rafts, and looking inside Hercules and Boeing aircraft. Students commented "They don't just fly planes – there is a huge variety of careers available. I loved going on to the planes and learning about the flights and drops. It was all so interesting."

A third group visited Fletcher Steel in Otahuhu and Linfox Logistics at Manukau City. Students soon learned of the many health and safety issues presented at the steel plant and many were overawed at the size of the delivery trucks at Linfox.

The fourth group meanwhile visited Amway NZ Ltd at East Tamaki, and BASF at Mangere Bridge. Students were amazed to see how much a person working at the Amway Call Centre could earn, and noted the bright and welcoming work atmosphere and the wide range of products sold.

Those who visited BASF were highly impressed with its representation on the global market, as the company behind world famous labels such as Levis, L'Oreal and Fisher and Paykel.

For all students involved, it was not just a day out of the classroom, but a great opportunity to plan their future career with first hand knowledge and confidence.



Community Education

At Rutherford College, the learning doesn't stop when the 3.00 bell rings. In fact, it's just the beginning for a whole new range of students.

Over 3,000 adult learners expanded their horizons by attending one, or more, of over 400 courses run through the Community Education Programme, 'Reach for the Stars', this year.

Two of these learners received awards for being outstanding adult learners at the West Auckland Adult Learners' Week Award Luncheon. Arnold Dingley has attended bone-carving classes for several years, and is now skilled in carving intricate pieces, as well as helping other learners in the class.

Julie Choi also received an award for her advancement in English. Mrs Choi knew very little English when she arrived from Korea with her family. Having attended the English Language day classes regularly for the past 18 months, Mrs Choi can now converse with her children's teachers, and her neighbours.

The Community Education programme has also involved itself with community development. This year a traditional weaving group has been established in the Samoan community. Older adults from the Samoan community also go into the nearby preschool and share traditional stories with the children. In addition, they have woven a roof for a fale built over the children's sandpit.

Other community development activities have included a parenting course at Rutherford Primary School, and a keep fit group for mothers of preschool children.

Rutherford College staff are also heavily involved in community education – some as tutors, while others take the opportunity to learn new skills from the myriad of courses available.

In the academic arena, 15 students have achieved Supported Learning Unit Standards, with Amanda Thomas coming top in Year 11 Practical English. Leon Curtis gained a credit in Dance, while Charles Siaki and Amanda Thomas passed their NCEA Level 2 Art assessments.

David Te Awa, Alex George and David Beaufoy all achieved their Year 10 Drama assessments, and Travis Torrey attends Unitec one day per week to further his education.

Meanwhile Kitty Fung has passed her Grade 6 piano exam!

The students also take advantage of work experience placements with Jody Kahua working at Wrightsons one day per week. Charles Siaki did so well at his Skill Pathways placement, that he was offered a part-time job. And Gregory Williams and Renee Gillespie both successfully completed their work experience placements through Skill Pathways.

It's not all hard work, however. Sixteen students participated in a soccer tournament at Keith Hay Park, and all students enjoyed 10 pin bowling at the Ellerslie Superbowl. Ruth O'Gorman and Leon Curtis were voted by fellow students as the best dance couple at the School Ball and many students look forward to gymnastics each Tuesday lunchtime with Mrs O'Gorman. The students have gained high levels of achievement in the gymnastic class, which is affiliated to the Special Olympics.

Two students distinguished themselves in the Special Olympics. Robert Chan took place in the Basketball Ribbon Days, gaining a third placing in the Counties-Manukau team, and a first placing in the regionals team at New Henderson Stadium. Project Twin Streams Surges Ahead

Rutherford College students have helped to plant over 400 toetoe and carex plants along the Pixie Stream Riverbank, in association with the Waitakere City Council.

The project emerged from a scientific study done by Rutherford College students two years ago, in which the students recorded and analysed the pollution in the once healthy stream, and presented their findings to the Council.

Impressed with the girls' research, the Council, last year, allocated a massive \$500,000.00 to cleaning up the stream, and the Project Twin Streams venture was born.

Under the initiative three areas have been planted with over 4000 native species since May this year. Planting riverbanks helps clean the water, reduce flooding and stabilise stream banks.

Science teacher Vivienne McCracken describes it as a good way of teaching pupils that if each person does their own bit, it makes a huge amount of difference in the long run, and she is justifiably proud of her then Year 10 students who started the ball rolling.

The project aims to provide a completely integrated storm water, stream bed and planting project that will drastically improve the environment, and teach our students important lessons at the same time.

A Colourful Kaleidoscope

Just as a kaleidoscope is colourful, bright and complex, so is the programme of learning offered to academically advanced students at Rutherford College. The programme offers a thematic approach to student learning, with different subject areas co-ordinating to study a theme, or topic, across the curriculum. Thus, in the Year 9 study of water, teachers of Social Studies, Science, English, Drama, Technology, and Physical Education, all tailored their lessons around the theme.

Year 10, meanwhile, studied structure and revolution. While Sam Gribben plotted a most dastardly political revolution in Timaru, his peers were busy in Technology, making wheels on the cart go round and round, for the All American Soap Box Derby.

Here's how the students view the programme:

"One thing that's great about Kaleidoscope is how we have fixed options and get a wider range of activities through the year. We get a taste of visual art, drama, technology, as well as core subjects and a language.

We also have double periods which allow us to do more in-depth work, such as experiments. This was a great advantage when we studied the Pixie Stream to investigate its water condition. We also had time to plant a range of foliage on the banks of the stream.

During the first term we visited some of the streams involved in the Twin Streams Project, with Waitakere City Council, for Science. We went to the Goat Island Marine Reserve for a two-day camp, which enhanced the snorkeling skills we had learned in PE.

For English and Drama we studied the Whale Rider, and were lucky enough to see the stage show at the Civic Theatre."

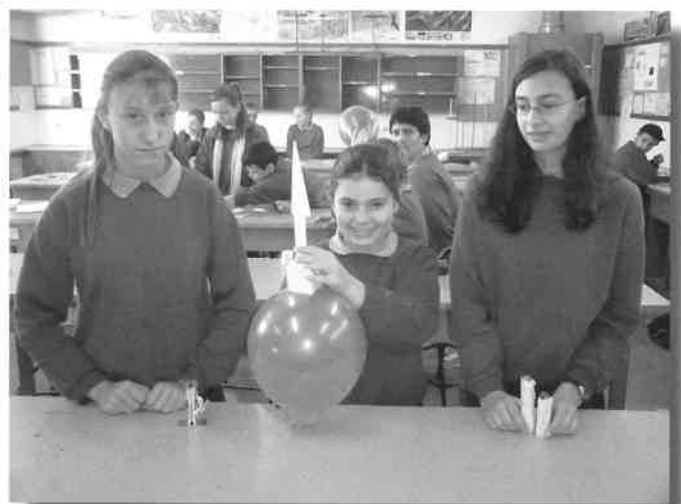

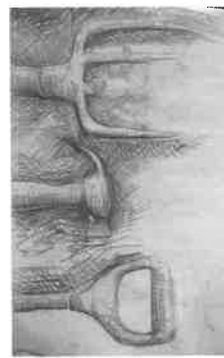

When I was eleven years old, my mother lost her job and my dad was really tired of working 14 hour days, seven days a week. They were both really tired and wanted to rest. We had saved some money so we decided to realise a big dream that they always wanted - travel for a year. I was eleven years old and my sister was eight, so we didn't really realise what was going on. In my city of Brazil, 34% of the people don't have a job, and it is really hard to find one, but this didn't stop them. My dad quit his job, we left our dog at my Nana's house, locked the apartment and left Brazil.

We didn't have very much money, so we only stayed in backpackers and camping grounds which was really cool, because we always could meet new and interesting people and make good friends. We went to Fiji, New Zealand and Australia, which was great, because I learned really cool things, new cultures, and saw beautiful places for four months.

After that we went to Indonesia. That was really interesting to me, because every thing was so different. My sister and I saw things that I will never forget. One of these things was a cremation of a person who had just died. That was really interesting - in Brazil we have a funeral, and the people were not crying, because they believe that if you feel bad, you will keep the spirit there. So, all of these things were really interesting to me.

We were in Asia for six and a half months and it was amazing! We saw so many different things and different cultures, but we had some problems as well. Somehow my sister and I got lost from my parents in Thailand and it took a long time to find them. And in China, when we were in the airport trying to go to Mongolia, we had some problems with our visa. Then, in Burma, we were robbed by a guy on the street. But I still loved the trip, because we were all together and all these things made us closer. Of course sometimes we had arguments, because one year together, 24 hours per day always together.... But it was amazing anyway. I learned things that I will keep with me for the rest of my life and I saw things that I will never forget. It's really different when you see something on the TV and when you see it in real life.



I saw some sad things as well that I wish didn't happen, like some people in Vietnam have still got some problems, (like no hands and legs) because of the bombs of the war that the USA put there 50 years before. People born without part of the body, because their grandparents were in the war. And I saw many people sick and poor as well, in many different countries. I think the thing that I most enjoyed on the trip was learning about other cultures. It's so cool to see different peoples, costumes, food, music, religion, dance, things that they think. Each country has a different culture. It's funny to see that in some countries the people are so poor that they don't have money to buy anything, absolutely anything, only food, but they are always happy and smiling, and some people that have got a lot of money are always complaining and never feel like they have got enough.

At the end of the trip, the two last months we went to Europe and I met, for the second time in my life, my family. All my mother's relatives live in Belgium and Spain, so I had the chance to meet my new uncles and see them all. I really loved all the countries that I went to and I really enjoyed all the different places, but I think my favourite was Nepal, because the people are so simple and so happy. They are all really religious and they make you feel peaceful. They are very friendly as well and the country is really beautiful. When I went back to Brazil (after one year out) it was really cool to see all my friends and family again. I was really happy and then I realised that I had changed a lot and grown a lot as well.

I learned a lot of different things about people, but I learned a lot of things about me as well. I saw how it is important to love your country, respect others' opinions and cultures and be happy and say thank you for the things that I have. I have a wonderful life, family, things, friends, and I had this wonderful trip that changed all my life and me as well. I will never forget anything, and I will always keep this with me.

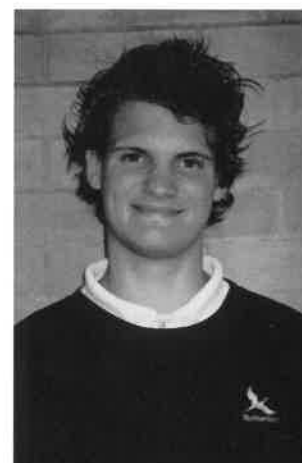

I have had many experiences to take home and share with my friends and I look forward to travelling in New Zealand at the end of this year with my family.



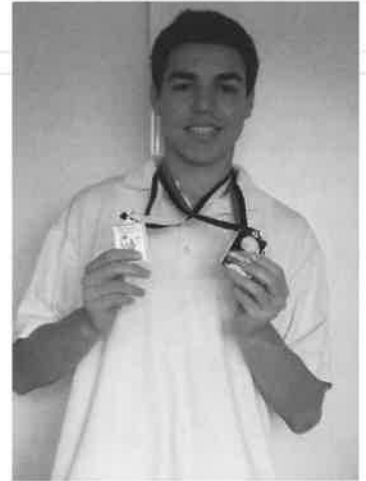
International Sports Achiever

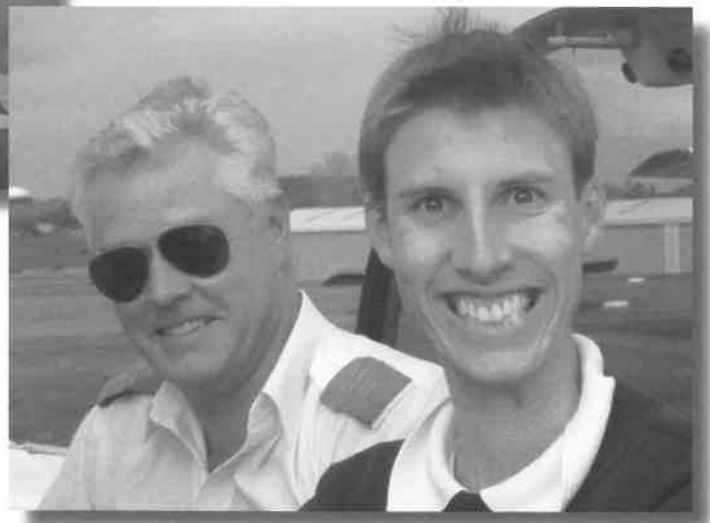

Twelve of our Year 13 students entered the competition and proved that they could cut the mustard with the best in the country.

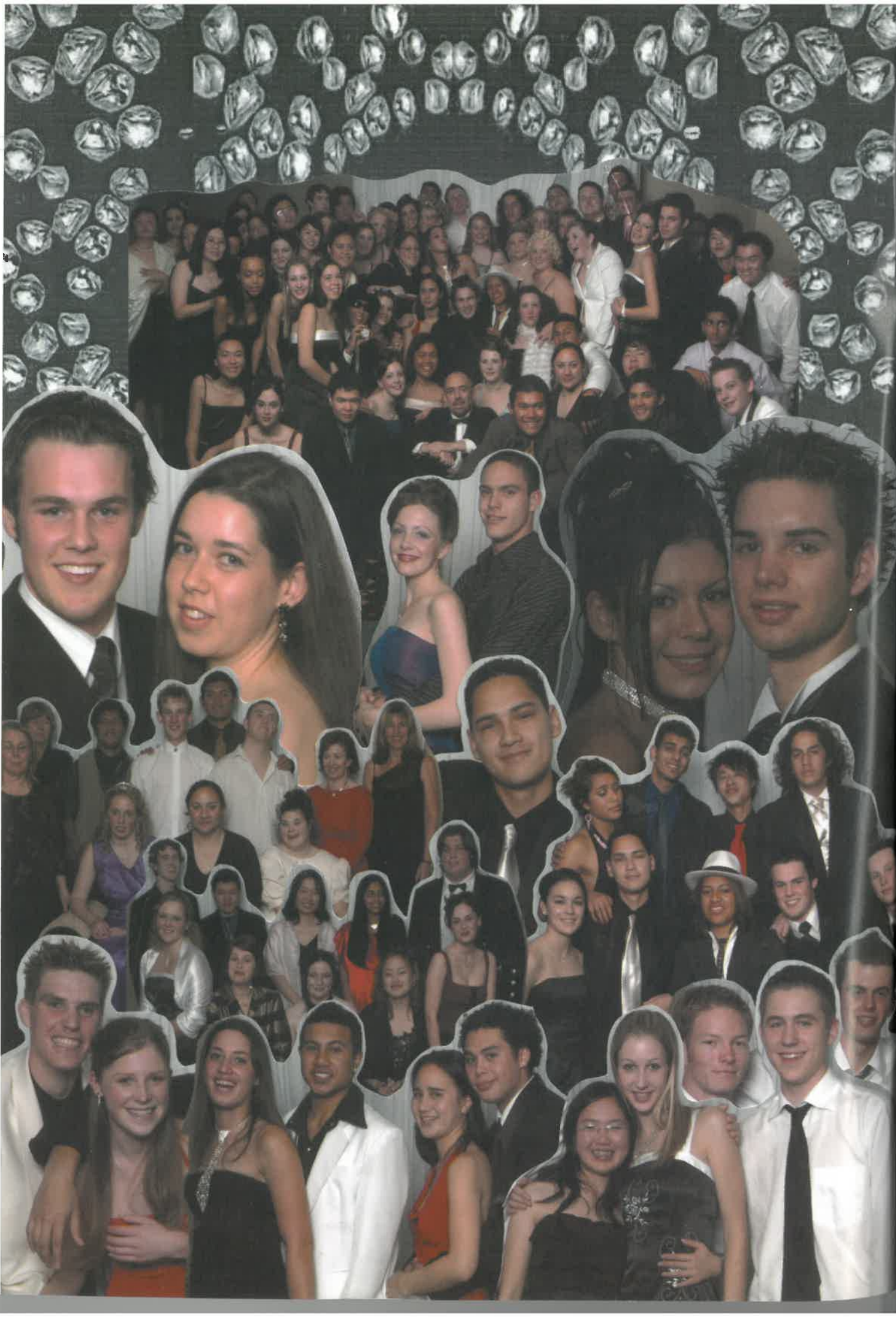

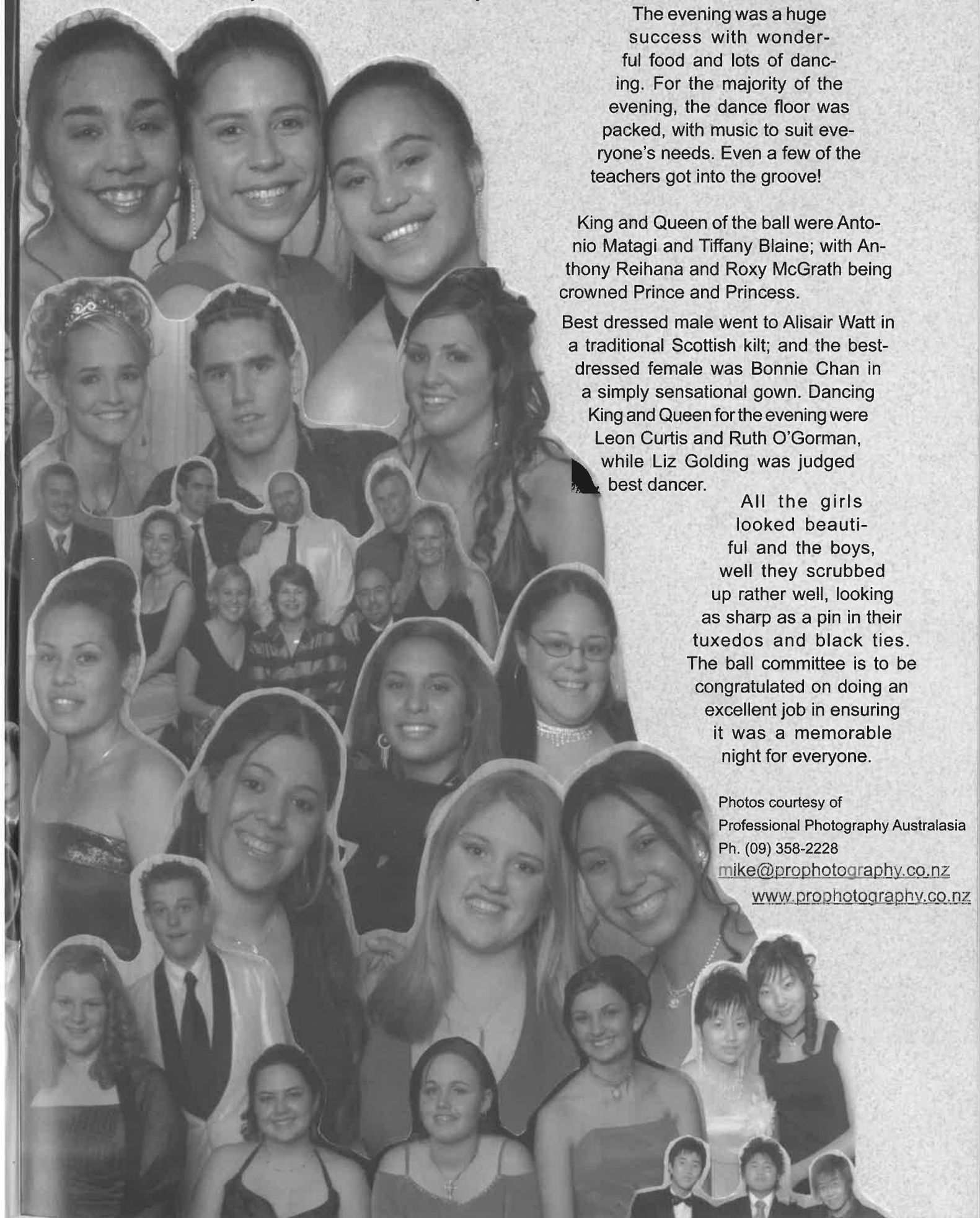

Perfect Paddling

Rutherford College's Waka Ama (Outrigger Canoeing) teams have notched up some stunning achievements this year at local, national, and international level, culminating in the world championships in Hawaii. All three teams put their heart and soul into training 6 times a week, unperturbed by early morning swimming training and intensive gym workouts.

In essence outrigger canoe racing is not a glamour sport, but a cultural sport, with competitors feeling a twinge of primitive well-being as the six in each canoe cross the finish line together.

New Zealand Secondary Schools have recently introduced Waka Ama into the sporting calendar and competitors hope eventually to have it recognised as an Olympic sport.

Paddling races are now offered throughout the year with 10 km races favoured in winter, and sprint racing over the summer. Competitors can choose to race in either a one man event, doubles, six man, or oc12's – which involves two 6 man waka joined together. The course itself varies from a 500m straight course, to 500m sprints – involving a 180 degree turn on a 250m course.

At the National Secondary Schools Championships in March, our Senior Boys team clearly demonstrated their skills, executing an outstanding turn to power through the last 50m and claim victory.

Our National Champions also claimed first place in the Division 1 Boys Plate Final (250m), while Ngawati Apanui gained a creditable fourth placing in the individual OCI (250m).

Our Senior Girls, meanwhile came second in the Division 1 Girls Plate Final (250m), with Tamara Panapa gaining 6th place in the individual under 16 OCI. Buoyed by these outstanding successes, our outriggers eagerly awaited their trip to Hawaii for the World Championships which were held in August.
