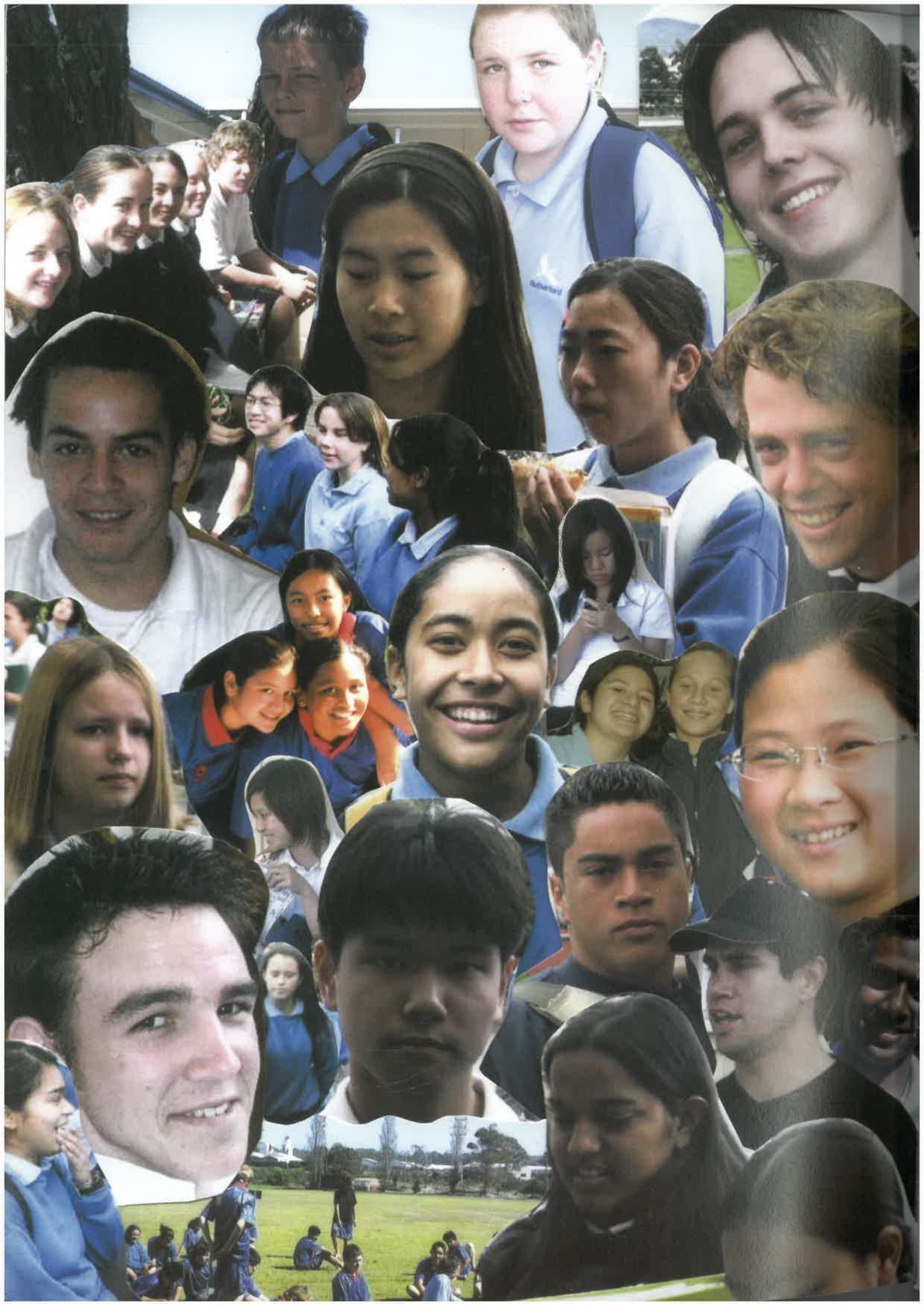

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 2005



2005 has been another significant year in the life and growth of this unique and extraordinary learning family called Rutherford College.

Transforming a school to meet the diverse needs of learners in this information-rich age is a huge challenge. In 2004 we developed our Vision Statement and researched some of the key concepts. This year we have done further research and have implemented some of the ideas. Some gems of progress have been achieved and we are all the stronger for our debates and shared experience.

This has been a year rich in student achievement. Our Literacy and Numeracy indicators are commendably positive. Analysis of NCEA results over the past three years show very pleasing levels of achievement against both Waitakere schools and national norms.

Our long-established Gifted and Talented Programme, Kaleidoscope, has proved very stimulating using the Ministry of Education iPAINT project. This is an incubator course of powerful adventures in learning and has now led to a groundbreaking senior individualised-course enrichment programme called 4N. This is a significant educational contract.

Sport and cultural opportunities provide wonderful stimulus for all the students who seize these. In both areas the reports in this magazine show a range of scope and a true depth from tentative amateur to confident national champion.

Our most formidable challenge continues to be the state of our buildings. Current Ministry of Education policies mean that the particular needs of Rutherford fall beyond their scope. The Board is continuing to pursue various options having itself spent \$1.5M of its own funds on various building projects over the past decade.

Rutherford College is an ever-stimulating and diverse collection of students, their families and a wonderful staff team. The award of 25 Scholarships this year to our seniors speaks volumes for talent, hard work, community service and excellence, against the rigorous standards of national candidate fields.

Known to her students as just 'Norma', we all knew that this teacher and colleague was a unique and intriguing person, and that is how we found her. A teacher of principles and integrity, she had sound values and encouraged us all to challenge and uphold our own.

Norma arrived at Rutherford College, from teaching in Te Aroha, in the mid 1990s and began her time in the English Department with Ms Stuart, Mr Bates, and Mrs V Reid, being a few of the now retired staff. She taught a wide range of classes from Year 13 to Special Education and some challenging juniors. Norma was renowned for her energy, vitality, innovative ideas, and strategies. She was always willing to give things a go, and always tried to be positive and encouraging.

Norma's compassion and caring nature flowed through to teaching the child holistically and she could give wonderful massages and neck rubs to her fellow workers!

Norma is remembered for her black leather pants and her young outlook on life. This was truly shown in her Wider Living Week activity of taking 25 youngsters to Wellington and providing a wonderful raft of activities, freedom and responsibility.

Norma also organised a Junior Council to encourage students to get involved in many humanitarian and school wide issues. Her debating groups were well respected and her contribution to the Performing Arts was extensive. Norma's love of Drama ensured she provided opportunities for students to express themselves and explore the freedom of the theatre. She herself, loved to dress up and seized every opportunity, be it St Patrick's Day, Book Week, or International Languages Week. Her passion for musicals also saw her contributing to school productions and resulted in the school's Evening of Andrew Lloyd Webber's Music.

We, in the English Department, miss her caring and adventurous spirit, her wisdom, professionalism and her wonderful ability to create new units of work that are being taught today, especially the senior alternative programme.

Norma left Rutherford College to become Head of Literacy at Glenfield College and we hope they appreciate her vitality, humanity and style.

As a Form Teacher for Adult Students, Margaret was inspirational and supportive to those returning to College to improve their formal qualifications and up-skill for the labour market.

We thank her sincerely for the outstanding contributions she made to Rutherford College and wish her well in her position as Head of Department at Rangeview Intermediate School.

Their brief was to discover the history of three of Auckland's historic houses and make the walls yield their secrets as to who lived there, and what went on behind closed doors.

First stop was the magnificent Victorian manor of Alberton where students embraced the grandeur and pictured themselves dancing the night away in the ballroom. The home reflected the privileged life of the Kerr Taylor family - leading social figures in



Mt Albert, hosting dinner parties and afternoon teas to the elite. A quick tour of the laundry, kitchen facilities, and maids' quarters, put paid to any daydreams, and made our students glad they were living in the 21st century.

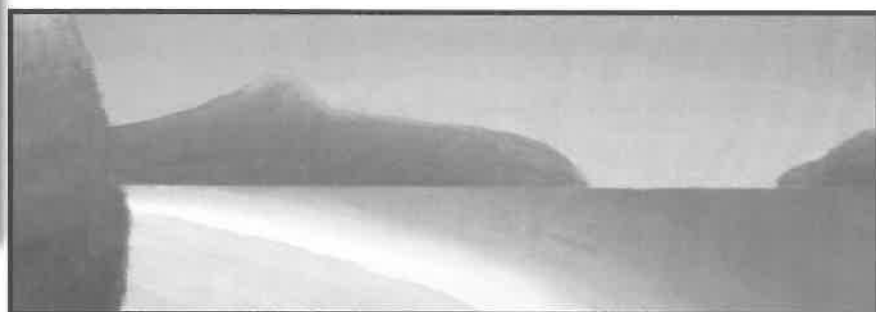
Then it was off to Highwic House in Newmarket, which was another example of a splendid 19th century mansion. The town house of the Buckland family, Highwic

boasted wings and additions that illustrated the changes in the family's life and the 21 children who lived there. Imaginations ran wild as the guides showed students around every nook and cranny and they listened to 78 rpm records on the gramophone.

After a leisurely lunch in The Domain, we next visited Ewelme Cottage in Parnell, which was most austere in

comparison. The family home of Reverend Lush, the walls spoke of modesty and comfort, not wealth and prestige. And as to rumours that the walls did, indeed, speak - the curator would not be drawn on ghostly tales which are the subject of an upcoming documentary.

With information gathered at first hand, our historians in the making are well on their way to completing their research.



HANDS ON HISTORY

The beautiful notion behind studying New Zealand History is that all the places involved are in reach. Both in distance and in time, the locations and dates concerning events are close and recent. This idea was promoted when the Year 13 History class toured some significant areas concerning 'The Invasion of the Waikato Region', by Governor Grey and his British forces, led by General Cameron around the 1860's.

The history which surrounds these locations was interesting, as it is soaked with racism and militia movements. Mainly because of the institution of the Treaty of Waitangi in 1840, European settler arrivals accelerated to a point where more Maori land would be needed to cater for the demand. After conflicts surrounding this issue in Taranaki were unresolved, Grey decided to act again. The Waikato was a prime target, but resistance from Waikato Maori was fierce.

The places we visited were the locations of some of the most significant battles of the New Zealand Wars. It again reminded us how recent our history is, and the Pukekohe East Church is an example of this. The Presbyterian Church remains from the 1863 battle of the area, between local settlers and the Kingite militia. Trenches surrounding the Church also still remain, and even bullet holes can be seen on the walls of the Church and on Tombstones nearby.

Other places on our trip include the Alexandra redoubt at Tuakau, the Gun Turret at Mercer and the Meremere pa, the latter being the basis of Maori resistance in the region. The pa was orientated to bombard the Waikato River, which ran past the hill on which the Maori were positioned. This is where Maori ingenuity was most significant, as the trench-type warfare used here and in other war campaigns in NZ were duplicated at Gallipoli and other battles in World War One. The Maori ability to adapt and to escape successfully is what ensured their victories, and the frustration of the British Commanders.

Rangiriri, our last stop, was undoubtedly the highlight of the trip, with local Historian Pat Gaitely giving a detailed recount of the phases of the clash of arms. It was a turning point in the War, where influential Maori were nearly captured. Rangiriri almost cost the Maori side Wiremu Tamihana, Te Wharepu and King Tawhiao, the Maori King, who managed to escape with the wounded in the night. This was a lucky move, because the next morning the British managed to take the pa through the confused messages received between Maori and British forces.

Overall, this fieldtrip was important because it helped to put distances and information into perspective. History cannot simply be absorbed through the classroom, so exploration of historical sites easily become the most enjoyable part of the curriculum.

Life is like a box of chocolates, it's full of choices and I grabbed them with both hands. I have now achieved a certificate in Health and Safety, a certificate in Business Administration, and a First Aid Certificate.

- The Coca Cola Careers Expo, where all Year 12 and 13 were given free rein to talk to numerous tertiary providers and employers at the Green Lane Expo Centre.
- Star Taster courses, where over 200 students 1-2 day courses targeting specific jobs and interest groups.
- Helping several students make the transition from school to the workforce, with apprenticeships and job placements galore.

fate, although the connection between Greece and Zimbabwe remains a little hazy.



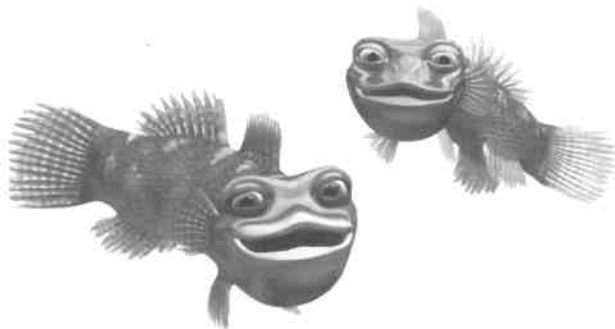
THE GUARDIANS OF THE MAURI

CHINESE SPEECH COMPETITION

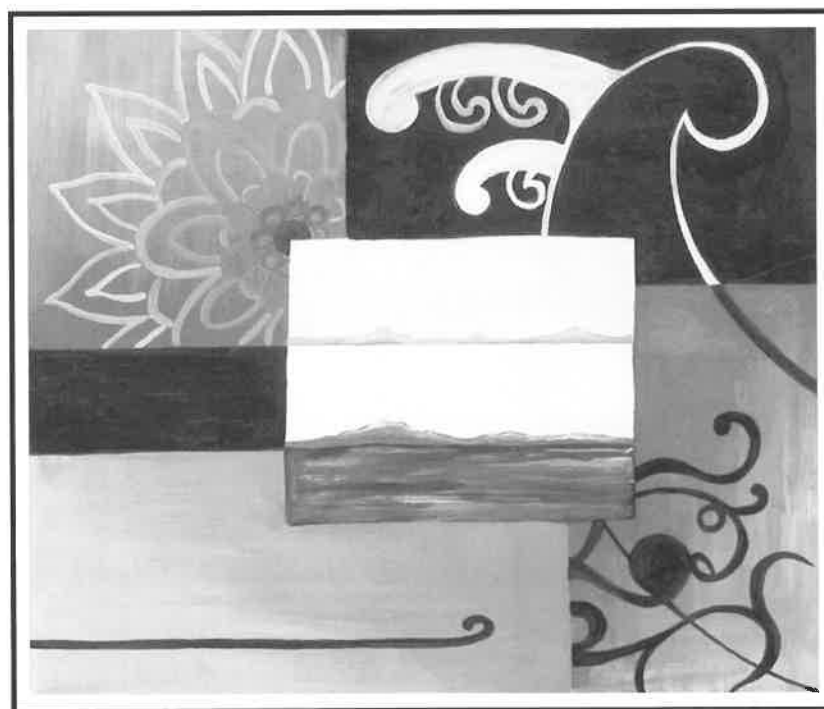
Rutherford College students again did exceedingly well in the annual Chinese speech competition held in August.

Now only uses weed killer.

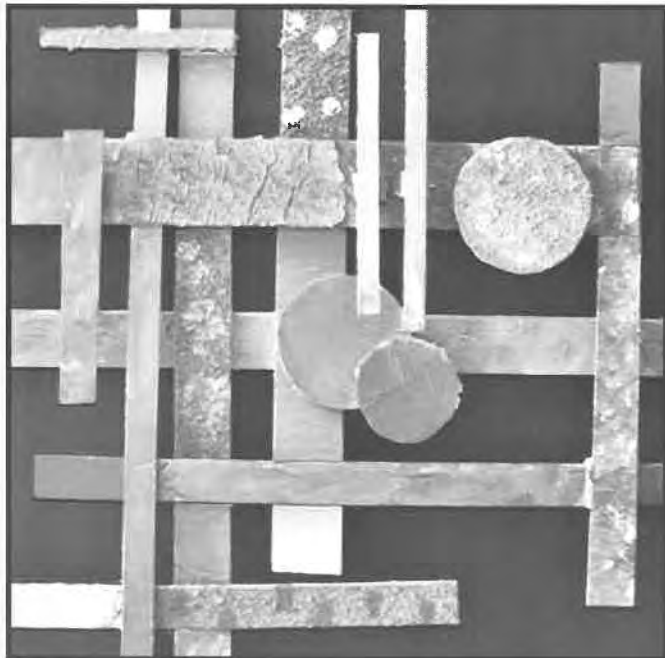
Once been called into the principal's office,
