PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE



The strength of our school continues to be the emphasis placed on the importance of people and building strong relationships between students, staff and the wider community. This is the foundation that we will focus on and develop further as we continue to strive for personal excellence.

As a school we again celebrated the achievements of our students on the national stage with the success of Caitlin Thompson who picked up the top individual subject award for Dance. Franklin He, a Year 12 student at the time, also achieved an outstanding award in Chemistry, one of only 27 throughout New Zealand.

Across the spectrum we continued to build on the upward trend of success achieved in NCEA Levels 1, 2 and 3. The highlight of Year 11 in 2012 was the increase in the number of students who had their Level 1 certificates endorsed. This increased to 73 compared to 44 with the previous cohort which was also a previous best. The 73% pass rate at Level 3 also represented a school best. The pass rate at Level 2 was up to 75%.

As individuals and as a school we should not compare ourselves to the best that others can be but to the best that we can be. We must set our own high standards of expectation and compare ourselves against them. The key message is not about passing Levels 1, 2 or 3 but must always be about the quality of the qualification. Striving to achieve certificate and individual course endorsements for an increasing percentage of students is a major priority.

From the 2012 survey 95% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that raising student achievement is important to the school.

As always quality teaching will continue to hinge on the positive relationships built with students both inside and outside the classroom. The most important function a teacher has is to inspire and engage students to want to learn.

93% of people who responded agreed or strongly agreed that Rutherford has enthusiastic and committed teachers.

However only 79 % agreed or strongly agreed that the school provides informative, relevant, timely feedback and explains how students can excel further. 21% disagree. This is something we need to work on both in terms of systems and methods of communication. This is a strategic priority for 2013.

ATOM-Achieving to our Maximum-Personal Learning Plan Something new in 2013 to improve communication will be the ATOM programme. One of the components of this programme will be a Parent-Student-Teacher Conference held at the end of Term One. Each student and a member or members of their family will be invited and expected to attend a 20-25 minute goal setting and reflection meeting with the tutor teacher. This meeting will take a holistic approach to each student. Students will develop goals for 2013 in consultation with their tutor teacher and family. The priority will be academic but there will also be discussion around co-curricular and social goals and how to achieve and plan for attaining a healthy balance with all three. These meetings will occur at all year levels.

We will be putting extra time and resource into Year 10 and 11. There is a need to put in additional effort to develop and refine the necessary work habits to better prepare students and families for the challenges of NCEA. We believe that targeting Year 10 and 11 will seek to build on the successful STARS peer mentoring programme at Year 9. Additional staff will work with Year 10 or 11 classes next year to support the work of the tutor teacher around the delivery of the ATOM programme.

Families have also requested information that is effectively NCEA for beginners. This information will be communicated home and will also be available online form. Families need to be more aware of what NCEA is about and this information flow is better placed to be initiated in Year 10.

The programme for all year levels will include the flow of more timely feedback of student data with home. The programme will be customised for each year level. The acronym ATOM provides a nice link to Ernest Rutherford and stands for Achieving to Our Maximum.

Throughout 2012, we have been working with Starpath who are part of Auckland University to develop the programme; the recent survey results have further confirmed that this programme must be a school wide priority in 2013.

So as 2012 draws to a conclusion there is awareness within our school that although we have made significant progress there is still much more we want to achieve and things to improve upon.

It is about adopting a growth mind-set and recognising that our past is never our potential. In Rutherfordian this means: "The rung of a ladder was never meant to rest upon, but only to hold your foot long enough to enable you to place the other somewhat higher."

The ladder can rest up in the shed for the summer, but we have serious climbing to do again in 2013. Have a safe and enjoyable Christmas, New Year and summer break.

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

My final task is one that I am eagerly awaiting, reading out the names of the prizewinners and celebrating their success at the end of what has been a truly awesome year for me.



Pasifika Parents Group

What is this group you ask? Pasifika Parent Group is exactly what it says it is, Pasifika parents who have formed a group. Fondly known as the PPG, the parents have meetings with Pasifika staff, key members of our general staff and outside guest speakers to help support their children's learning at Rutherford College.

Pasifika staff act as cultural mediators or cultural advisory officers for a particular year level in the school to support the year level deans and the schools to connect with Pasifika families. Pasifika families are identified when parents enrol their children into Rutherford College and identify as a Pasifika ethnicity or mixed ethnicities from Tonga, Samoa, Tokelau, Fiji, Fijian-Indian, Tuvalu, Cook Islands Maori, Niue, Rotuma, Hawaii, Tahiti Solomon Islands.

This year's highlights for this group have included :

Term One: tertiary providers and institutions coming in to discuss entry requirements into the University of Auckland, Manukau Institute of Technology, Unitec, Auckland University of Technology (AUT) and Best Training.

Term Two: logging parents into the NZQA website.

Term Three: two meetings, one focusing on the deans providing information about revision, study tips and video footage of former Pasifika students and their NCEA journeys at Rutherford, and the final meeting with a junior focus with parents planning the meeting dates and creating goals for 2013.

At the Pasifika Tohea Awards in Term One, Pasifika students who had their certificates endorsed with Merit and Excellence were honoured with their families in a special evening with cultural performances and a guest speaker. This year we had the privilege of having Damon Salesa, the first Pasifika Rhodes Scholar, give the guest speech to Pasifika students. Damon spoke about his family, working in a factory in the school holidays and thinking to himself that he wanted to make the most of his learning opportunities at school to aspire to his potential.

Year 11 Food Technology did two big projects. The first used a trip to the zoo as an inspiration for a project to design and make a cake that would raise awareness of an endangered animal. The second was to produce and make a viable food item that could be sold at a local farmers' market. The students had to hold their own farmers' market here at school to test out their food products.

concept of these awards and the sustainable items that can be used in fashion. Students worked towards entering the awards




and studied the sustainable lifecycle of materials from cotton and denim to aluminium and paua shells.

but they no longer frightened me. They comforted me with outstretched arms, bearing silent witness to my actions.



I travelled to the far corner of the room, immersing myself further and further into the memories floating up with the dust I was disturbing. They danced in and out of the shadows, too quick and to incomplete to clearly focus on. Barbie dolls with matching dresses. A laugh so joyous and honest it chased away all the bad in the world. Pinks and greens and purples and life. The ghost of her lingered still, in the faded posters stuck to the wall and the pyjamas sitting on the perfectly made bed, waiting to be worn just once more.

I turned my back on all the whispers of her and opened the wardrobe door. I slid my back down the inside wall, my hair tangling with all her clothes. It was darker in there, a vacuum in space that sucked away the time to think and feel, leaving me numb and hollow. Extending a leaden arm, I inched my hand up the inside of the door jamb until my thumb touched a notch in the painted wood. Tracing the wonky cut, I found the crudely etched "T" that accompanied

it. I pictured us at six years old, creating this secret legacy. Uncurling my fingers, I found another notch only millimetres higher than that one, my contribution to match hers. I stood back up, moving closer as I slid my hand up the door jamb, tracing our growth throughout the years. At a point level with my shoulder, half the markers stopped.

Yet I wouldn't even contemplate swapping my emotional pain for the mask of numbness that everyone else had learned to wear. She remained with me, for better and for worse, if I still remembered to perform our annual ritual. I took one final look at our handiwork as I stepped out of the musty wardrobe.

I moved slowly towards the door of the room, committing all the tiny details of what remained of her to memory. I wondered how much would be forgotten between now and this time next year, components of her personality lost inside the days nobody thought of her. As I re-entered the living present, I closed the door behind me, locking away her memory in this forgotten place once more. ۲

Two years ago, it would have seemed impossible for a reboot of the universally panned 1986 series My Little Pony to have become one of the most beloved animated series in years. Thanks to a talented crew of experienced artists, however, and a genuine will to create quality television, My Little Pony: Friendship is Magic has become not only beloved but important. It is changing several long-lasting paradigms in children's television, including the prevalence of "girl's shows" as exclusively shallow and polite fare with no conflict, as well as the idea that an animated programme should only be made for and enjoyed by children. My Little Pony: Friendship is Magic is a bold new direction in children's television.

Above all else, MLP:FIM is breaking the boundaries of girls' cartoons and indeed, redefining what a "girl" can be in the context of children's television. During its brief time of omnipresence in the 1980's, the "girls' cartoon" genre carried an intensely stereotypical attitude towards young girls, both on screen and off screen. These programmes – the more wellknown of them including Strawberry Shortcake, Care Bears, Lady Lovely Locks and the original incarnation of My Little Pony – generally feature a cast consisting exclusively of stereotypically and homogeneously pretty, polite, perfect, shallow little girls. A look at the Wikipedia pages about these shows' characters only confirms this. Article "list of Care Bears characters" describes "Tenderheart Bear" as a bear that "helps everyone show and express their feelings" while explaining that "Friend Bear is a kind and friendly bear." These sentence fragments were often complete sum-ups of their respective characters' personalities, perpetuating out-dated feminine stereotypes while encouraging its young female viewers to do the same. MLP:FIM is an earnest attempt to overthrow this trend based on the childhood experiences of show creator Lauren Faust. She explained to Ms. Magazine, "I assigned my ponies and my Strawberry Shortcake dolls distinctive personalities and sent them on epic quests to save the world. On TV though, I couldn't tell one girl character from another and they just had endless tea parties and giggled over nothing. Girls like stories with real conflict, are smart enough to handle complex plots, and aren't as easily scared as everyone thinks." The lead characters in MLP:FIM are intentionally diverse in their ambitions, talents, strengths, personalities, but also their flaws. Level-headed and intelligent Twilight Sparkle struggles with insecurity in social situations and gets obsessive-compulsive outbursts. Athletic tomboy Rainbow Dash can be abrasive and overly competitive. MLP:FIM is not only projecting that a girl can be many things, but it is adding a rarely-seen level of humanity to children's television.

MLP:FIM is also a rare children's programme that sincerely attempts to bridge the gap between "children's show" and something anyone can watch. There is a massive stigma in Western society for animation – it is treated by most as a frivolous medium that only young children can enjoy. This is due mostly to the lengthy period from the late 1950s to the early 1990s when animation studios, eager to cut costs while still pushing out as much content as possible, began cutting corners in both animation and script quality for their programmes. The result was a bombardment of aggressively family-friendly cartoons that planted and cemented the idea of animation as a children's medium in the minds of several generations. MLP:FIM is an important stepping stone for animation as it begins to move out of this prejudicial ghetto. It attempts to make itself watchable to older audiences (as well as animation and film enthusiasts) by subtly weaving in intelligent adult themes and allusions to classic theatre, film and music. The show allows children to form their own opinions while entertaining the adults or parents also watching the show. Along with this surprising moral depth, MLP:FIM also acts as a love letter to animation and theatre. Its musical numbers are often homages to classic musical theatre- an iconic song in the series about stitching a dress together is inspired by the Sondheim musical Sunday in the Park with George. MLP:FIM genuinely believes animation can transcend age. Thanks to its massive popularity (it consistently garners the highest ratings on its basic cable network The Hub, peaking at approx. 1.5 million viewers per episode), the industry is listening.

MLP:FIM is a subtly revolutionary series that is breaking boundaries in the standards of and general attitude towards children's television. It is a girls' show that males can also enjoy and it includes adult themes and references without losing its accessibility to children. It is tearing down gender stereotypes and prejudices towards animation.

Grace said it was 'one of the coolest experiences I've had' and I'm sure the other three dancers feel the same way.


The Year 13's, Rodney, Grace and Renee, have been invited to audition for Unitec as a result of their performance.

As always, we hit the ground sprinting in Term One with swimming sports, athletics day and our senior summer codes all kicking off in the first three weeks of term.
