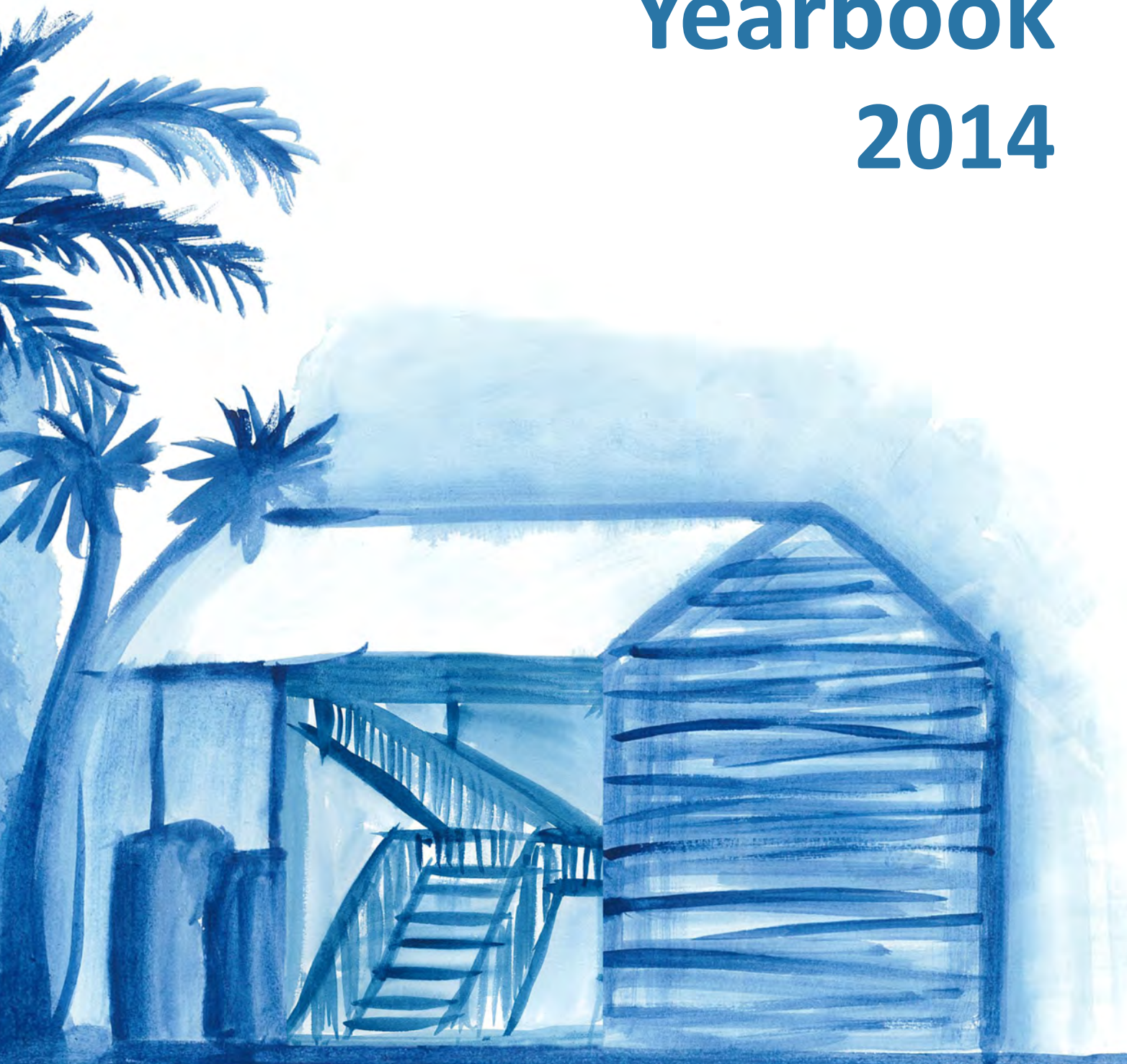

Principal's Report



It is my pleasure to report on the progress, success and the possible next steps for Rutherford College as we near the end of the 2014 academic year. Our school continues to go from strength to strength and I believe that we are in very good shape to take advantage of the future opportunities that beckon to take our school forward even further.

2013 NCEA Results Summary

Across the board results continue to improve in the National NCEA qualifications.

Level 1: At Level 1 we took a slight dip – 74.3% compared to the Decile 6 average of 78.7% pass rate and compared to 76.9% last year and 64.1% in 2011. An additional 26 students got in excess of 70 credits and at this stage are tracking well to get both NCEA Level 1 and 2 combined in their Year 12 year.

Literacy, at 92.2%, compared to the Decile 6 average of 90%, has marginally improved from 2012. Numeracy is at 90.7% compared to the national Decile 6 average of 87.5%. In 2012 94.2% got numeracy.

A clear school goal is to increase the percentage of students who pass Levels 1, 2 and 3. Allied to this is the clear target of increasing the number of students who pass Levels 1, 2 and 3 endorsed with either merit or excellence. We continue to try to coin the phrase that 'merit is par:' excellence is the target. At Level 1 in 2013, 105 students received endorsements compared to 96 students in 2012 and 73 in 2011. In 2010 it was only 46. Another positive improvement in the quality of the performances. There were 30 excellence endorsements and 75 merit endorsements.

The combined endorsement percentage at Level 1 is 52%; this means that better than every second student who passed got endorsed. When we analyse the number of individual course endorsements across the school and the increase in these then we can see clearly that the foundation for students achieving certificate endorsements is the work and push in individual learning and subject areas. The ATOM programme among other strategies and interventions has supported the focus on the increased quality of success.

14 credits per course is the understood minimum criteria and pre-requisite for study at higher levels and merit is par. We know there will always be a group who will work on a four year programme but the realistic goal is that 80% + should achieve at the first attempt. If the 26 who had in excess of 70 got across the line last year the pass rate

would have been 83%. The challenge remains to get those who fall short across the line by intervening earlier. This means Year 9 and 10, not just earlier in Year 11.

We need to look to maintain and build on these endorsement levels as this cohort tracks through Level 2 and 3. Level 2 and 3 is more difficult but history shows that the numbers of endorsements drops by 30 or so students.

Level 2: Our Level 2 pass rate is at 86.4% compared to 73.1% last year and 75.1% in 2011. The Decile 6 average is 82.5%. The total number of endorsements was 71 compared to 69 in 2012 and 32 in 2010. This cohort attained 17 excellence endorsements and 54 merit endorsements.

Level 3: The 2013 pass rate of 65.4% compares to 60.6% in 2012 of and the Decile 6 average of 75.8%.

The percentage who achieved UE has increased to 57.4% with a decile 6 average of 65.6%.

44 students received endorsements, compared to 33 in 2012, and 34 in 2011. The combined percentage level of endorsements at Level 3 was 35.8% compared to Decile 6 of 34.3%.

We need to reflect positively on the progress but we know there are students who are not yet achieving to their maximum. Increased levels of success at Level 3 and UE remain a clear goal.

Māori: For our Māori students, 68 % achieved Level 1, on par with the Decile 6 average of 68%. The Level 2 pass rate for Māori is 95.3% compared to the Decile 6 average of 72.2%. This result is fantastic and is due to a number of targeted interventions and strategies which combined have supported our Māori students succeeding at this level.

Level 3 is 78.4% compared to school average of 65.4% and Decile 6 of 66.7%.

Pasifika: The result is currently 67.6 % at Level 1 compared to 65.1% last year and the Decile 6 average of 70.1%. The Level 2 pass rate for Pasifika is 83.8% compared to 63.2% in 2012 and the Decile 6 average of 74.5%. Level 3 is 53.8% compared to school average of 65.4% and Decile 6 of 58.4%.

Scholarship Success in 2013

To obtain an individual subject scholarship requires finishing in the top 3% of that subject. To receive an outstanding scholarship students must achieve in the top 0.5% of the cohort. Eleven Rutherford students last year gained 20 individual subject scholarships in this high stakes and demanding external examination.

Xavier Breed, our 2013 Dux Artium, was placed first in the subject of Dance in the scholarship exams. This is the second time in three years that a Rutherford student has achieved this level of success in Dance. Three of our top scholars also placed in the top 200 in the country for scholarship examinations. Jerome Swannack and our 2013 Proxime Accessit Kayleigh Ansell were in the top 200; Kayleigh was very close to being in the top 60. 2013 Dux Litterarum Utsav Patel received an overall outstanding scholar's award and placed within the top 60 in the country. He will receive \$5000 for three years of study.

Next Steps

As we seek further improvement for all students we must do something extra or different for those who need it most. We must identify early students at risk of not achieving (SARONAs) and do this more effectively back in Year 9. We need to develop coherent strategies across learning areas that improve engagement and learning outcomes in the junior school. The learning behaviours and skills developed in Year 9 and 10 in all curriculum areas must strive to provide an increasingly better foundation that will serve an increasing number of students, increasingly better in the senior school.

Sport and Cultural Activities across the School

The success across these areas continues to grow. Te Kōtuku, our Kapa Haka rōpū, continue to lead the way with their passion, commitment and contribution to so many events and performances both within the school and the wider West Auckland and Auckland communities.

The success of our dance students and the recognition they get is fair reward for what they do and how they go about doing it. External recognition for the quality of our dance students happens regularly and from some of the toughest critics. The work of our dance teacher Miss Perri Exeter is inspiring.

Within drama, our school production Arabian Nights received 16 nominations at the Showdown awards, more than any school across Auckland. Mrs Leigh Sykes, our director, did a wonderful job leading this excellent production from the front.

On the sporting front, our 1st XV went through the season undefeated to win the Auckland 1C competition. Our senior mixed touch team were 1st equal in the Northern Zone qualifiers to qualify for the Premier National Mixed competition to be held in December. Our Premier Netball Girls won promotion to the top division of the Upper North Island Secondary Schools Championships for 2015. Our Senior Volleyball Boys and 1st XI Football Boys won national satellite tournaments against high quality competition as they continue their progress up the ranks at national level.

Individually there have been some outstanding achievements. The two that are on a world stage are Brahm Richards who represented New Zealand at the Youth Olympics in China and Oxana Repina who has been selected as part of a team of four to represent New Zealand at the Geography Olympiad in Russia next year.

Facilities

SNUP is the acronym for School Network Upgrade programme. During Term Three and the early parts of Term Four there has been a \$500,000 upgrade to the fibre, network and Wi-Fi capability across the school. This investment will significantly help the school in the use of increased digital pedagogy in the delivery of the curriculum in the future. Now that the backbone is in place, we will take the required time to test functionality and prepare for a staggered roll out. The key is to have staff confident and able to use the resource well for the benefit of improving teaching and learning.

Hospitality Room: The school completed the modernisation of what was the fabrics room in the Technology Block into an industrial kitchen of Masterchef proportions. This refurbishment at a cost of \$250,000 has added a much needed and valuable modern learning upgrade in a real world context to our technology learning area.

Performing Arts: The music and dance rooms received makeovers this year and the next step is to improve the area that links these two facilities together. We also want to amalgamate the drama learning area with both music and dance so that the faculty is able to work more closely.

In July of 2015 we will receive our next instalment of 5YA (Five Year Agreement) money from the Ministry to continue modernising the learning environment. The priority project when the amount of money that we will receive is confirmed is to modernise D Block including science and digital technology.

We also want to involve the wider community in fundraising to support the much needed development and improvement of the school hall both as the central and spiritual home where we gather as a school to celebrate success. It is also vital and that we provide the quality of facilities that our performing arts staff and students' talents, passion and energy deserve.

In closing;

Doughty Trucks was also a winner for the boys. They got to sit in a huge, spacious truck and got a bird's eye view of what truckers see. The presenter spoke to them about truck safety and how stupid some car drivers are. They now have an appreciation of truck drivers and how dangerous car drivers can be.

Their least favourite experience was using a jack hammer type machine. It was heavy, hard to control and very loud.

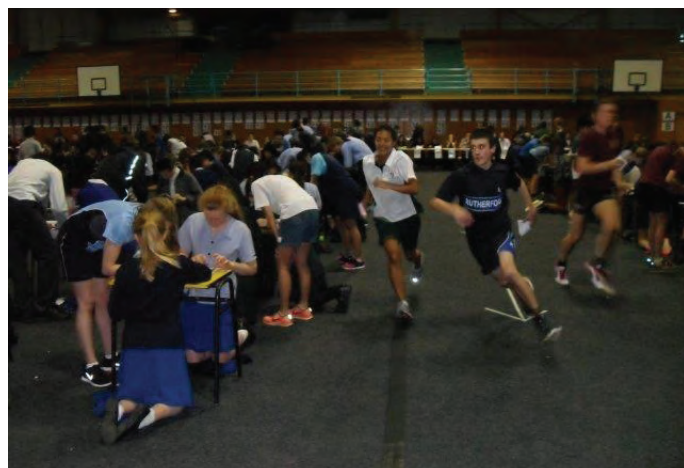
We were escorted in small groups along the assembly line, where

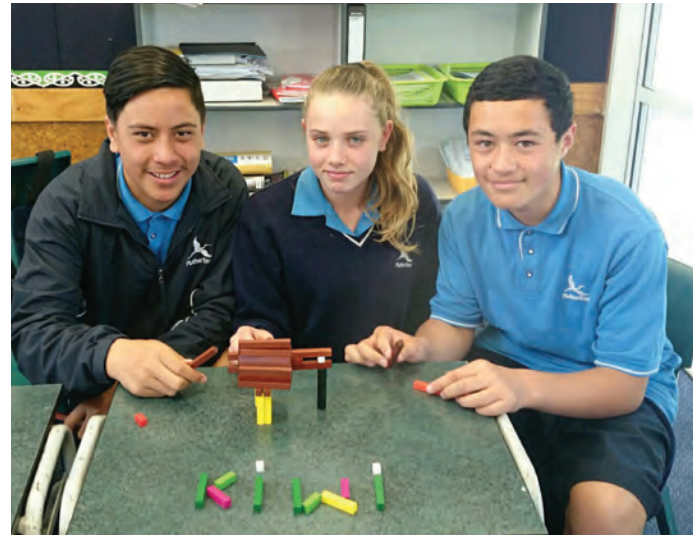

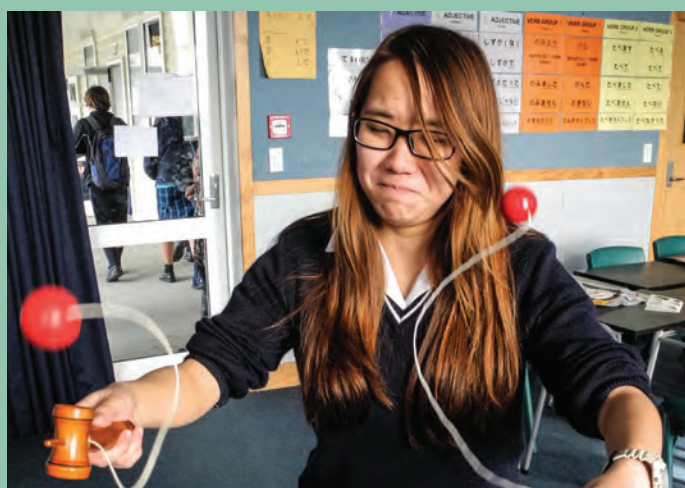

Luv Music and Rutherford Day were also great showcases of amazing talent especially our Jazz Band with its strong rhythm section and powerful horns!

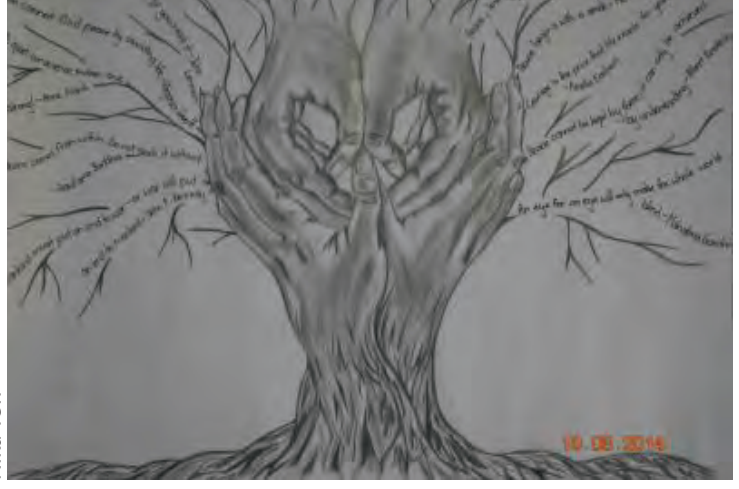
